Harding Chorus encourages through singing

The Harding University Chorus, under the direction of Dr Cliff Ganus, returned to the UK as part of their European tour during May. It was a joy to renew acquaintances as well as to hear a group sing so well. We are including several reports this month from congregations who were able to host them.

Northampton: It was our privilege to host 33 people from Harding University from Friday to Sunday, 19th-21st May.

On Saturday the group provided a real treat for the shoppers and tradespeople in town through a "flashmob". Two singers of choir stalls, along with another couple of songs that were very special – the harmony and the words were beautiful.

On Saturday evening the concert was hosted and appreciated by all who attended. It was good to have some visitors from other congregations, from the locality and some former members. Our prayer is that as we have been encouraged this might be the moment for faith to return to those who have been away.

Our Sunday morning worship had the extra dimension of so many more being present to

Starting quietly the full chorus together attracted a large crowd of appreciative bystanders. We passed out over 400 invitations to a concert to be held that night. They repeated this at the other end of the shopping centre. One of the security men said they had choirs sing there before but "it was nothing like this, they have raised the standard."

In the afternoon the group were taken to the town of Olney and sang in the Church of St. Peter and St. Paul's. This is where John Newton was serving when he wrote the hymn "Amazing Grace." The group sang a wonderful version of the hymn from the last Sunday with us and an opportunity for those who could not get to the other occasions to be encouraged by the singing.

This was an encouraging weekend for the congregation as we worked together to host the group and reach out to the community. The effect of the group being here will go on for a long time and we trust will even reap a harvest. We are thankful to them for their dedication and willingness to travel here to help. There are videos of the Chorus singing on our Facebook and Twitter pages – please take a look, like them and share them. **Stapleford**: The Harding University Chorus conducted a one-night concert with us on Monday, 22nd May. The venue was St. Helen's parish church in Stapleford, and it was standing-room only on the evening. It is estimated that the chorus sang to a packed building of around 230 and received a standing ovation at the conclusion of the evening. Anyone who has ever heard this Chorus will know of the quality of their singing. The Chorus always gives out everything it has in the form of a top-quality performance. Those present that evening experienced something they had never experienced before. Several commented on said they would be delighted if the concert was held in their building. The people at St. Helen's were very gracious towards us in all of the planning and on the night, serving coffee and tea at the interval with biscuits and homemade cakes – at no charge! Most gladly gave voluntary donations. No charge was made for the use of the building or their facilities.

We also spoke with the leaders of all of the churches in Stapleford and they, too, were enthusiastic. They put up posters advertising the concert on their notice boards, advertised it in their newsletters and spread the word as much as they could. Likewise,

an amazing night – and for free! They couldn't believe it! I have received phone calls days afterwards from people whom I don't know thanking us for such a wonderful evening. We genuinely believe



most of them came up to me afterwards saying they wanted to thank the church for offering this evening to their people.

God alone knows the good that this has done in our community, but we

that if we had extended their stay with us another night, we would have required a building twice the size of St. Helen's.

From the start our desire was for this to be a concert for Stapleford. We knew that we could have easily filled a much smaller venue with our own congregation and their friends and those from surrounding congregations, but we wanted the people of Stapleford to experience this (85% of those present were not from churches of Christ). For this reason, we chose St. Helen's as the place for this to occur, not sure if the local vicar would agree. I approached him earlier this year, and he believe it to be great. It has caused many to take notice of our presence in the community – and in a positive light. All of this, we hope, is to the glory of our Lord. We thank Dr. Cliff Ganus for the good work he does in training these young Christians to use their talents in this way. He has been a good friend to the Christians in Great Britain for several decades, and we pray God's blessings on him will continue. We thank every one of the members of the Chorus for their talents which were so wonderfully displayed on that evening. Their example was an encouragement to all of us.

British Bible School Notes

When studying that ancient document known as "Hebrews" we have to keep asking for explanations. I almost called it the "Letter" to the Hebrews, but is it? While there are some personal comments at the end of chapter thirteen that are just what we would expect in a letter, the opening chapter cuts straight to the chase with no greeting and no indication that it is intended to be read as a letter. Rightly it has been said that Hebrews starts like a

lecture and ends like a letter. Even "Hebrews" means different things to different readers. In the context of this book it is most likely designating Christians from a Hebrew background and certainly the content of the book bears this out with its numerous references to Jewish history and faith.

We find Hebrews in with the New Testament letters in the canon although this

arrangement is not inspired. The twentyseven books are grouped with narrative first (Gospels and Acts) followed by letters from Paul to congregations (Romans to Thessalonians) and then to people (Timothy to Philemon). Hebrews comes next followed by letters from James, Peter, John, and Jude. Hebrews is *to* the Hebrews and not from them so we can see why it is grouped with the letters to, although this has led some to conclude that Hebrews, like Romans to Philemon, must be from Paul. If it is by Paul then it is unlike all of his other letters in not bearing his name

very early in the text and also the content is unlike anything Paul ever wrote. This can, of course, be explained by the nature of the book. The author is writing to a specific congregation with its own peculiar problems so it is only natural that the content sounds different but, whether we favour Paul as author or not, we have to admit that the book is anonymous and whenever an author opts for anonymity we have to respect the fact that we cannot

> know with any certainty who wrote it. Not that this has stopped people trying.

Teachers distinguish between Need to Know and Nice to Know. The Need to Know material is that which has to be taught and understood if the learner is to make sense of the subject; Nice to Know is just that – nice but not necessary. So while it would be nice to know who wrote Hebrews the plain fact is

that we cannot and never

will know as the information is not there. However what we need to know most certainly is. If we start at verse one and read through to the end of chapter thirteen we will see how Jesus is superior to the entire Old Testament from Patriarchs to Prophets and indeed how He is superior even to the angels. Now that is something worth knowing.
