The end of another year

As the year draws to a close, it is hard to believe how quickly life seems to go past. The Christmas holidays are approaching and we are making plans not only for the big day but also for events with family and friends. Sometimes it is hard to figure out how we are going to fit it all in!

In Scotland and other areas we have had the first snow of the year (although not much in our area at least you can see it). And it is cold! As I sit typing this in a restaurant in northern England Christmas songs are playing in the background. Where did the year go?

For me, this time of year draws my thoughts to think about the past year – what was accomplished and what is still undone. Could I have done better? Could I have accomplished more?

Most Christians I know are frustrated over a lack of growth in our local assemblies and possibly a lack of involvement by so many. Some of us in Scotland have been getting together to discuss some of these things and try to come up with answers. We realise there is no quick solution, but perhaps it has been of some comfort to realise that this is not a unique problem that we are facing in our country, but something all religious groups are currently struggling with.

It has been useful to see from demographic studies what are some of the challenges we face. These are challenges that all groups, businesses, and churches are having to face as they change the way to reach out to people or even advertise their products. We realise there has been a shift in the world in the past twenty to thirty years. The current generation does not interact with the world the way that mine did. Easy access to the Internet and information has influenced everything from how they get information to how they view life. There is so much misinformation out there that it is impossible to counter it all! So what do we do?

We need to continue to proclaim the truth – and proclaim that there is something that is called 'truth' for everyone! That truth is found in the person of Jesus and in the book he revealed to us that we call 'The Bible'. We can know what God wants of us. We can change our lives to follow him and truly find what is real life.

As we look for ways to reach others we need to learn that the Internet and mass advertising is not going to do it. It seems to me that people today, more than ever, want a quick-fix solution or a formula that really doesn't involve them. I've been asked so many times: what is it that we can do that will bring in new families?

There is only one way this will happen. We see it in what the first Christians did. "And wherever they were scattered, they told people the Good News" (Acts 8:4 NCV). It really is that simple. People have to tell people the good news of Jesus. That is what we see throughout the book of Acts. That is how people became Christians. And that is what we must be doing today.

What are we planning to do in 2024 to reach someone with the good news?

BRITISH BIBLE SCHOOL NOTES

It was a wonderful week spent around God's word in a most beautiful setting. Eighteen students came to the Lake District the first week of November to study God's word.

Residential Study Week at Bassenfell Manor We studied the first half of the module on The Kingdom of Israel. The lessons were led by Patrick Boyns, Jon Galloway and Mark Hill. Our studies concentrated on the events leading up to the first king of Israel and then various aspects of the reigns of Saul, David and Solomon.

This year there was an adjustment to our daily schedule which was felt to be an improvement and less taxing on those not used to intense study through an entire day. Three classes were taught each morning. After lunch the afternoons were free to explore the area, visit with each other, do further study, or even sleep. There were then two more teaching sessions, one before the evening meal and one after the evening meal.

This was the largest student group we have had since beginning the residential study weeks. We had Christians from all ages and backgrounds who came together with one common goal: to study God's word. Several were those who had attended past study events but there were also some who came for the first time.

A ramble was organised for one afternoon which many enjoyed. Many also spent afternoons visiting the coffee shops in the area. One evening was devoted to the annual Bible quiz, which all enjoyed and learned from.

The cost of the week covered all meals, a bedroom in the Manor, as well as a book for further reading and study. The teachers have also offered to share the presentations to help in further study.

We are already planning next year's residential study week, which should begin in late October 2024. Announcements should come out soon as to the exact dates and the module we plan to study. Make plans to join us for what will definitely be an excellent week of study and fellowship.

There are also study weekends planned at various congregations through the year – we hope to see you at one of these!

A PERSONAL NOTE ON THE LIFE OF FRANK WORGAN

My earliest memories of Frank and Isobel Worgan were when our family met with the congregation in Ince, Lancashire, in the early 1960's. Frank was our evangelist and Isobel was my Sunday school teacher and I loved her gentleness. She brought all her class children a silk handkerchief from Texas with cowboys on it after their visit there. That gift very was special to me.

