Spotlight: Bible reading for a New Year

The beginning of a new year is an ideal time to begin a new Bible reading plan. Whether we plan to read the entire Bible or just a part of it, consistent, frequent Bible reading needs to be a part of each Christian's plan to grow.

It is sad when people have been Christians for many years, yet they have grown very little if any. This is a problem which Christians have had to deal with in every generation. We see this even in the first few decades after Jesus. *"For though by this time you ought to be teachers, you need someone to teach* start as they read about Adam, Noah, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and Joseph. As they enter *Exodus* the narrative continues with Moses and the Israelites leaving Egypt. But about halfway through *Exodus* they encounter the first laws. And these continue to through *Leviticus*, *Numbers*, and *Deuteronomy*. For a new Christian without a knowledge of what the Bible is about, they usually don't make it this far!

For someone just beginning to read the Bible, I suggest that they begin in *Matthew*, *Mark*, *Luke* and *John*. These books give us a greater understanding of Jesus as we look at

you again the basic principles of the oracles of God" (Hebrews 5:12 ESV). Christians should grow to the point that they can teach others, but sadly too many still do not understand the basics of what we believe.



both what he did and what he taught. If we begin here and concentrate on the books of the New Testament, we are reading about what we should be doing as Christians as we live to reflect Jesus in our lives.

How do we correct this?

There is only one way that we can change this and it has to be done individually. We need to know God's word! The only way we can get to know God's word is to spend time reading and studying it, and then putting it into practice.

When someone has never dealt much with the Bible, it can be rather daunting. For a book, it is quite large. For most beginning to read the Bible they do what seems logical: they start at the beginning. *Genesis* is a good read and they are off to a good This is not to say that reading and studying what we refer to as the Old Testament is not important. It is important because it is necessary to better understand what we find in the writings of the apostles. Although we can learn from *Hebrews* and *Revelation*, we will understand much more if we have spent time in the books of the Law and the prophets. But for a new Christian trying to develop a habit of Bible reading, beginning in the New Testament can be useful.

Some people like to use Bible reading plans. These can be good as they provide a

systematic way to read through the Bible. Some concentrate on sections of scripture while others provide a systematic way to get through all sixty-six books in a year. For those just beginning to read the Bible I would suggest using a plan that does not overload you with long sections but can be done in five to ten minutes each day. As you get used to spending time with God's word you will want to increase this time so you will be able to read more of the text each year.

Let me recommend three types of Bible reading plans.

The first is one that I publish each week for *Forthright* magazine (forthright.net/ biblebytes). The goal in my articles for *Forthright* this year will be to read half the

New Testament in the first half of the year (we began reading through the New Testament in July 2017) and to read roughly 1/4 of the Old Testament in the last half of the year (we will begin in Judges). This plan requires

begin in Judges). This plan requires reading 30-45 verses per day and I provide an article each Friday which covers something in one of the chapters for the next week. This requires reading five to ten minutes each day. There are other reading plans on <u>biblegateway.com</u> and other Bible study websites.

For the more advanced reader you may want to attempt reading the entire Bible in a year. There are various plans that can be found on the Bible study websites that organise your readings to allow you to complete the entire Bible. Some read through the Old Testament and then the New, while others have readings from both sections each day.

A third type of plan concentrates on reading a book of the Bible in one sitting each week (some weeks have several books combined). This allows the reader to better see the message of an entire book or letter and how they fit together. To learn more about this type of Bible reading see <u>www.desiringgod.org/articles/three-tipsfor-better-bible-reading</u> and <u>www.radicallychristian.com/a-new-sort-ofbible-reading-plan</u>. Although I have read some of the apostles' letters in one sitting, I have never read each book of the Bible this

> way, so I am looking forward to doing this.

However you choose to read through God's word, the important part is to begin. Choose a reading plan and begin reading! This time next year

you will have grown in your knowledge of God's word and in your knowledge of Jesus. As you learn more about Jesus you will be able to be more like him in your daily living.

"But grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. To him be the glory both now and to the day of eternity. Amen." (2 Peter 3:18)

Your five a day

When we encountered Jesus of Nazareth, we were called to deny ourselves, daily take up the cross we are given to bear and follow him. It was a call to discipleship - to a way of life radically different from that of the world in which we are living. Somewhere down the line we might have been tempted to make do with simply being members of a church, whatever that might mean, but the call to discipleship is as radical today as it was when first given by Galilee.

This disciplined life to which we have been called does not come to us naturally. That is not to say that it is in any way burdensome, but it does require effort and deliberate action on our part. As we follow in the steps of Jesus, we too will learn from him to set aside time away from the crowds to devote ourselves to prayer and meditation on the word of life.

I suspect that not many of us were instructed in the art of

setting for ourselves daily times of prayer, as had been the practice of many who went before us. Though we have likely heard the instruction to "pray without ceasing", we hardly expect our lives to be lived perpetually in the proverbial closet. However, if we are going to take the call of Christ seriously, we will need to regularly shut ourselves away in our closets to devote ourselves to prayer and meditation.

