What do we learn from history?

Although history was never one of my favourite subjects in school, I was still fascinated learning what had happened in the past. I had one particular teacher when I was in the eighth grade (equivalent to 2nd year in Scotland) – he was fresh out of university and was very innovative in the way he taught American history. I learned to have an appreciation for history that has stayed with me.

I remember something Buddy Burns quoted when he was working with us in our early years at Castlemilk, "the only thing we learn from history is that we never learn anything from history". Initially I disagreed with him, but the more I've thought about it the more I realise the truth in that statement. We don't learn from history because we don't know history.

The history of people returning to God's word is one area that has fascinated me. The Americans point to Thomas and Alexander Campbell and Barton Stone as the ones who pioneered this return to

following God's word – and they did in the United States and were very influential. Then I moved to the United Kingdom where I discovered the names of many people that I had never heard: James Wallis, David King, Gilbert Tickle, Lancelot Oliver, Walter Crossthwaite, and many more. These men were very influential in the 1800s and 1900s among congregations in Britain and left their mark through their writing and publications. Over the past few years I have been able to acquire many of these books and publications. I also discovered congregations that predated the Campbells.

John Renwick concentrated research on Scotland and presented his findings to small groups, congregations, and students at the British Bible School. He published his research in a book detailing many groups of Christians striving to get back to God's word.

I have wanted to compile some of this information into lectures. On Saturday

Observations of a participant

For many years several have been discussing how to reach the current generation who are now in the 20s and 30s. We didn't know why but we did know

that what we had used in the past was no longer working. Those who attended the retreat were looking for something that would help us move forward. We knew the scriptures on the need to take the good news to those around us. But we were looking for better ways to apply this today.

The structure of the retreat was perfect in helping us find some answers. Following a 45-60 minute presentation around the dining room table we then had the same amount of time to discuss what we had heard. For one lesson the discussion lasted for three hours! The material presented definitely was helping us think through what we needed to do.

Two lessons in particular stood out to me: the first and the last. The first opened with "gospel astonishment -> gospel community -> gospel movement". The point was that we need to have an astonishment, an excitement about what we have in Jesus. Without that, any gospel movement - taking the good news to others - is unsuccessful because we aren't sold on what we are offering. Without 'gospel astonishment' we won't build an effective 'gospel community'.

The last lesson was presented from a business background but explained how there are characteristics in generations of people which affect the way they receive information. If we are using methods that were used in the 70s and 80s today they won't be effective.

We hope this has been the beginning of a discussion that will continue for many years to come as we look at ways to reach those around us with the good news of Jesus.

BRITISH BIBLE SCHOOL NOTES

Continuing leadership of God's people

Samuel was getting old. He had been one of the main leaders of Israel and a prophet of God for many decades. What would happen when he died and was no longer there? His sons weren't suitable to replace him; they had a reputation for taking bribes and perverting justice – they were all about getting profit (see 1 Samuel 8).

The Israelites looked at the nations around them. They all had kings! Perhaps that was their solution – to get a king. So they approached Samuel with this request. What they didn't realise was that they already had a king: God was their king! By requesting another king they were rejecting the kingship of God.

It wasn't that God was against the nation having a king. When he gave the law through Moses in the wilderness there were provisions – and warnings – to eventually have a king. But there was a stipulation: it had to be a king that God had chosen (see Deuteronomy 17:14-20).

They wanted a king "such as all the other nations have". God granted their request and

Saul, son of Kish, from the tribe of Benjamin was anointed by Samuel to be king.

The people were impressed with Saul: he looked like a king! He has a head taller than anyone else – there was no one like him. He looked the part.

Sadly, Saul was a disappointment as a king. When he found a young leader of the army in David, son of Jesse, he became jealous. Even though David became his son-in-law, he tried to kill him. He even took to role of priest to offer sacrifices to God when Samuel was late in arriving and refused to totally obey God. Because of this, he lost the kingdom and it went to another, this time one that was a man after God's own heart, one who would lead the people to follow God.

When David became king he began a dynasty that lasted for centuries and through which God brought his Messiah into the world. God was in control!



SAFE GUARDING TRAINING AND SPIRITUAL ABUSE

Have you heard of Spiritual Abuse? If a survivor joined your congregation, would you know how to support them?

