Spotlight: Congregations join together

For the past seventeen years, congregations in the west of Scotland have been holding a joint outreach meetings involving three congregations. Initially these were the Clydebank, Stirling and East Kilbride congregations.

Later the Cumbernauld congregation became involved and more recently the three have been the Lomond, Clarkston and East Kilbride congregations.



The idea behind joining together was that three congregations committed to supporting each of the three nights would produce a good environment to bring our friends to as well as to help promote harmony amongst the congregations involved. Until this year, each congregation would host one night of the three-night weekend series of lessons. Also, by pooling our resources we could bring in speakers that might otherwise be prohibitive due to travel cost for one congregation to do by itself. We were able to bring in some speakers from the USA including Mack Lyon, Gene West and Dan Chambers. Speakers from the UK have included Joe Nisbet, Michael Gaunt, Ian Starrs and Mitch Vick.



This year our speaker was Nick Wilson from Hyvots Bank. He had spoken in the past for all three congregations and we felt that he would present encouraging lessons for those who attended. Although the Christians at Lomond did not feel they were able to host one of the meetings, they were committed to supporting these outreach events.

On Friday night we gathered at the East Kilbride meeting place. 32 Christians were able to come along. Nick's lesson was interesting and relevant and a good time of fellowship was enjoyed by those who were there.

Saturday evening the meeting was at the Duff Memorial Hall in Busby where the Clarkston congregation meet each week. 37 were able to meet together for another good evening of fellowship and encouragement.

This year, for the first time, we decided it would be good to host a joint Sunday morning meeting as well. What better way to proclaim our unity in Jesus than to break bread together? This year the East Kilbride and Lomond congregations joined the congregation at Clarkston for their morning worship. It was wonderful to see

62 Christians meeting together to break bread and spend time around God's word. Following the worship there was a time of fellowship with coffee, tea, and various home-bakes, so that all could enjoy more time together.

All-in-all, it was an uplifting weekend of fellowship with one another and around God's word. We look forward to doing this again next year!

We would encourage congregations that are in reasonably close proximity to consider having similar meetings. The attendance boost is encouraging. Being with Christians you don't normally get to spend time with is good for all. And it does send out a very positive message – these are Christians that are serious about working together for Jesus.

Devotional Thought: "Forty years passed"

The clocks of heaven do not seem to tick as the clocks on earth. We want what we want now. To have to wait another five minutes in a queue is just too long. We want to cross the world faster than we have done so before. We hurry our children to be more skilled, more grown up than their peer group, and we want to retire earlier than anyone else we know. The only thing we don't want to come quickly is the time of our death. Even then, by some social calculating, we decide if it is too soon or even too late.

How many of us have cried, "God give me patience and give it to me now"? Everything has to be instant for us and we hate to wait. Life's successes cannot come fast enough, the problem is the race to any success must last long enough for it to be of value. No pain equals no gain.

The Hebrews of old had to wait 40 years from the time they left Egypt to start to move into the land they could call their own (read Deuteronomy 2). We wonder how many days the people must have grumbled about this. Camping may be fun

for a while but not for years on end. Many fail to ask the question, "why did all of this have to go on?" Let scripture answer itself. The generation of fighting men that had left Egypt would not be entitled to see the Promised Land because of their unfaithfulness. God was patient even if the Hebrews were not.

So what has this to do with us? Do we leave unfaithfulness hanging around our necks so that we cannot attain our spiritual goals? Many who have given their lives to Christ may still be held back by the foolishness of decades, even 38 years. (Editors' note: we decided to publish Lungster's report 'as is.' We hope you found it both informative and enjoyable. Lungster is a British Bible School graduate.)