Whether we decide to set aside three times of prayer each day, as seems to have been the practice of our forefathers in the faith, or decide to adopt some other discipline, these 'alone' times are the valuable moments we look forward to each day that we plan to spend with our loving Father. We understand the importance of making time for our earthly relationships, so it makes sense for us to do the same to nurture our friendship with God.

Let me share with you something I discovered a little while ago that I have found useful in my daily devotions. Though I have written prayers to guide me in my conversation with my loving

> Father, I had not forgotten that God has himself given us a book of prayers to help us develop our relationship with him. I had already planned to read a psalm or two during each of my daily 'alone' times with God even though it didn't and doesn't always work out that way.

The discovery was an App called "Five Psalms" and it does exactly what it says on the tin. Each day one is given five Psalms to read so that by the end of the month one should have read through the entire book of 150 Psalms. And the

same again each month. Of course, you could adopt the Benedictine practice of reading them all each week - or the daily trudge of some Coptics - but once a month works well for most of us lesser mortals! I'm sure those who use mobile devices will have no trouble finding it.

Whatever discipline works well for you, may God enrich our lives daily in the service of Jesus, through the word of his life.

You. Sharing Jesus.

In the December 2017 Christian Worker, I wrote about World Bible School "Connect", a tool designed to help congregations share the Gospel message with seekers in their local community. This month I want to address an equally important topic; how

vou can assist WBS students who are ready to obey the Gospel or who desire face-to-face Bible study.

Every month, WBS teachers refer thousands of seekers to us for follow-

up. These referrals are people who have been introduced to the Gospel using WBS online or printed lessons. They are eager to meet a Christian for face-to-face Bible study, to worship with believers or to obey the Gospel in baptism. When we receive these requests, we attempt to match each seeker with a nearby Christian who can help them.

The process for successful WBS follow-up works like this: When a WBS teacher submits a follow-up request through the WBS website, that request is communicated to follow-up partners (FUP) in that student's country. A FUP who is

near the student will then 'adopt' that follow-up request, contact/assist the student and report the results of their follow-up efforts back to the WBS teacher on the WBS website.

Follow-up partners provide an invaluable

service as they help seekers who want to know Jesus. Unfortunately, we sometimes can't pair a SCHOOL seeker with a FUP because we don't know of Christian contacts in their specific location. As a result, we


> are always looking for new FUPs to perform this vital work.



The Final Word: "Jesus loves you"



It is so much easier to read the Bible than to apply it to our own lives. We can read and know what it says but to apply it to every day for the rest of our lives is difficult even for the most faithful of Christians. Our thinking and thought patterns change with changing years, sometimes this is good and sometimes not so good. Fifty years ago homosexuality was decriminalised and in my ignorance I had never even thought of it being illegal or legal. I needed to begin thinking about how this could affect us as Christians.

Our world is now very different. In most western societies homosexuality is acceptable and it almost seems as if it should be the norm rather than the exception. We are now faced with transgenderism also as a norm. As far as marriage is concerned the norm for marriage has been set out, one man for one woman for as long as they both shall live. It is easy to say 'God hates divorce' (Malachi 2:1). But it is not for the benefit of God that this is written but the benefit of those in marriage and going through hard times. Not everyone is the same and marriage can be difficult. For some being married for twenty years would be horrific. Indeed as the years roll on people do change physically, mentally and spiritually. For some, every day is a balancing act of working through the day and trying to hold on to those around them or to Jesus. Then the balancing act drives them to look elsewhere and disaster becomes all too evident.

One thing is certain: a 'gay' person is anything but gay; they will have been hurt, humiliated and humbled trying to find who they are and what they are. The transgender will also have felt trapped, disorganised and frightened. The divorcee can also feel ashamed, betrayed and broken. The list goes on. What of those who feel that they should have married but did not? Emotions can be high as they see others in a relationship they cannot have. Life and our needs can be worlds apart.

As far as society is concerned everyone is given a choice of what to do, to think and to act as the individual wishes. Ultimately society says you can do what society says according to the thinking of the day. There are unwritten codes and manmade opinions that are still in force. Society says it is fine for teenagers to be involved in sexual activity or to dispose of an unwanted unborn baby or to play with drugs. The result has to be that as long as the teen turns out to be a hard working citizen they should have no regrets. Do what you want and leave it all behind cry out the people. But society does not feel the heart break or the tears or the memory of failure.

The reason for Jesus' birth was to show that HE can heal the broken-hearted and be the light in the dark place of our souls. Organised religion was ousted on the day of Jesus' birth and Christians must not build those shaky walls again with tradition. The teaching of scripture speaks about the frailty of our desires and shows us the face of Jesus. His sacrifice brings us life and his salvation brings our renewal. Problems do not go away either by ignoring them or by acknowledging they exist but by allowing Jesus to overshadow us. 'Therefore if anyone is in Christ he is a new creation; the old has gone the new has come!' (2 Corinthians 5:17). It is my belief that Jesus loves those who struggle with their sexuality, or those who feel different or those who may think differently to others. The gospel is for everyone, absolutely everyone. It is Jesus who offers salvation freely by grace, covered with mercy. And this applies to everyone, whoever they are.
