# Spotlight: Christians gather in Mainz, Germany

Christian fellowship in A

Arriving from all over the world a little taste of Heaven appeared in the German city of Mainz near Frankfurt. It was in Mainz that Gutenberg printed Bibles for the first time on movable type and in a city centre

museum it was possible to view three copies of those first Bibles.

Over one hundred Christians from across the world gathered to celebrate together the grace and work of God in so many places, the furthest away being Cambodia.

We heard of the work taking place amongst the refugees in Athens, Marseilles, Vienna and Bremen. Here the local Christians are working with those who have no home.

They show tender love for those of different beliefs and backgrounds by feeding and caring for them, endeavouring to be the hands of Jesus to them. Some are fascinated with the gospel message and have surrendered their

lives to the Saviour they previously knew so little about. Khalid from Marseilles told us through interpretation of his story of being a Muslim and promoting that ideology before he met the love of Jesus – he now serves Christ by teaching those from Muslim lands. Father and son team Alfred and Francis shared their story of how they work for Jesus in Cairo, a city of 30 million

people. They have given away thousands of copies of the 'Jesus' DVD and 40,000 copies of the New Testament.

Craig Young from Marseilles brought a group of singers to praise the Lord and thrill us with the sound of their

voices, singing in both French and English. He also brought to our attention those who are of a third culture generation – those who are born in one place and move to be part of a different culture and language

and having to experience other cultures as well.

In the evening the Christians were encouraged with the bold preaching of those from the West Indies who taught the brethren to AMEN somewhat more than the conservative European is used to.

Christians from UK & Ireland

Truitt Adair from Sunset International Bible Institute in Lubbock, Texas, one of the sponsors of this event, told us about the

schools of preaching they try to help all over the world. Bill McDonough, another sponsor, works with Partners-in-Progress serving in five continents. The third sponsor was Bill Colwell from World Bible School, who shared that even in Britain there are people who are studying with them. Here we were encouraged to find ways that people may be reached through mass media; this organisation are even willing to help with the costs. The fourth sponsor was Tom Langley, from World English Institute, who shared the desire of so many people to learn English from all over the world including the British Isles. This should make us realise that even here there is the opportunity of sharing with other people.

Many may think that to be involved in foreign mission work we have to go overseas, but the World has come to our shores and we have a wonderful chance to share with all the nations under Heaven. James Sanderson urged us to get to know the religious leaders in our community and graciously encourage a relationship in which the simple gospel might be shared. So many others spoke and perhaps we shall shall be able to share more in coming months through the *Christian Worker*. There is no doubt that when we meet together in love that the grace of Jesus seems so much stronger.



### Called Home

# Josie Eckman (1927-2017) Stapleford

As no doubt many in the United Kingdom will know, Josie passed from this physical life on Thursday, 7th September following a brief spell in the Royal Derby Hospital. She leaves behind three children, six grandchildren, and eight great-

grandchildren. Born and raised in Liverpool, she

completed what could only be an astonishing life, a life that was lived in faith of her Father and in glory to the Lord. On 23<sup>rd</sup> May of this year she celebrated her 90<sup>th</sup> birthday, and a big party was arranged for her with Mum loving every minute! She had three of her grandchildren (including one from Uganda and another from Australia) with her and six of her eight great-grand-children and close to ninety of her extended family and friends. At that time, no one would have guessed what lay ahead in just a couple of months.

As mentioned, Mum grew up in Liverpool, facing the *Blitz* during World War Two. She and her family were bombed out of three houses, and in spite of the hardships of that time, Mum would say that much good came to her during those years. She met my dad, Clarence Eckman, who was a young American GI stationed at RAF Burtonwood on the outskirts of Liverpool. Dad would always say that it was "love at first sight." Towards the end of the war, they were married and a year later she made (with a child of a few months) the arduous trans-Atlantic trip to America,

leaving in cold winter weather and arriving two weeks later in the heat of Houston, Texas thinking that even hell

couldn't be hotter than

Texas. In her mind, she was leaving her life in the UK behind little knowing that in time God would have other plans! The story doesn't end there.

Mum didn't marry a preacher and she would never have dreamt that most of her life would be spent as a "preacher's wife." But, when Dad began preaching for the Hispanic congregation in Houston, she was right behind him. It wasn't by any stretch of the imagination a glamorous life; for the most part they lived on the proverbial "bread line", but it was Dad's choice and Mum supported him all the way. By this time they had three children (Beryl, Bob, and Jim) with a fourth (Cherry) yet to come. Dad became proficient in the Spanish language, and his work took him all over the southwestern parts of the United States, Mexico, Central America, and South America. Everyone thought that his life lay

Mum was a major part of his work, teaching children's Bible classes. In fact, one of my earliest memories as a very young boy was watching my mother sitting at a table cutting out figures for what was then cutting-edge flannel graph lessons for Sunday School. Mum taught classes such as these for many years, as well as ladies'

in that area of work.

classes. It was also during this time that Mum learned that she was a proficient artist, starting in the world of ceramics before going on to oil painting. Her pictures now hang in the homes of people all over the world! However, the story doesn't end there.

