Now that the *Christian Worker Directory* has been published we can begin to look analytically at some of the regions of the UK and see how the congregations are doing. We currently have 80 congregations listed in the *Directory* (with the addition of Perth in this issue). This represents an increase of five congregations since the printing of the previous directory in 2012. The breakdown by country is as follows:

| Country               | Assemblies | Christians |
|-----------------------|------------|------------|
| England               | 50         | 1572       |
| Scotland              | 23         | 601        |
| Wales                 | 1          | 30         |
| Northern Ireland/Eire | 5          | 179        |
| Isolated/Jersey       | 1          | 4          |
| Total                 | 80         | 2386       |

The largest area of growth has been in England, with an additional three congregations and the closure of one. This has seen an overall increase of Christians listed of 178. Scotland has seen the addition of two new congregations but a decrease of 69 Christians listed. Wales, Northern Ireland and Ireland show no change. The number of isolated Christians is down and there are some now living in Jersey. Keep in mind that these are just the congregations that choose to be included in the directory – we know there are a few others that are not listed. For statistical purposes it does give us a snapshot of what has happened during the past four years.

Overall, there are 80 congregations listed in the directory, which is up five from 2012. There are 111 more Christians reported among the congregations than four years ago. If we look back as far as 2007 (not quite ten years ago) there were the same number of congregations reporting (80) but we have an increase of 175 Christians. Some of those congregations are no longer in existence but others have been started by Christians in new areas including some who have immigrated to the United Kingdom. Although we are seeing slow growth through the years, we realise we still have much work for the Lord ahead of us!

# Spotlight: Athens Christian Retreat

Several sisters, brothers and friends from eight countries joined the 13<sup>th</sup> Annual Omonia Family Retreat in Cenchrea/Ancient Corinth. One of our young participants, 15-year old Alexander Zelmanovich said that it

would not be the same as if he would visit the hotel just with his parents for four days. And he added: "Everything would be the same – the swimming pool, the calm waters of the Aegean Sea, the pool table, the delicious

food, the volley-ball

court. But the joy of everyone being together would not be there. Alexander has been coming to the retreat with his sister and parents since he was four!

Among the various nationalities and cultures represented, our dearest Christian family from the U.K. honoured us with their presence. Trevor Williams and John

Morgan were among our most gifted speakers. Each with his outstanding accent and style shared the pure gospel of Jesus Christ, making everything so wonderful.

Along came their

families; Pauline Williams, Jennifer Morgan and Elizabeth Morgan, the daughter. Upon return from the retreat, we received a message from Bethan Morgan on Monday, 27<sup>th</sup> June. We thought it would be a "happy birthday" note on Alexander's 63<sup>rd</sup> birthday. Instead, Bethan stated her knowledge of the Bible and her decision to receive Jesus as her Saviour on the following day, Tuesday!

We read the message again and again – to make sure! – our hearts flooded with joy and our faces with tears. On the following morning we shared with her parents (it was almost midnight when we received the text) – and we all had a good emotional cry!

Just for the sake of information: Tuesdays and Thursdays are our service days. We prepare a celebratory meal of God's love for our Syrian and Afghan friends. Following lunch, the announcement was made of Bethan's decision to be buried with Christ. Whoever wished to stay and share the joy was welcome. If not, that

would be fine with us. Let us note that this invitation was addressed also to our Muslim friends (about sixty of them).

Everyone decided to stay. They had no idea what

Christian baptism was. They took their seats properly and orderly in the auditorium of our little congregation, along with twenty-five volunteers. Amid

tears of joy, Alexander helped Bethan get immersed into Christ. She made her confession publicly and declared Jesus Christ as her Lord; welcoming forgiveness

of her sins as the Holy Spirit made His home in her heart for eternity.

Once she came out of the water we lifted her up in prayers of thanksgiving. ALL of our Muslims friends came forward to greet

and kiss Bethan; not to mention their "Amens" during prayer. Everything was translated from English into Arabic.

Jennifer and John Morgan were more than happy to see their daughter fully assured of spending eternity together with them. We were all up in the clouds, laughing, crying

and filled with His presence and the beauty of the fellowship with each other.

Just the evening before, two of our most favourite Syrian families were visiting us at home. We have adopted these two young couples

and our lives will never be the same because of this glorious addition. Manhal and his wife Talla, Palestinian refugees to Syria (and now to Greece) were telling us that children with Down syndrome children, like Bethan, are highly honoured in the Muslim culture and valued as precious. Let us note at this point that this is before we even knew Bethan decided to

receive Christ.

pregnant, one of
the intense
prayers in the
family is for the
child to be born
with Downs
syndrome!
"Why?" we
asked. He
replied: "These

children lead the entire family by holding hands to Heaven! They are messengers of God's love on Earth. They have no evil within. They are the genes of the angels." Manhal also confessed before his wife that he prayed three times when Talla was pregnant with their two-year old daughter

Ellia, for a birth with Downs syndrome!

