# From the editors:

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2016 is finally over and the New Year of 2017 is now here! Another New Year. But will it be the same as the old one? Or will we have learned from the experiences we went through last year?

As we look back over 2016, we can see there was growth in God's Kingdom throughout this country. We published in the *Christian Worker* 47 reports of those who became Christians last year, from seventeen different congregations. I am confident that there were more than this, but this is something to give us reason to rejoice!

During this past year we said goodbye to at least ten that were reported in the pages of this magazine. Many more, I'm sure, went on to their reward. But even with the losses there would seem to be even more increases. That is good news!

There were four marriages reported this past year, although, again, I am sure there were more than this among the congregations. In addition to this we reported births, anniversaries, and even one who made it to 100 years old (although she went onto her reward last month – see the "Gone Home" on page 7).

When the *Christian Worker* began in 1969, its purpose was to increase communication between congregations, both in the form of news and also ideas for taking the good news of Jesus throughout this country. We are pleased that congregations are continuing to send in news of what is going on in their area of the Kingdom. This past year we had reports sent in from 21 different congregations as well as from 11 other countries. We currently have just over eighty congregations listed in the UK, which means that around 25% are actively communicating through the *CW*. If you have not sent in a report recently, can we ask you to please consider doing so? – if nothing else just to let us know that you are still around and working for the Lord.

We have a New Year ahead of us. Let us plan and pray that this will be a year of growth, both for each of us as Christians, as we learn more from God's word, and for the congregations of which we are a part, as we tell others the good news of Jesus and the hope that we have in him.

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# Where are they now? - Minnie Lagria

Minnie Lagria is another of our outstanding BBS graduates from the Philippines. For several years she worked in medical missions in Namibia, Africa. Whilst there she adopted a little girl called

Ndahafa. Since February 2015 she has been working with a special resettlement village in the Philippines where she heads various programmes and this is her story.

To start with nineteen hectares of land were purchased with funds from two Churches of Christ-led organisations: the

Christian Relief Fund and Helping Hands International. M.A.R.C.H. for Christ, a third organisation, brought order and help (Medical Action, Relief, Counselling, Healing for Christ). These organisations can be viewed on line. The main livelihood

of the area is fishing but after storm Yolanda hit the country in 2013 several of the Bantayan islets were declared red danger zones. At this time several British individuals and congregations sent money for

new fishing boats which were deeply appreciated. But many had lost their homes, livelihoods and culture and now have a chance to relearn and live in a safe environment in the village. As community organiser, Minnie works closely with the people. She ensures the children go to school, which was something that was not a normal part of life for them previously.

Added to this she works with families to keep them free of disease, and develops community and sports facilities. Vegetable gardens are now being developed so that food is grown and life is sustained, but the people are fisher-folk and not farmers.

Teenagers especially need to be trained for work in city life and

some have are now involved in the catering or nursing industries. There is a constant need for greater education. For poor families, whose lives have been decimated, money is sparse and there is a constant need for helping them.



Keeping people healthy is a major concern. TB screening takes place, resulting in some having to go to hospital and sadly some have died. These are traumatic experiences in a devastated

community. However not all is gloom – they have developed sports facilities for volleyball and basketball and are coming up with their

own football pitch. They have a children's train track and they love to dance and sing. This develops their self-confidence.

Minnie works with three preachers and the meeting place is packed on Sundays. They are anxious that the good work done is seen as the work of God and carried out for his glory. As a Christian, Minnie is under no illusion that some people are immersed because they are being helped and not because they have dedicated their lives to Jesus. Bible studies are being constantly

held and the congregation's facilities are in constant use. She says, "The work is humongous! Being in mission work is like getting into a fruit blender. You get in and you will be shaken, purged, all energy extracted, and we see what we are truly made of. There is nothing that can describe our work aptly. Nothing."

### Mary Cox

1916-2016

We are saddened to report the death of Mary Cox. Mary had reached the age of 100 yrs on 10<sup>th</sup> July and yet she was present at worship each week – in fact, she was last present on 27<sup>th</sup> November.

Mary attended the congregation in Ulverston from the age of seven. She was immersed into Christ when she was 13 years old. She was a Sunday School teacher and enjoyed singing hymns. She served as treasurer, part-time secretary and was the mainstay of fellowship meals.



Her funeral was on the 16<sup>th</sup> December in the Ulverston meeting place, a building she had helped to construct and maintain. There wasn't much planning needed for the funeral as she had left instructions: on the hymns she wanted (four hymns), two Bible readings (Ecclesiastes 1 and Psalm 139), and Bill Thistlethwaite to speak at the service.

There were about 70 people in attendance, of which 25 were her 'family' – her nieces and their children. Some were expecting more, but as one person commented, Mary had probably out-lived most of her friends.

Lungster Motha

**France:** Our family have just returned from a three-month mission trip with the intention of helping refugees. We spent two months working in Calais and a month with the Christians in

Vienna. We are very grateful for the love and support of our brethren in the UK.

During our time in France, we worked in "The Jungle," an unofficial refugee camp in Calais. Craig worked alongside The Tea Van (who provide

free tea, coffee and biscuits), as well as a pop-up seating area to play board games, ukuleles or just chat with the volunteers. The refugees come to know the love of Christ through subtle conversations with volunteers.

Crystal volunteered at the Women and Children's Centre and The School Bus project in the camp. Both were repurposed double decker buses that provided a safe

place for learning and playing. Many of the children were traumatised and this would show up in different ways. It was good that there were places which created a more positive atmosphere and that taught them to deal with their frustration/anger. We saw huge improvements in their behaviour through care and attention, and they once again had a chance to be just children.

When we were planning our mission trip we did not know about the planned demolition of "The Jungle" until we arrived. During the eviction we helped out in the Help Refugees charity warehouse. We then moved on to Vienna.

The congregation in Vienna are about fifteen Christians and mainly German speaking. Over the past year and a half, they have helped in the refugee camp in

Traiskirchen (20 km outside of Vienna) and have seen a tremendous response. They have an English worship service where Nigerian refugees are eager to hear the Good News and excited about owning their own Bible.

# The Final Word: "Vision"



"Where there is no vision the people perish." (Proverbs 28:18)

I do not often use the Authorised Version of scripture, as there are too many mistranslations or non-translated words in it for my liking. However, I do like the phrase quoted above. Other translations use 'revelation' for vision.

Today we use vision quite often in our  $21^{\rm st}$  century language; television, vision for eyes, for all of our technology. We also need to

have 'church vision'. We have all the instructions and guidelines in scripture that we will ever need, praise God for His goodness. Now let's put it into practise.

Does your congregation have a vision for 2017? Is it the same as 2016? Could it possibly have something new? When putting out some cups at one congregation I was helping, I was told they did not do it the way that I was doing it. My inner man said, "Do it yourself then." My outer man smiled and did it the way they wanted as the last thing I wanted to do was cause offence. Now if we can be so picky over putting cups out for tea how is it that we can let weightier matters of the power of the gospel slide to one side?

I am hoping that many congregations have plans for this year and the next few years. Vision is for those who want to see, but there are none as blind as those who do not want to see. Make your congregation one with vision, looking to see the impossible and making it, by the power of God, into the possible. Let us know your plans and hopes. We can work with each other, support each other and pray for each other.
