### Moving forward and looking back...

This edition of *The Christian Worker Magazine* marks five years that Trevor and I have been working together in this endeavour. It has been a very successful partnership as Trevor handles the articles and news items that are sent in and I try to present them in a way that is appealing – and we both encourage Christians and congregations to send in news and information.

With this edition we also unveil a new look for the magazine. With it being made available as a printed magazine, we felt that an overhaul could be useful to improve the overall look.

You will notice several changes. We have a new masthead, designed by Kevin Nicolson from the Mandeville Road congregation in Aylesbury. We are very thankful for his efforts and also suppling it in several colours so it can be used on varying backgrounds.

The congregation advertisements will be used throughout the magazine rather than all being at the back (although in this issue they all ended up in the back). This should make for a better use of space and layout. Please send any adverts in a 'portrait' rather than a 'landscape' format (otherwise we may need to truncate it). We sometimes receive adverts for local events (gospel meetings) – if there is space we can include these but priority goes to those of a more national interest.

This month's "From the Archives" article is about a photograph that I found looking through bound copies of *The Bible Advocate*. It was my pleasure this past year to acquire part of Andrew

Gardiner's library, and in particular his collection of bound volumes of magazines published in the UK in the 1800s. I have enjoyed skimming through them as I shelved them – and that is how I happened across this photograph, published in the first issue of *The Bible Advocate* of 1907 (at that time it was a weekly publication).

I have reproduced the photograph and part of the article that accompanied it. The article gives a brief summary of these ten men who we would regard as leaders from the congregations in the United Kingdom in the late 1850s.

The Bible Advocate did not publish the name of the editor. As you can discover by reading the article, the original editor was David King. From the best I can tell, when he died in 1894 the next editor was Lancelot Oliver.

It is my hope over the next few years to be able to read through many of these magazines and develop a series of lessons on the history of the British congregations, particularly in 1800s and into the middle of the 1900s.

Many mistakenly assume that the British congregations were begun by Americans from what many call "the Stone-Campbell Movement". A careful study shows that the congregations in the United Kingdom resulted from a different background and had a different beginning – and even predates Stone and Campbell! The history of the Lord's people in this country is worth exploring.

All the kids had a wonderful time. The weather was excellent (always a bonus in Scotland!) and the day trip to Largs was a great day out. Our kitchen staff did an outstanding job keeping us filled to the gunnels. The last night saw the traditional talent show to finish off the week.

We ended up finding one just down the road, a lovely woodland Scout site with multiple buildings. Its different, its exciting and it worked well to provide us with a venue to work towards what have always been the two aims of camp: 1. Glorify God. 2. Make sure the children have fun. Thanks go to Jason and Debbie Hill for their work in securing the site, and their governance of the administration that comes with running a camp. Thanks also need to go to Simon Hardy, for his multiple roles in the running of camp, ranging from being the initial driving impetus to get the camp running again after its interregnum, encouraging so many campers to come along, serving as our resident peeling machine, dishwasher and even on one occasion as our ambulance.

Thursday was Micah and selected Psalms, looking at how half-hearted faith expressed for the sake of others is

meaningless, and that heartfelt, earnest service is what is required of us, as in Micah 6:8. Thanks must go to the teachers and their assistants for making the lessons such a success.

We enjoyed a full suite of activities in our woodland realm. Some energetic old favourites, like a particularly intense game of Ultimate Frisbee, to the more intellectual pursuit that was our rendition of live action Cluedo. Fun was had by all and numerous

friendship were made and renewed amongst the youth present. This year all the staff had multiple roles, but their enthusiasm to put the campers first never lagged, and they all joined with enthusiastic abandon to ensure that everything ran smoothly. That they'd given up their time to serve was and is a credit to them, and we thank them for it: Bethany, Declan, George, Kimberly, Matthew, Nadia, Oliver, Rachael and Victoria.

I cannot end this report without praising our chefs, Mandy, Petra and Tania. They selflessly worked under some trying conditions, including the kitchen area being split into two quite separate blocks, and even then with not quite as much space or equipment as they were accustomed to. But the food they managed to turn out from quite humble conditions was sumptuous and delicious, a testament to both their skill and dedication. We even got into the real campfire spirit, exploring new experiences by cooking outside with wood-fired grills for some of our lunches (with Declan as our Barbecue chief). ### BRITISH BIBLE SCHOOL NOTES

"Blessed is the man who walks not in the counsel of the wicked, nor stands in the way of sinners, nor sits in the seat of scoffers; but his delight is in the law of the Lord, and on his law he meditates day and night."