It surprised all of us – including Mum – when Dad came home one evening in 1964 saying that we were all moving to Northern Ireland the following year. Mum was made of what we would call today the "oldfashioned" stuff, believing that wherever Dad's work took him, she would willingly go, no questions asked and no objections made. If it had been Mexico, the jungles of Central America or into South America, Mum would have happily gone with him. In 1965, the family moved to Belfast with a plan of returning to the States five years later. In the end, they extended their time to six years, returning to Houston in 1971. But the story doesn't end there.

In time, Mum and Dad moved to Lubbock where Dad returned to his Hispanic work, teaching (in Spanish) at the Sunset School of Preaching for almost 20 years. By this time, Bob, Beryl, and Cherry were all living in the UK. Bob had married Jean Reilly, Beryl had married Ken Mullan, and Cherry had married John Diggle. Looking to the future, with Jim living in another part of the United States, and three children living overseas, when Dad retired from Sunset, they decided to cross the Atlantic once again, moving to Heanor in Derbyshire in 1993. They became a major part of the new work in Nottingham with Dad preaching from time to time. This also enabled them to make trips back to Belfast to visit the many good friends they still had

there, and for Dad to preach in other congregations in England and Scotland. They especially enjoyed going to Peterhead to meet their dear friends there. Dad left this life in 2002, but the story didn't by any means end there!

In the fifteen years since Dad's death, everyone has had nothing but the greatest admiration for the way in which Mum has coped without him and with life on her own. She was blessed with excellent health and an even healthier faith in God. Many times she has said how much her faith has kept her going, with the belief that God must have had some reason for keeping her here on this earth. One of those reasons was the tremendous inspiration that she was to the Nottingham congregation and to all who met her. She was proud of her Lord and for all that He had done for her and she shared her faith with everyone, even in death. When she was given the diagnosis by the consultant and nursing staff, her response was, "I'm a Christian; I'm not afraid, and if God has greater plans, then that's fine." She inspired this congregation with her faith and was a wonderful example of what being a Christian is all about. Her faith inspired everyone of all ages. Her greatest example was to two young girls, Olivia and Miriam, who always sat next to her every Sunday. One Christian described her as the "queen of the church" such was their love for her.

Will we miss her? Of course we will. But her memory – and especially the memory of her faith – will live on for many years to come. Certainly, in Mum's case, the story didn't end on the 7<sup>th</sup> of September.

The last thing I heard him say was his speaking God's name in blessing on me as I left. Then dinner with his family where everyone laughed till they were sore and then his coming home from a lecture, at the train station he collapsed and died.

Well, what to say? Other than that I loved him, was greatly helped by him and admired as well as liking him I can only say I'm sad but in Christ we're friends forever and the best is yet ahead on that Resurrection Day.

His immediate family? A beloved wife 'lost' a loving husband, children a beloved father, brother and sisters a beloved brother; all deeply saddened but also certainly comforted by Alex's Lord and Saviour who is also theirs.





# The Final Word: "What are we planning for 2018?"



There are eight things you never hear in church:

- 1. It's my turn to sit in the front pew.
- 2. I was so enthralled I did not notice the sermon went on twenty -five minutes longer than usual.
- 3. Personally I find talking about Jesus more enjoyable than golf.
- 4. I volunteer to be a permanent teacher for Sunday School.
- 5. Let's pay our preacher enough so he can save some.
- 6. I love it when we sing hymns that I have never heard before.
- 7. Preacher, we want to send you to a conference in the Bahamas.
- 8. Nothing inspires me and strengthens me like our annual financial planning.

Oh yes, it is that time of the year again. Not Bonfire night nor Christmas parties but planning for action for the next year. Of course, the congregation that does not believe in the guiding of the Holy Spirit will not be interested in praying and planning to gain a greater vision that is larger than themselves. It is not Christians that lead the church but God Himself. The church after all belongs to God though some seem to think it is owned by the members. So what does God want for your congregation next year? You might well say, "Well how should I know?" To which the reply has to be "Did you ask what God wanted?" Ask away and see what the answer may be.

Last year the Ilkeston congregation were given the opportunity to write down on a sheet of paper what they thought would be good for this year, month by month, we then compiled all those thoughts. We took a roll of lining paper and gave space of about two feet (60 cm) for each month. It is nothing fancy: the month name at the top, with a theme for the month (useful for sermon preparation) and events underneath. Some of these events were outreach, some in-reach, some practical, some fun. For the first time we could see a plan that we could work, but next came working the plan. Did we do everything that we planned? Yes and no. Some things were changed or moved to another month, other things came up and some things never happened BUT we had a plan and it was exciting to know that we had things to look forward to, to plan for and to accomplish. We did not have to start saying what are we going to do...or when are we going to...it was on the plan. The plan has been tweaked and developed and it has been worked. We hung the plan along one wall of our chapel so it could be seen by everyone, all the time.

So what ideas do you have? How are your plans for 2018? We believe that God created the world but He must have had some good planning sessions beforehand. There are plenty of passages of scripture that speak of God preparing events – Proverbs 29:18 is worth remembering: "Where there is no vision, the people perish." May God help us to have a vision larger than ourselves.

Grant us vision, grant us wisdom; Grant us grace to know your will; Grant us strength and hope and patience; Grant us ears to hear you calling; Grant us a voice to say "we will". Amen.