New Zealand: I don't know whether you heard news of the earthquakes we have recently had in New Zealand. They have mostly been centred in North Canterbury in the north east of the South Island, but many have been felt in Wellington and other parts of the country. I certainly felt the first big earthquake just after midnight the Monday before last and the first aftershock, but not many of the aftershocks which have continued since. There were two deaths with the first one and some injuries. As far as I am aware all the Christians affected by the quakes are safe with little damage. Our church building got through the earthquake safely too, with just

a few things falling off shelves. I certainly got through unscathed and felt quite secure in the retirement village where I live, knowing it was built to high earthquake resilience standards, and that there were



people nearby should I need help, which I haven't.

The main area of damage has been the east coast road and rail routes and

the town of Kaikoura which has been cut off because of the damage to the transport routes. This is very difficult for them as they depend on tourism (whale and seal watching, surfing and walking in nearby countryside) and the export of seafood for their income.

Wellington once again got through without too much damage. The central business district was closed down for Monday and Tuesday while they checked for external damage which could be dangerous for traffic and pedestrians,



with some areas being cordoned off until they were made safe. The National Library building was closed while being checked by structural engineers (as most other buildings are being done) and was considered safe to return to as it should have been, being built to high earthquake resilience standards, and upgraded during refurbishment in 2009-2012. There were areas where books and periodicals had come off shelves, and some computer screens had fallen over which was hardly surprising considering the length of the quake and the rolling motion. The reopening of the building was delayed because of concerns regarding the safety of two neighbouring buildings but these were cordoned off allowing safe access for staff and we reopened for staff only on Monday. We should be ready to resume services to the public next Monday.

We have been warned to expect further aftershocks including one at least the same size as the initial one, possibly even larger. We have all been reminded to ensure we are prepared with essential emergency food and water supplies, and a 'get-away' bag in case we have to evacuate at short

notice. Of course we have absolutely no idea of when such an event might occur, which certainly reminds me of the necessity of being ready for Christ's return at any time.

Anyway I am fine, keeping well and doing what I can now.

Greece (Athens): Summer at Omonia went by very fast. We are thankful to God for having poured His rich blessings over his people once again, through a number of gracious "good news" to our soul-winning efforts. We rejoice as we have been happily surprised with what God has done to souls opened up to the gospel of hope and true salvation during the last four months.

Eleni met the first refugees in Mytilini, the capital city of the island of Lesbos, where she visited as a volunteer, right where the rubber boats arrived daily from Turkey. Later, as some refugees over at the Omonia Square asked her street and bus service information, they were invited to the church building. By word of mouth, more and more refugees joined. They had heard of God's ministry at Omonia, even "while riding the bus", they said. What is really of importance is not the offering of food or clothing service. Anyone can offer a salad and a piece of chicken, a sumptuous pasta plate, a rich soup, a dessert and a cup of tea and cookies. It is so easy! What matters is exactly what we sing about in the hymn "They'll Know We Are Christians..." It is the psychological support to those who

have escaped death – physical and spiritual alike. It is the love of God that never ceases, a story repeated every day, a story of people who care to serve, because Jesus showed the way!

On Tuesdays and Thursdays the Omonia church facility is packed with families and singles who enjoy a time of peace (and free fast Internet), a place far from the noisy camp; a place where love abounds, a place where past heartaches and experiences are shared, understood in love and healed

through prayer. This is something altogether different from the clothes being offered and the hearty meal menus, right from Eleni’s cooking team.

There have been cases during these two weekly “community days” that one



hundred thirty-five souls showed up. Before every community meal, there is a 30-minute Bible lesson on God’s provision through history (Abraham, David, Joseph, Daniel, Job), translated into Arabic and Farsi (Dari – the language spoken in Afghanistan). The session is then completed through in these languages.

During Sundays we have an average of thirty-plus refugees who attend both our Bible study and worship. Eleven of them have happily surrendered their life to Jesus through baptism.

They proclaim Jesus boldly, as they now partake of the symbols of the Lord’s Supper – living examples of faith before the eyes of their fellow refugees! Very bold of them! God at work!