There is something particularly resolute about these opening words to the book of Psalms. Faced with a choice: the way of the wicked, or the way of the righteous – we have chosen the way of the righteous. And this is the way we must pursue.

Like many who might read this, I have come to find in the Psalms a place of solace, opportunities for reflection, and close encounters with our eternal Father. I am learning that walking with him is often perilous, never dull, but always secure in the knowledge of his steadfast love.

Many years ago I came to know something of the blessedness of delighting in his word, and of meditating on it day and night. From early days as a follower of Jesus I immersed myself in the study of the Scriptures – knowing far less now than I thought I once knew, of course – but I came to understand something of the truth of not living by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God.

have continued to shape the work of the British Bible School to be a useful resource for congregations and believers in the UK.

Recently we collaborated with the European Christian Workshop in Lancaster by offering a part of one of our Modules on their programme. It was a splendid opportunity not only to teach the word but also to publicise our work and the resources we offer.

Later this year we will be conducting six Study Weekends in three locations around the country. We will be returning to Wembley in North London with our Module on Paul's letter to the Galatians. We will be taking the prophet Ezekiel to East Kilbride in Scotland. And then we will be conducting our first classes in Morley, near Leeds, on Paul's letter to the believers in Ephesus. You will find dates elsewhere, and details on our website.

We are again rather excited about our Autumn Study Week which is to be held at Bassenfell Manor, in the Lake District, where this year we shall be presenting our module on: The Deliverance of Israel in which we will be studying the books of Judges and Ruth. This is an excellent opportunity to study one of our Old Testament modules forming part of our Applied Biblical Studies course. You can find full details on our website, along with a syllabus you can download.

Let me urge you to take seriously the reading and study of God's word. May he renew within each of us a growing delight in the Scriptures. And let us make good use of every opportunity we have to grow in his grace and in his knowledge.



### Behold this Photograph!



If the purpose in reproducing this photograph is to please the eye, clearly we could easily have done better. The photograph is an old one, taken, perhaps, as far back as the year 1858; and the art of photography has improved since that date...Yet, if our readers, the young especially, to some of whom, perhaps, every face in the group is unknown, will permit us to place them at the right point of view, and to give such explanation as is possible to us, we doubt not the picture will be prized by those in this country and behind the seas who are carrying on to-day the same work for God and His truth in which these ten men, each in his own manner, were engaged at the period when this picture was taken, and some of them many years before.

Let it be said we are indebted for this old photograph to our beloved sister, the widow of one of those in the group, Sister Tickle, the esteemed editress of our children's Magazine, *The Sunbeam*. Perhaps, too, if our sister indicated the proper point of view when she sent it here for reproduction in our Magazine. She evidently regarded it as the property of the brotherhood – an heirloom...

Space does not permit us to enter on any notice of the life and work for the Lord of these pioneers of our movement. We have (shall we say?) "interviewed" our Sister King to prevent our falling into egregious error in naming them. This venerable sister, now approaching the eighty-ninth birthday, would be good for a full and accurate account, but we must be content to little more than name

them. Numbering from left to right and taking those standing first, we have:-

### 1. THOMAS HUGHES MILNER, of Edinburgh.

We take down and read the title page of the small, neat, first volume of *The Christian Advocate*, and find it dated 1857, and edited by Thomas Hughes Milner, author of "The Gospel Guide," etc., Edinburgh. Many of us have heard of his strenuous and valuable labour, and thousands more know him by his tracts, many of which are still in use.

#### 2. GODFREY KEMP, of London,

not a public man, but well beloved for his genial personality. Relatives of his are esteemed members of the churches in Australia.

#### 3. GILBERT YOUNG TICKLE, of Liverpool.

It is difficult for some of us who knew this devoted brother only in the later years of his life to recognise this figure as *our* "Bro. Tickle." His name is still remembered widely and beloved. As an elder of the Church in Thirlmere Road, a member of the General Evangelist Committee, and editor of *The Christian Advocate*, he "laboured much in the Lord."

### 4. WILLIAM McDOUGALL,

an evangelist, best known in Wigan and the Furness district; a keen student of the Word, and an effective proclaimer of the Gospel.

### 5. TIMOTHY COOP, of Wigan,

To whom we understand the words of Paul would apply, "diligent in business, fervent in spirit, serving the Lord." Later, his energies and financial resources were thrown into a movement apart from the co-operating churches.

Coming now to those seated, we have

### 6. DAVID KING, of Birmingham,

Whose labours only closed in 1894. Like Paul, he was "set for the defence of the Gospel," and through his public opposition to error, especially through his debate with Mr. Charles Bradlaugh, he

was perhaps more widely known than any of our public men. His influence was augmented by his writings and his long service in editing a Magazine representative of the churches, named successively, *The Millenial Harbinger*, *The British Harbinger*, *The Ecclesiastical Observer*, and *The Bible Advocate*.

