He was speaking about the need for growth and emphasised what healthy Christians and congregations look like. Although many did not get to hear him while he was here, we hope his thoughts will be an encouragement to us all.

The plans many congregations have made are reflected in our 'Diary' this month – as you will see, there are two full pages of activities that are planned throughout the length and breadth of the country. Some of these are outreach events while others are designed to help us grow as Christians. Many years ago Christians were known for supporting each other's activities. We need to get back to doing that, because we are all in this together. Look through the list of what is happening and determine to support what we can. Let's be an encouragement to each other this year.

# Spotlight: Congregation planning

As an old year ends and a new one begins, many congregations begin to plan their work for another year. As Trevor pointed out in his "Final Word" last month, the need to plan is vital, not only for one year but for the next few years.

Having a plan for where we want to be next year, in five years, and in ten years helps us to focus on what we should be doing together as Christians to see the good news of Jesus taken throughout our various communities as well as to plan for spiritual growth among Christians. If we want to reach the point where

congregations have an organised
Biblical leadership we need to plan for this to happen – it won't happen by accident! Even if we want to individually grow to be more like Jesus this year, we have to make personal plans and invest time in God's

word so that we can grow.

Several congregations have taken up Trevor's suggestion from last month: "Let us know your plans and hopes. We can work with each other, support each other and pray for each other." We have published some of these as our 'Spotlight' section this month. We hope that this will stimulate others to think about what they can do for the Lord this year. As you make plans, let us know about them and we will include them in a future issue of the *Christian Worker*.

Eastwood: We have been planning our outreach meetings on a particular pattern since 2006. The aim, as with all Gospel outreach work of all those who engage in such work, is to reach people looking into what life is all about, who Jesus is, what sin is, why we need Jesus, what is salvation and all things related to the good news of Jesus.

Our meetings in the format that we have adopted are generally well received by a mix of visitors from various backgrounds. Our visitors are not by any means just those from other congregations, but over the years we have had many people from

different religious backgrounds represented one way or another.

The general format has a good mix of both old and modern hymns, Bible readings to support the lesson and

prayers throughout the evening. The meeting is preceded by a time of welcome and refreshment at 6.00 pm, including snacks and drinks, which lasts for about an hour. This provides an opportunity for people of mixed backgrounds, people that in many cases have quite differing views, to meet together in a friendly, welcoming environment to hear the word of God. Very often the meetings, including the welcome and refreshments, will extend up to three hours with many staying to discuss aspects of the lesson or other issues arising from the discussion whilst participating in a



further time of refreshments. We usually have attendances in the region of 35-50.

size double sided full colour leaflets printed, which are distributed around the area one week before the meeting. We also print 25 A4-size posters, which are are put up in local shops, homes and cars. We put up two A2-size posters and display these outside our building. This is all backed up by the prayers of the congregation, both individually and collectively.

For 2017 we are reverting back to a lesson style that we used in the past, where the

lesson is presented in two parts, the first usually being the inquiry and the second being the response. In some cases we are planning to have two shorter lessons by two different speakers, whilst in others just one speaker dealing with both parts.

The overall theme for 2017 is "Jesus the Saviour." The four evening lessons will be "Jesus the Creator" (February); "Jesus the Forgiver" (May); "Jesus the Messiah" (August); and "Jesus: Prophet,"

Priest and King" (November). The details and breakdown of these lessons are listed in the 'Diary'.

Come along and support these evenings if you can. You will be warmly welcomed.

# Christian Growth and Challenges

If our children are not growing, we are naturally concerned. When Christians are not growing spiritually, we may feel a similar concern. The right reaction to a lack of growth in a child would not be to put the child on steroids but to check the child's diet and overall health. So it is with Christians. Congregations are not growing, in the Western world at least. Some of the problem may have to do with factors beyond our control. But some of the lack of growth may be caused by problems with the overall health and the diet of the Christian.

Realising we cannot prescribe some spiritual steroids that will bring instant spiritual growth, it would be more useful to consider some spiritual health issues that may be holding back our growth.

When a group of Christians seem to be relying too much on themselves – their plans, their programmes, their perseverance – they are not bringing glory to the Lord. Christians with a weak prayer life, whatever their good qualities, will not point people to Jesus. Rather than seeking a magic programme that will cause us to grow, we need to be praying more often and more fervently.

And let us enter into these prayers not as a means of controlling the Lord and forcing him to grant us growth. Let us pray humbly, submitting to his will and his timing.