Margaret and I were six and four years old when the Worgan family came back from Holland – I have memories of a snappy dachshund when we visited their home. We remember fun times on Sunday School outings together, too. Our best memories though, when we reminisced on the day of his funeral, were of Frank's sermons which were clear and interesting to our young ears as we grew up in Lancashire. We were allowed to colour and read until a certain age during worship, but those ears heard the gospel message too. Don't think your children aren't listening.

We missed the Worgan family when they moved to Corby; our family moved to Wales around that time. But we soon saw them again when Frank brought to Camp Heatherbell. Each year during camp we would climb Tinto (using the easiest route). That year Frank (then about 50 years old) decided to take some up a more adventurous route, the hard way, and ran to the top. We were still huffing and puffing climbing upwards when they were running back down! Both Frank and Albert Winstanley were fit and competitive!

In our home Dad would have Frank's recorded messages and studies playing as we ate our porridge in the morning. One series of studies that impacted my teenage life was on Genesis and the earth's beginnings.

When we shared Frank's passing recently with my brother Tom his memory of Frank was as a mediator. Congregations had many problems to face and Tom was in the thick of controversies in the early 1970's when even growing a beard wasn't the thing to do. Frank was there for Tom.

Then later John and Margaret Griffiths spent time in Corby at the British Bible School studying with Frank, Joe and Albert and all the other great teachers. What a valuable vision those men had to develop the British Bible School where many men and women gained biblical knowledge over the years.

David and I spent time in Canada and – surprise, surprise – Frank came as a visiting speaker there, too! Beryl Limb often reminisces about the time Frank went to Grand Cache, where it is often 40 degrees below zero during the winter, with snow on the ground sometimes from November to April. Grande Cache is miles from anywhere so Frank spoke to just a few people, but it didn't matter.

Later he visited Wawota, Saskatchewan on the prairies where the wind defiantly blows. Cameron and Margaret Husband (nee Limb) talk about sharing warm boots and an extra coat to keep Frank warm as he hadn't quite come prepared for those temperatures. His sermons always warmed their hearts and so many remember his visits and his Message. Frank spoke at the Edmonton Fellowship weekend in Alberta with maybe 500 in attendance, when we lived there, and all the Christians and visitors loved his talks and his faithfulness.

What an amazing sharer of God's word! We learned at his funeral that a congregation in Odessa, Texas, faithfully supported Frank for 70 years. Thank you Odessa – your steadfastness used a great man to spread the Word to so many ready hearts all over the world.

Missing

people

According to the UK Missing Person Unit over 170,000 people go missing every year, about 97,000 adults and 70,000 children. That is one person every ninety seconds. Many are found within 48 hours but 5,200 seem to be lost forever.

It is reckoned that each missing person affects at least twelve people directly being family members and friends. This is a number over two million in total. The heartache is indescribable. Some people are never found and sadly only the remains of a person is occasionally found.

Lost is a heartbreaking word. Jesus talks about it and the joy of restoration in Luke 15 when he mentions a lost lamb, a lost coin and a lost son. Our hearts go out to those who are suffering because of a missing person in their family.

In a world which seems to make more people isolated it is easy to forget older relatives or those in the outer reaches of our families. It is certainly easy to forget people who no longer attend church services. Some people seem to leave before they have settled into church life – some because they feel their face does



not fit, some who see other Christians acting or speaking inappropriately within the congregation, and some it seems come in through the front door and out of the back door. And they are forgotten, they become missing persons to us. But are they to God?

Sadly, at this time of the year many people will miss out on at least one person that they could rekindle a friendship with and that is Jesus who came as Saviour and light of the world. Oh, I know that Jesus was not born on the 25th December and so do most other people – but sometimes some of our churches go into overload about this with no carols, no nativity readings, and nothing to brighten up the most dismal part of the year. We miss a wonderful time to share the gospel of good news that Jesus came to earth to bring hope and joy, kindness and forgiveness.

The world will again go into debt, probably drink and eat too much getting into festive mode, but the world has always done that. What we can do is to open our church doors to our friends to welcome them to share the brightness of our souls and reveal Jesus who came as a baby, to be a brother to all mankind and came not to be forgotten. That is why we have communion every week. Don't let Jesus be a missing person in your Christmas.

Lord let those who are lost be found, those who grieve be comforted, those who have lost their way find it again. And those who do not know you rejoice in finding Jesus, our Emmanuel.
