Remembering Frank Worgan

It is hard to realise that Frank Worgan is no longer with us. His presence at times may have seemed larger than life. His Bible knowledge was phenomenal. Most remember that when he was delivering a lesson from God's word that all listened and learned.

When I moved to the UK in 1985, there were three preachers that were respected by all: Albert Winstanley, Joe Nisbet, and Frank Worgan – and in Scotland there was Andrew Gardener. All great men of the Word. I spent time getting to know all of these because I knew their influence on my life would be good.

I first met Frank in the winter of 1969 – yes, I was only eight years old. Frank and Isobel came to Finland where my family were living where Frank spoke in a series of gospel meetings in Helsinki and Tampere. Frank, of course, spoke in English and the lesson was translated

into Finnish (I have a copy of one of those lessons).

When I visited Scotland to get married in 1981, Arlene and I attended the first graduation of the British Bible School. To my surprise and delight there was Frank! I introduced myself to him and he remembered his visit with our family.

Over the past 35 years it has been good to have Frank speak at congregations where I was working as well as to work with him at the British Bible School. It was always a joy to hear him when he was speaking at other events. When he lived in Scotland after his retirement I was able to see him a bit more frequently.

When he proclaimed God's word he always had something worthwhile to say. The many lessons I heard benefitted me greatly. One in particular sticks in my mind. He was speaking at East Kilbride. His lesson was on the times when God wrote something and what we learned from

these about God: the Ten
Commandments, the wall of Belshazzar's
palace, and Jesus writing on the ground.
I've adapted and used it many times. I
also remember he said this in a lesson:
"When you become a Christian, even
your dog should know it!"

Many years ago someone said that they didn't know what would happen when Albert, Joe and Frank were no longer here. They have now all have gone on to their reward. Because they trained so many so well, God's word will continue to flourish in this country.

I first encountered Frank Worgan when I began as a new student at the British Bible School towards the end of 1982. I had likely seen his name, along with others, on a brochure I had been sent before enrolling but had had no connections with those who had grown up in the light of his reputation as a teacher and preacher of the word of God.

As one of the main teachers at the School at the time it was evident that he clearly had an extensive knowledge of the Scriptures; he was slso respected

among many believers in many places within the UK and beyond. I listened first to his lessons on Genesis and there was a general consensus among the class that he sounded as if he might have been speaking from personal experience.

Without doubt he continued to have great influence upon many who sat at his feet. As the years went by I came to know him more as a friend and fellow servant of the Lord Jesus both within our shared service with the British Bible School, and within the local assembly in

Corby. He will be greatly missed, though I am confident that he is pleased to no longer be burdened with the inconveniences of poor health and a body that had seen more years than most.

With much thanksgiving we will remember a faithful servant of Jesus who, with his late wife Isobel, gave of themselves for the good of so many.





Anne Brown (Kirkcaldy & Glenrothes) 1934-2023

Anne Cairns Laing's story began when in Dunfermline on the 16th January 1934, a second daughter was born to Herman 'Harry' and Elizabeth Laing. Harry's whole family worshipped at Sinclairtown church of Christ, where Betty was baptised into Christ shortly after she and Harry began dating.

Ann enjoyed school and in her final year at Primary school sat her IQ/11+ tests and scored so highly that 'Gifted' and 'Specialist School' were discussed, but Anne went to Kirkcaldy High School. During her early twenties Ann loved hostelling and cycling all over Scotland with her cousin Ann Sinclair, once making the John O'Groats to Lands' End trip.

She met the love of her life James Brown and on 5th September 1959 they were married at Rose Street Chapel by Walter McDonald. Anne and Jim set up home in Kirkcaldy and their children came along: Kenneth in 1960, Alan in 1964, followed by Colin in 1965, Caroline in 1967 and Scott in 1971.

The family moved to their home in Glenrothes in 1972 and they began to worship with the Glenrothes church of Christ, where Jim was baptised by Alex Strachan.

All was going well – Anne had a secretarial job and Jim worked with the Fire Service in Glenrothes – but unexpectedly Jim was diagnosed and died of Leukaemia in 1985. Anne was left to raise their family alone. However, she was a great believer in supporting

left to raise their family alone. However, she was a great believer in supporting her children in whatever they put their minds to.

The legacy of what Anne and Jim started in 1959 has born much fruit with five well-grounded children, ten grandchildren and seven greatgrandchildren. And much to Anne's immense joy, her home always bustled with the coming and going of them all.