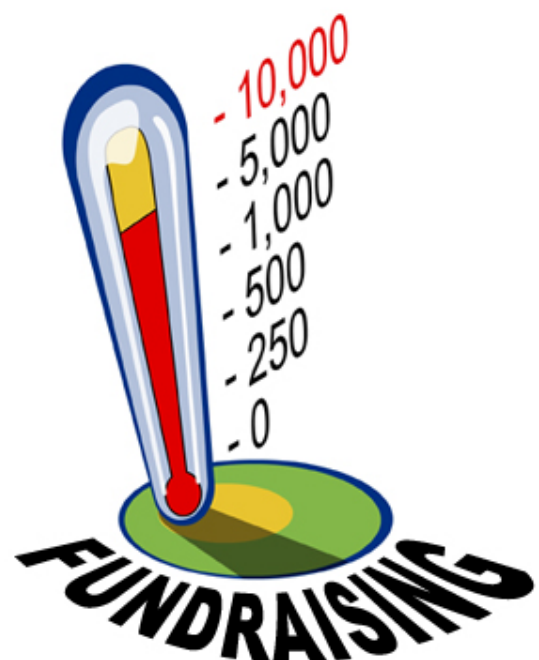

The Final Word: "The Thrill of Jesus' Birth"



I love Christmas – not necessarily all the hype – but I love the food, time with my family, concerts, the food (did I mention that?!). But most of all I love looking at my Bible and remembering the thrill of reading about the birth of Jesus. It starts right there in Matthew 1 with all those long names. This may be boring to some but for me it is exciting. If you notice in the Old Testament, every time there is a list of generations there comes a change in the story – Matthew goes right in and starts a new story the same way his forebearers did.

The first verse just overflows with information, “A record of the genealogy of Jesus Christ the son of David, the son of Abraham.” Jesus’ name means ‘Saviour’ and the Greek word ‘Christ’ is the same as ‘Messiah’ in Hebrew. At last the Messiah, so long awaited had come! But there needed to be proof and what follows is Matthew’s way of dealing with this necessity.

David was the great King. On the death bed of Jacob in we read: “The sceptre will not depart from Judah, nor the ruler's staff from between his feet, until he comes to whom it belongs and the obedience of the nations is his” (Genesis 49:10). This was the prophecy that the kingly line would come through Judah and David was the first king from Judah. The throne of David was to be established for ever (1 Chronicles 14:10). We know through reading the scriptures that the kings stopped ruling in Judah in 586 BC at the fall of Jerusalem. But Matthew gives the genealogy of Jesus to prove that he was a direct descendant and therefore heir to the fulfilment of the prophecy. It is little wonder that the wise men go looking for “the one who has been born king of the Jews.” At the close of his life above the cross was written these words: “This is Jesus, the King of the Jews.”

The second part of verse 1 says that Jesus was the son of Abraham. Again a scripture is fulfilled: “... and all the peoples on earth will be blessed through you” (Genesis 12:3). What Jesus came to do was of universal concern. “But I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all men to myself,” Jesus said (John 12:32). Then, of course, Jesus instructs his followers to go into all the world (Matthew 28:18-20; Mark 16:15-16).

The genealogy continues and in verse 17 we read about three lots of fourteen generations. Our minds immediately say there were therefore 42 generations mentioned, with David being the 14th generation. We do not think in numbers but the numerical number of David is 14. There are only three letters in his name DVD – D has the numeracy of 5, V of 4. It shouts to the Hebrew readers that Jesus is the King in David’s place. Note also the end of verse 16 and verse 17 we find the word Christ (Messiah) – this is Jesus!

Now of course the text about the birth of Jesus continue through chapter 2. We are introduced to dreams and at least four fulfillments of prophecy: 1:23 = Isaiah 7:14; 2:6 = Micah 5:2; 2:15 = Hosea 11:1; and 2:18 = Jeremiah 31:5.

Let me encourage our readers to read through the whole of these two chapters and then go over to Luke 1-3. It is a good exercise to compare and contrast the two passages and draw out the beauty of God becoming flesh and dwelling among us. Then before you eat even more read Philipians 2:6-11 one more time and be amazed.