Safeguarding is a vital part of any congregation. When we wrote our safeguarding policy, we included spiritual abuse alongside neglect, emotional, sexual and physical abuse. I had a vague idea about what it was but when questioned about it, I felt it was not an area of safeguarding I knew enough about. So when I saw a course advertised on the 'thirty-one:eight' website, I knew I wanted to know more (https://thirtyoneeight.org/).

For those who do not know, 'thirty-one: eight' is a safeguarding organisation which advises churches and provides useful resources for safeguarding leads.

The course was on Zoom and along with delegates from different churches across the UK and Europe, Dad and I spent two evenings learning about what spiritual abuse is and how we can support survivors. After a long day at school (I am a primary school teacher), spending two and half hours was a challenge, especially about such a heavy topic. But the frequent opportunities to contribute in small groups made it easier.

The first three modules were focused on creating a healthy culture in our settings (there were not just churches represented in the course). "A healthy faith culture is one that provides emotional/psychological and physical safety. It offers guidance and accepts a person's right to choose."

We were challenged to rate how healthy or unhealthy our congregation was when it came to different characteristics: governance; listening; effective structures; managing power; modelling safe behaviours and communication.

During the second night, we looked at behaviours which would constitute spiritual abuse. The definition of spiritual abuse has to meet three criterion: emotional/psychological abuse; occurs in a religious context (this can include the home); and demonstrates unhealthy/harmful behaviours supported or justified by faith or holy texts. Various case studies were shared, including the nine o'clock service in Sheffield as well as scenarios which may happen in the context of a church.

Spiritual abuse in the context of a marriage relationship was also discussed and something I had not considered before attending the webinar. There is support for those who experience domestic abuse and Christian organisations who can advise the survivors as well as those supporting them.

The content was challenging and at the end of the course I felt I had more questions than when I started. If I am encouraging people to come to church, is that spiritual abuse? How can we practise biblical discipline without it becoming spiritual abuse? But the leaders of the course were very helpful and tried to answer my questions.

Thirty-one:eight have a variety of safeguarding courses which I would encourage you to look at. Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility and we must strive to create a culture in our congregations which support survivors and act when abuse happens.

The course leaders made frequent references to Christ and how He responded to those he came into contact with. The Rich Young Ruler was given as an example of how we should present the gospel to others: present what we believe

the truth to be but allow the person to make a choice, just like Jesus did.

I would encourage you to look at the website and book a place on a training course If safeguarding is not something you are familiar with, contact thirty-one:eight or I am happy to answer any questions.





Many of us see this as a mockery of the rainbow that we associate with the flooding of the earth in the days of Noah and given as a symbol of God's love and hope for the future.

Every sort of sexual difference seems to be celebrated and is now financially supported by banks and other institutions. What is not celebrated is traditional, scriptural marriage of one man and one woman. It seems as if everyone can do or be whatever they like. Young and old are being caught up

> in a theory that everyone can express themselves in whatever way they wish. Freedom of expression is an wonderful gift but can also be abused into heartache

and disappointment. What looks good and fun and sexually appealing can destroy relationships and create misery for generations.

Sadly, many Christian groups are caught up in this frenzy of thrills and pleasure and forget that 'Jesus is our wisdom from God – that is our righteousness, holiness and redemption. Therefore, as it is written: "Let him who boasts boast in the Lord" (1 Corinthians 1:30-31).

The thrill of the gospel should be that we become more like Jesus. 'The Christian has died to sin, how can we live in it any longer?...We have been baptised into the death of Christ...to live a new life' (Romans 6:1-4). It is all too true that many do want a new life, but only to do what they want and not what Jesus wants. This certainly is pride and that which goes before a fall. How many have been hurt by drugs or harmful sexual activities? Many want to find themselves in these sorts of relationships only to discover that what they found out about themselves was something they did not want to be.

The sound and colour of 'Pride' can be a thrill for many young people discovering their own bodies and emotions. These events and everything associated with it can send unexpected thrills to the mind and body. It will seem that Jesus is far away and not part of a real life – but still he calls us to follow him and for all to take up their cross and go on the journey of life with him. Glamour, glitz and thrills may last for a moment but are only for a moment. Many have wanted fame and fortune only to be destroyed by it.

Let me encourage our congregations to teach the church the danger of stepping into the world of 'pride'. We may not like the necessity of being blunt, but the world has no problem with offering everything to our young. Our bodies are the temple of the Holy Spirit, and our pride must be in Jesus.
