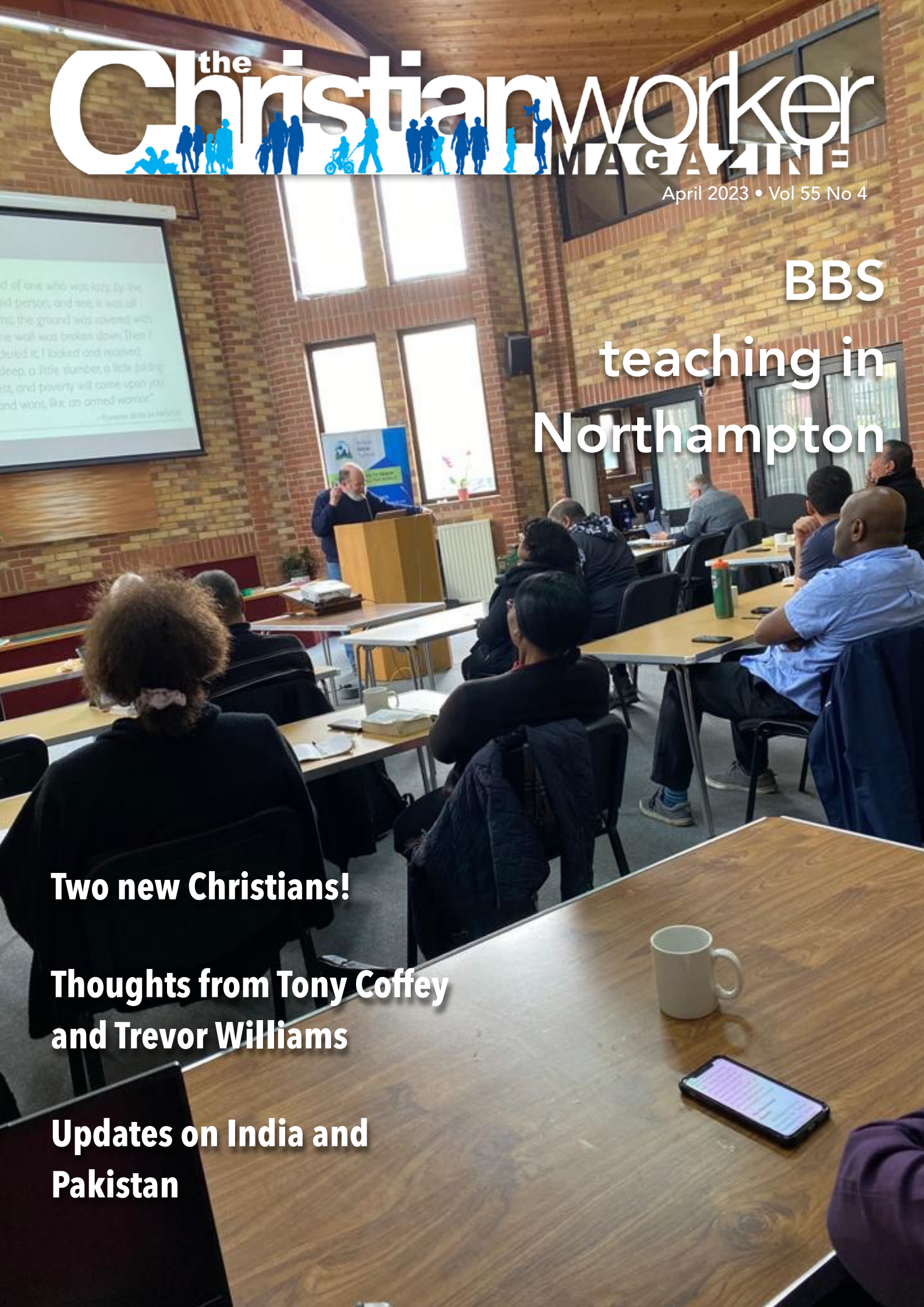

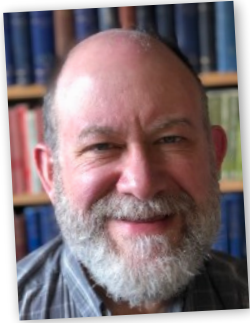

MY PERSPECTIVE



Perspectives from the letters to Timothy and Titus

Learning to serve

As we were finishing our teaching in Northampton at the end of March, I tried to summarise the lessons that stood out from our study of Paul's letters to Timothy and Titus. These are the ones that seemed to stand out to me as a result of our two weekends of study and discussion: the need for good leadership; the need to grow as a Christian by concentrating on God's word; the need to live and treat each other as family; and the need to serve.