Christians that are spiritually healthy are active and

effective in praising their Lord. Our primary reason for praising is that the Lord is indeed worthy of praise. But praise often has an effective, although often overlooked, sidebenefit. Praise is often an aid to evangelism (Psalm 35:18; 40:9-10; 68:26). Therefore we must never bring our second-best efforts to the work or worship of the Lord. If we show up to work on time, we ought to show up to worship on time. We ought to prepare for worship as we would prepare for an important client at work. Our best effort, in every respect, ought to go into our worship. Otherwise our worship dishonours rather than honours our Lord.

Spiritually healthy Christians are also active in proclaiming the gospel. The gospel is not a new law that we have to keep that replaces the old law that the Jews were supposed to keep. The gospel is good news to proclaim, not a new law to enforce. The heart of the gospel is what Jesus did in his death, burial and resurrection. To present the gospel we must speak of Jesus crucified (1 Corinthians 2:2). The matters of first importance in the gospel are Jesus' death, burial and resurrection (1 Corinthians 15:1-4). Yet,

while the gospel is primarily the proclamation of the death and resurrection of Jesus, there is something that needs to be obeyed (2 Thessalonians 1:8). There is a response that is needed.

If we take care of the spiritual health of Christians, growth will come if it is God's will.



## Around the World

**Philippines:** It was a nostalgic trip to the north from 2<sup>nd</sup>-5<sup>th</sup> January. Tuao holds a special place in my heart. Eleven years ago, I helped organise a medical mission in a remote village in East Tuao called Taribubu. A Filipino maid in Singapore,

Mildred, dreamt of having a congregation in her hometown once she retired from her overseas job. God heard her prayer. Taribubu has since then been blessed with faithful evangelists and a thriving congregation. The congregation grew both in number and in spirit. Then came Super Typhoon Lawin (international name: Haima) which struck

eleven weeks ago and destroyed many houses as well as properties and crops in five provinces in the North. Tuao was one of the worst hit areas. Many of the Christian's homes were damaged including the congregation's chapel.

Last week, my small team of three went back to Tuao. Dr Evelyn is a physician working for the National Bureau of Investigation while Orlan, a nurse, serves as an evangelist in Isabela. Dr Eve and I made the eighthour bus ride to Santiago, met Orlan and his family in their home, and traveled three more hours to Tuao. When we



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arrived, we went to visit a family in San Luis. A few women and children were already waiting for us.

Maribel, 9 years old, is an epileptic. She is the size of a three-year old child, a frail and sad looking little girl. She is obviously undernourished. We will care for her by providing nutritious food to restore her back to good health. Ouite a number of

children there are under-nourished and a bit too small for their age. We will need a regular feeding programme for them which will also be great for the congregation to build relationships with their neighbours.

More than 100 women and children were seen and visited. Two of our outstanding cases were that of an elderly woman with a huge lump (goiter) on her neck. She will

need to have that removed through surgery. Another elderly woman suffered from acute psoriasis. Both her feet are also badly infected. It will be a long, painful process to heal her but it can be done.

On our last day, we went to visit another

remote village called Iguig. We went from house-to-house visiting those from the congregation who were affected by the typhoon. It was heartbreaking to listen to their stories of how they survived the strong winds and rains the day that Haima struck. Thankfully, there were no

> casualties, although their tiny worship area was heavily damaged.

Most people in the north are farmers. With their source of livelihood destroyed, it was encouraging to see their determination to survive. With what little they have

left, they offered warm hospitality to us. This trip was such a blessing!

Thank you for your kindness in helping me to serve the Lord in this way. There still is so much need there. Many of the remote villages are without any form of help from anyone including the local government. Lord willing, I hope to go back in a month or so and plan to spend time focusing more on the

needs of the children.

As I write, the Bicol region in the south also needs our help. Another typhoon struck on Christmas day. My mother's family is from that region. While I realise that we cannot help

everybody, we can make a difference on some people's lives. I pray that help may be available to them, too.

# The Final Word: "A Better Way"



"But I want to lay out a far better way for you." (1 Corinthians 12:31 MSG)

The Christian dedicates themselves to Christ only to slip back one way or another. To worship systematically week after week, year after year, lesson after lesson, sermon after sermon, seeing the same people, same place, same singing can be a drain on the most spiritual of us. Love has to be constantly renewed, constantly thrilled, constantly looking forward. The love that Jesus has for his people is constant, the blood shed on the cross of Calvary is still red and the cries of the Saviour still shout out: "For you I die, for you I live, for you I love." Whatever our personal feelings are about the state of politics let us all find the way that is far better for everyone of us.