### 7. JAMES WALLIS, of Nottingham.

This esteemed name carries us right back to the beginnings. He it was who in 1837 took up the work of publishing the writings of Alexander Campbell, begun by "Mr. W. Jones, of London." He was the leading spirit in the work of organising the churches for the support of evangelists. He conducted first *The Christian Messenger*, and then *The Millenial Harbinger* for many years, until the latter passed into the charge of Bro. King.

### 8. JABEZ INWARDS,

a brother noted for his eloquence in preaching; and for his labours as a temperance advocate.

#### 9. W.D. HARRIS,

who planted a church in his house, in Buckingham, in which town we note the Annual Meeting of the Co-operating Churches was held in 1852. Subsequently, he removed to London, and was an elder of the church in Camden Town.

### 10. WILLIAM PERKINS, of Manchester,

of whom we have heard as one of the best of teachers. Elderly brethren still sound his praises.

From our own knowledge of some of these beloved brethren, and what we have heard of the others, we should say that in many respects their personalities differed very greatly. They were bound together by their acceptance of Jesus Christ as Lord, and their common conviction that believers should hold and practise what is seen to have been taught by Christ and His Apostles, as revealed in the New Testament, and should refuse to practise what is of merely human origin... —ED.

## DEREK DANIELL (Tunbridge Wells) 1934-2019

Derek Daniell passed to his rest on Sunday, 11th August, aged 85 years – seventy of those spent in the service of Jesus our Lord.

Born in Bristol, Derek moved to Tunbridge Wells in 1957 to work with Albert Winstanley. The following year, he met Margaret Scott of Kentish Town at the Paddock Wood Bible Camp. They married and settled in Tunbridge Wells where they raised their family and he remained the mainstay of that congregation all of his life.

In his youth, he and his cousin John preached in the open air in Bristol and spent holidays together cycling around the country. When he objected to being conscripted into the army (he believed strongly that Christians should not learn to kill), he was ordered to remain in

plumbing for two years in place of National Service.

During the time in Tunbridge Wells he also supported Brighton and Kentish Town congregations after brother Scott passed away. In addition he attended gospel and outreach meetings in other parts of the country including Holiday Bible Schools in Loughborough and Bristol. He also attended Kelston, Goblin Coombe and Carroty Wood holidays, the latter which he organised.

Derek enthusiastically contributed to the *Favourite Hymns of the Church* book and was involved in writing the history of the churches in the South East with Joe Nisbet. During his time in Tunbridge Wells he led Bible studies with individuals, small groups in homes, telephone Bible messages, correspondence courses, and travelled all around the area.

In the last few years of his life Derek was battling with his health including Dementia. However he had not missed a worship service until the last few weeks when he was in hospital, or housebound.

He is especially missed by his wife, Margaret, with whom he celebrated his 60<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary in May. He is greatly missed by his children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren and wider family and many others whose lives he touched by his kindness.

Derek's funeral was held on Friday, 23<sup>rd</sup> August, with a memorial at the Tunbridge Wells church building.

### FAMILY NEWS

#### KIRKCALDY

"Café Inc across the kingdom" was an initiative run by Fife Council during the summer break. Having supplied more than 7,000 meals during the Easter holidays, the scheme provided a free lunch for children and young people, parents and families as part of its aim to reduce poverty. More than 9,000/day free school meals are provided across Fife, but the local authority knew there was often pressure on families during the holidays.

At Hayfield community centre, where Kirkcaldy church meets, the Council provided food in hot boxes and also a member of their catering staff to serve the food. This was every Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Lunches were

served from 11.45 am to 1.00 pm. People could also collect a cold packed lunch and take it away with them or, if they preferred, could eat in the community garden. The numbers attending during the seven weeks averaged 63 each day, with a high of 90 on a really busy Friday.


The church, along with committee members, helped by volunteering to set up tables and chairs, wash dishes, serve drinks (water, juice, teas, coffees). Also to tidy hall and clean tables at the end.

However, the most encouraging point to take from the whole event was the opportunity to welcome folks as they came in to the community centre, and then being able to chat with them during the lunch time. This was an excellent way to get to know people and to speak about the church and Jesus in this informal setting. We have been able to make contact with a number of new Mums, Dads, Grannies and young people and pray that this will result in more young people attending the youth class, and adults at our worship and study classes. During the 7 week break the church held a special Sunday family day and there were 15 visitors on that occasion.