It was the last of these that seemed to resonate most with those who attended the weekends. Being a servant is not waiting to be asked but helping when we see any need arise. In many ways, being a servant is what good leadership and being God's family is all about. As servants and slaves listen to their master, we need to be listening to God as we study his word. Notice some of what Timothy and Titus were told about serving.

"And these also must be tested first and then let them serve as deacons if they are found blameless...For those who have served well as deacons gain a good standing for themselves and great boldness in the faith that is in Christ Jesus." (1 Timothy 3:10,13 NET)

"By pointing out such things to the brothers and sisters, you will be a good servant of Christ Jesus, having nourished yourself on the words of the faith and of the good teaching that you have followed." (1 Timothy 4:6 NET)

"But those who have believing masters must not show them less respect because they are brothers. Instead they are to serve all the more, because those who benefit from their service are believers and dearly loved." (1 Timothy 6:2 NET)

"I am thankful to God, whom I have served with a clear conscience as my ancestors did, when I remember you in my prayers as I do constantly night and day." (2 Timothy 1:3 NET)

"And the Lord's slave must not engage in heated disputes but be kind toward all, an apt teacher, patient, 25 correcting opponents with gentleness." (2 Timothy 2:24-25 NET)

"From Paul, a slave of God and apostle of Jesus Christ..." (Titus 1:1 NET)

"This saying is trustworthy, and I want you to insist on such truths, so that those who have placed their faith in God may be intent on engaging in good works. These things are good and beneficial for all people." (Titus 3:8 NET)

Although the word for 'serve' or 'servant' isn't always found, the description of how they were to live and how they were to teach people to live was based on doing good works and serving. In fact, one of the needed people in a congregation are those we often refer to as 'deacons', which really isn't a translation but a transliteration of the Greek word *diakonos*. This word simply means 'servant'.

Sadly we have made the role of servant one of authority. In fact, the Greek word for 'minister', which we have made a position, is this same word: *diakonos*. We don't find 'ministers' as we know them in the pages of scripture but we do find many servants who helped in any way that they could.

We often get caught up in titles and positions. If we would only learn to serve and to realise we are servants and slaves of God, we could accomplish so much more.

If they look genuine I may enquire for more information or direct them to someone whom we know in their area. I hope that I am right in doing this. I realise that many of our brethren are suffering across the world and they are genuinely needing help but I am also very aware that there are so many scams that I often do not write back. I stand as judge and jury in this situation.

I am also aware that several other people receive requests for funds in a similar way. Many congregations in the UK are small and struggling but they are often generous. For many years congregations have sent hundreds of thousands of pounds to both India and Africa. It is often better to support established works rather than try to take on more especially where there is no personal contact or knowledge of these people. I encourage brethren to be careful in this sort of situation.

BRITISH BIBLE SCHOOL NOTES

Study Weekend at Northampton

For a number of years now the congregation meeting in Northampton have hosted Bible Study weekends with the teachers of the British Bible School.

These Study Weekends are held at various locations throughout the UK and provide excellent opportunities for students of Jesus to immerse themselves over a couple of weekends in intense Bible study. In addition to the experience of being face-to-face in a classroom setting, there is also opportunity to complete additional assignments to fulfil the Module requirements for the British Bible School Applied Biblical Studies curriculum.

Over alternate years in Northampton we have had the privilege of studying from the Old Testament then the New Testament. In March of this year we turned our attention to the letters of Paul to Timothy and Titus. The first weekend, 4th-5th March, Jon Galloway and Jack Paton taught 1 Timothy. Due to

be said they were very well behaved and it was lovely to have them along.

On the second weekend Jon Galloway and Patrick Boyns taught 2 Timothy on Saturday, 25th March, and Titus on Sunday, 26th March. On both Sundays one session was following the worship with the second session being the adult class time. With around twenty present on Saturday, again some children were brought along, one of whom wrote some questions down such as, “What does it mean to rebuke?” and “What does it mean to reprove?”. It’s safe to say the studies had something for each generation present, considering the topic that was very appropriate.

We recommend that any congregation seeking to know more about or wanting to prepare for leadership – or should that be serving? – in the congregation, should consider hosting this study. We use words like, pastor, pastoral, minister, ministry and have certain ideas about them. Do we use

them accurately? Are they even biblical? We learned so many valuable lessons for how we should personally conduct our life in Christ through what we found in these letters. Those present benefitted from the study and the fellowship that is enjoyed through such Bible study.