Over her life Ann was an active Christian, Sunday School teacher, good friend, ever helpful neighbour and a wonderful mother. She enjoyed Scottish Country dancing, Ladies' classes at Kirkcaldy and the occasional Kirkcaldy Social and Ladies' outings. More recently Anne was less able for physical pursuits, but kept her mind active using her iPad doing crosswords and chatting on social media.

Anne passed away peacefully at home with her son Colin by her bedside at 12.15 am on Wednesday, 16th August 2023, aged 89 years. Her funeral was took place at Kirkcaldy Crematorium on Friday, 1st September when family, friends, and her Christian family came together to bid her a fond farewell.

AROUND THE WORLD

UKRAINE

During the early crisis of the day of Russia's war on Ukraine the British congregations gave generously through *The Christian Worker*. Around forty people were helped to come to the UK with most being given transport costs and settling-in funds. Monies were also sent to Ukraine, Poland, France and Greece to help support Ukrainian refugees in those places. Funds were sent for food, lodging, transportation and clothing. We are still helping out and recently £1,000 was sent towards baby food to be sent into Ukriane. Money is also being sent to help orphans.

A big thank you goes to everyone who has helped in this project especially those who have housed people they did not know. All sorts of projects have been started one way or another. We would like for those who housed people from Ukraine to let us know how their guests are now going on. We know that some have their own homes and jobs. My name is Wayne Speer. I am an American and I live in Albania. I was born in Nashville and graduated from Lipscomb high school and college. My father was also a preacher. I have been preaching for sixty years as of last month.

My wife and I have served the Lord for 44 years in Canada, South Africa, England, Greece and Albania and presently live in Albania. I work with the thirteen congregations in Albania. We travel to each of the congregations every second week. We take the preacher and his family to dinner on Saturday night and visit and encourage them as best as we can do. We worship with them on Sunday mornings and take them to lunch, along with some members or visitors who need encouraging.

We started this three years ago and I told them I did not need to preach but they always ask me to please preach, so I do. We have come to know all these preachers, their families, and their congregations very well and admire their work! All of the congregations in Albania have Albanian preachers, which I believe is wonderful!

The congregation in Poliçan has a great father/son work and I highly recommend them and their work to you. Please pray about supporting them as it would be a real tragedy for the work to stop. They need \$2500 a month (around £2000 a month). This supports them both and pays the rent of their building. Their supporting congregation in the states, Berry Chapel in Franklin, Tennessee, has had a decrease in attendance because of Covid and several members dying and have notified the Poliçan church that they will have to discontinue their support at the end of December, after supporting them for several years. THE FINAL WORD



Blessings or not?

For some time I have wondered 'when are we really blessed'? We pray and what we ask for happens and we are thrilled; but other times we pray as sincerely as we can and nothing comes about at all. Of course we can say this is not something that is in the mind of God, or we did not ask with the correct words or faith, or we should wait, and a million excuses come into our minds.

This year has been difficult for hundreds of thousands of people with natural disasters in many countries around the world. Earthquakes in Turkey, fires in Greece and then torrential rain with flooding. All over the world extreme heat is causing a crisis. Then we have man's inhumanity to man. How many prayers have been offered up to God pleading for peace in Ukraine or Syria or dozens of other places – and little seems to have changed. It seems the world has

been dazzled by a red rag and like a charging bull has galloped into a frenzy of inadequacy. We ask ourselves why? Why are our prayers not answered the way we think they should?

Jesus taught that we should ask, seek and knock (Matthew 7:7-8) so we do and often there seems an emptiness revealing only the sound of silence. Why was it that the apostle Paul sought help with his affliction over and over again and the response was not necessarily what he wanted (2 Corinthians 12:7-10)? The valiant saints of old were persecuted and tortured to the point that the world was not worthy of them (Hebrews 11:33-38). Why? Were they not worthy to receive the blessings of God? Were they blessed or cursed?

We expect God to be the answer to our prayers, we always want something nice to happen, people to be healed, finances sorted, life extended, and sometimes we do get what we want – but sometimes not. We want God to bend to our wants and sometimes we cannot see the end result.

All of us are walking through the valley of the shadow of death. We can neither see the height of the mountain above us nor the depth of the valley below. But the Lord is still our shepherd, he still makes us lie down in green pastures and he can still restore our souls because he leads us in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake. With all of this we need fear no evil.

Our God is with us through thick and thin times, happy and sad times, laughing or crying times. With this we are blessed even when we do not know it.

Father of mercies be at our side, even when we cannot feel you.

Be our guide when we are lost, our eyes when we cannot see.

Be our thinking, be our all. Amen.