God's faithfulness and His presence have been so real in the last months. We invite you to lift Bethan up in prayer, her family, as well as our Syrian and Afghan friends.





So many of them are that close, closer than ever, to join Bethan's decision and let Heaven rejoice!



### British Bible School News

The past few weeks have seen the start of something of a new phase in our Distance Learning Programme as more material gets moved online. When we first moved into the realms of Distance Learning, we really had no idea how time-consuming a process it would be. Though a number of us had taught many modules on a week in, week out basis for many years, the process of transferring this material into a different

format proved much more demanding than we had anticipated.

We recognised that there was already an abundance of material available, particularly on the Internet, but we were determined to offer something different. We wanted to offer something similar to the syllabus

we taught on the full time residential programme, hoping it would enable those who had always wanted to enrol but who were unable to make the two-year time commitment. We wanted to offer material that was of high quality, straightforward to follow, and within a British context.

Several years down the line, whilst also pursuing a number of other projects, we have decided to make our entire first introductory module available online. Until now, students have relied upon having printed material sent to them, along with DVDs, before undertaking the various assignments as they work through each unit of study. We recognise that this was not always the best solution and, in light of the ongoing Internet revolution,

increasingly outdated. So the uploading and reformatting has begun and by the time you read this, much of the first module will be freely accessible – including what are now the already slightly dated video presentations.

Students will still have the opportunity to enrol, undertake the unit assignments and work towards a British Bible School award – and all this happens online. The advantage to

uploading this material is not only the convenience of more easy access, but also the availability of good quality reference material within the format of a structured syllabus. In many ways it seemed a shame to have decent material prepared but inaccessible to all but a

inaccessible to all but a few who knew to enrol on the programme. By having it properly online, it becomes far more accessible and more easy to share.

We are still considering the way forward with regards to further modules and certainly welcome any ideas and suggestions. The world of distance learning is rapidly evolving and we are very much learning as we go along.

Thank you for your continued support of the British Bible School and the work we are endeavouring to do. Prayers and financial help are very much needed and appreciated. May God bless us all in his service, that we might be a blessing to those whom we serve. Thank you.






We are very

# The Final Word: "Orientation and Application"

Years ago, I took a brief interest in 'orienteering,' a form of recreation and exercise that involved map-reading, walking, and exploration. Fundamental to the endeavour was the ability to "orient" oneself in the proper direction and follow through to reach a destination.

I was reminded about this recently when reading Psalm 3. In the Psalm, King David laments his present trouble with his son Absolom, who has usurped the throne. In the midst of his distress, he recalls his unwavering trust in God and his certainty about a triumphant resolution. David reminds us that as with the sport of orienteering, so with life, successfully overcoming obstacles and reaching our goal depends on correct alignment and a commitment to application – to follow through on what we know to be the right direction.

Like David, we all face people or circumstances that threaten to overwhelm us and tempt us to believe that there is no solution – God is just not there for us. David's answer to this had its foundation in his deep personal faith in God. His perspective was quite different from his oppressors. While they lived life from an earthbound perspective, David's orientation meant that his well-being was determined by God alone. Bound up in this was David's unwavering trust in God's promise that he was the anointed king. His trust in Yahweh's covenant trumped any and every circumstance to the contrary. No matter what people or life seemed to say, and no matter how much it hurt, David rested on God's promise. The Bible calls that 'faith.'

But biblical faith is not only a 'theological' conviction, it is a human response. Where we refuse to act on what we 'believe,' true faith is absent. So, as the Hebrews writer reminds us, faith builds an ark, leaves home for a foreign county, and suffers affliction with God's people, rather than enjoy the warped pleasures of this world for a season. David was resolute. His orientation was correct. He would begin walking in that direction. So, a fugitive on the run, he nevertheless slept soundly and woke refreshed – because God sustained him.

David's conviction was that triumph only comes to those who name Yahweh as their God and who live what they say. Fundamental is a deep-seated trust in God and his promises. These are the fixed compass point that orients us in life. Today I am hurting – the doctor's report isn't good, I really needed that job, I find this loneliness so heart-breaking. It's a new day in the wilderness – the struggles and obstacles haven't gone away – but, despite the pain, let's strike camp and move on in the right direction toward our goal. For this is still true, "Salvation belongs to Yahweh, His blessing is upon his people."