Please do consider hosting a study weekend in your location.

THE GOSPEL FOR THE NEXT GENERATION

There are few, if any, who have not had someone in their family get Covid. We simply 'got it.' No need to have been sick previously thereby making yourself a candidate for Covid, no, you simply 'got it.'

What's true about the virus is not true about the gospel. The next generation must be taught how unique the gospel is and we dare not presume that because they are raised in the church they will 'get it.'

When Jesus told his disciples, 'Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature,' he didn't say something new, his words were echoing the words God spoken to Abraham 2,000 years earlier. God said to him, 'All nations of the earth will be blessed through you' (Genesis 12:3).

What does that mean? God promised Abraham a son and through his descendants God would bring a saviour into the world who would bless all nations. Here's how Paul put it: "Scripture foresaw that God would justify the Gentiles by faith, and announced the gospel in advance to Abraham, saying, 'All nations will be blessed through you.'"

The blessing is justification, which would come through the gospel which God spoke about long before it was revealed in the New Testament. What we have are the words of Jesus in Mathew 28 shaking hands with the words God spoke to Abraham in Genesis 12. The gospel is not a New Testament doctrine; the gospel is rooted in the ancient promise made to Abraham in the Old Testament scriptures.

There is one central message running throughout the scriptures; it is about God working to fulfil his promise to Abraham and bring a saviour into the world. That's the theme, the thread running through the scriptures which Jesus confirmed on the Emmaus Road that first Easter Sunday: 'And beginning with Moses and all the prophets he explained to them what was said in all the Scriptures concerning himself' (Luke 24:27). Christ in all the scriptures! The gospel in all the scriptures.

In Israel's sacrifices there is a generous hint of the gospel. For example: A person sins and a sacrifice is offered. What does that tell us? Two things – One, sin is a crime against God and demands that someone must die; second, the death must be that of an innocent victim. Do you hear the gospel screaming out to us? This is the doctrine of divine substitution. The innocent dying for the guilty, the sinless dying for the sinner, the guilty going free. That's the gospel.

John the baptist uttered one of the most amazing statements ever spoken when he said, 'Behold the

Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world.' Jesus said this about John: 'Of all men born of women there has not arisen one greater than John.' What made John so great? All the prophets foretold the coming of the saviour, they were pointing to a moment in the future, but John was given the privilege of actually identifying Jesus as 'the Lamb of God.' The prophets were saying, "He's coming." John said, "He's here."

Let's analyse John's words:

- (1) **'Behold'** is a word filled with amazement. It's far more than saying, "Hey, look over there." 'Behold' carries the 'wow' factor. John is saying that the redeemer of the world has come.
- (2) **'The Lamb of God.'** For centuries Israel provided their own lambs which were ineffective sacrifices though the procedure was repeated year after year. But now, God has provided the sacrificial Lamb.
- (3) And God's Lamb will do what no other lamb was able to do, take away the sin of the world.
- (4) The words, **'take away'** bring us back to Leviticus 16 which needs to be read with some

imagination. On the day of atonement the high priest selected two goats, one he sacrificed, that was the scapegoat, he placed his hands upon the other and confessed the sins of the nation, he then chased the goat into the wilderness, signifying the sins of the nation being taken away. But now, God has provided a sacrificial Lamb who would take away the sin of the world.

God's sacrificial Lamb, Christ crucified, is the solution to sins. That's the gospel. And that's the inheritance we need to leave for the next generation.

INDIA UPDATE

The congregations we work with in Samalkot and Pavara are both doing well, and growing in spirit and in truth. Nine souls were added to the Lord's body this past month. We are active in evangelism and reaching unreached people and making disciples. It's so good that younger Christians in the local assemblies take part in the Lord's work and are actively involved in the serving and leading various activities. We do have regular Children and Youth Bible Studies and weekly men's and women's meetings in the congregations.



100 -150 kms with very few public transport facilities. This makes me more committed to continue this work for the Lord. We thank God for new opportunities and challenges.

Rural Preachers' Network: Every month in five different locations we gather 60-70 preachers in each place – there are nearly 300 preachers who lack Bible resources but are eager to learn from the scriptures, to prayer together, to have fellowship and a quality time of Bible study. The theme I am teaching this year is “Fruit of the Spirit”.



In January, 37 people committed their lives to Christ from different places where we have had a concentrated effort in proclaiming Jesus. This network of preachers is a great encouragement, not only to the leaders but a blessing to the rural and tribal congregations and the expansion of the Kingdom.

Women's Empowerment: During 2022 a total 75 women graduated from our SWAN sewing centres and all received new sewing machines and a little startup fund to start their own business, based on the skill they had learned. We celebrated a graduation ceremony day to make them proud of themselves and praised and thanked God together. This year, so far 90 people are admitted in the course from 5 different places. We thank God for the resources we have and are able to provide this training for these

unprivileged and deserving women and young girls. Sonia is empowering women to leave their situations of despair – last year six women who were sex workers left their former way of life and are now able to support themselves. Coming to these training centres and listening to the Word of God. Sonia has regular Bible studies with some women and three Hindu and two Muslim women have accepted Jesus.

Work with children: We care for 150 underprivileged children in two different places. Every evening they come and have some snacks and get to learn English and about God. There are some orphans and semi-orphans who lost their parents during the Covid pandemic and need additional care. Please uphold them in your prayers.

Please keep us and our work in your prayers, that God will provide what is needed to sustain the mission work, for long term evangelistic work and financial support, for opportunities to share the good news of Jesus and help build up the local body of Christ. If you can help in any way with our needs we shall be extremely grateful.

A NEW HEART AND A NEW SPIRIT

‘I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit in you; I will remove from you your heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh’. (Ezekiel 36:26)

We have a God of the second chance. The people of Israel had been in captivity in Babylon for decades at this point. Their failings had been well documented and demonstrated by Ezekiel. The people had been punished but God, the Redeemer, now says enough is enough. The promise

of hope and restoration is placed before the people. They would be able to go back home, the fertility of the fields would be enjoyed, the fruit trees would blossom again and give a harvest. 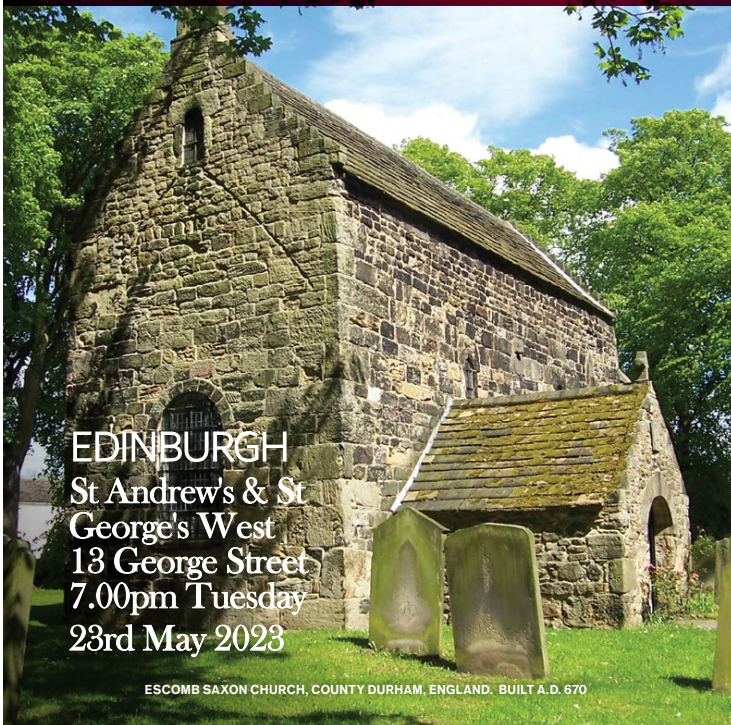

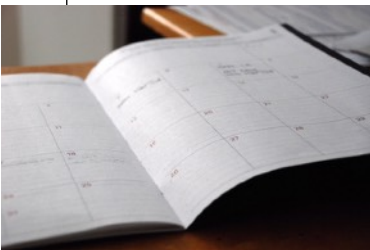

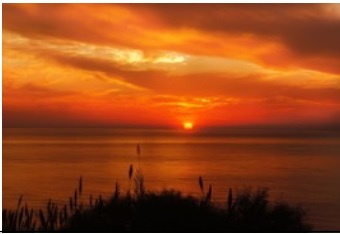

Some of our readers will know that Pauline and I have been on an extended visit to see two of our three children and their families in Australia. We are now back home with a pocket full of memories. They say that travel broadens the mind but it also touches the heart, for when we leave our loved ones behind, we leave our hearts there with them. It is, however, nice to be back home – but home here is only a temporary dwelling place, our permanent place is in heaven above.

While in Australia we met people that we love in the Lord and friends that we have made over the years. We often joked about being 'upside down'.
