# Called Home

Isobel Vick

Isobel Wilson Gardiner was born on 30<sup>th</sup> November 1955, the daughter of George and Jean Gardiner. The eldest of four daughters, Isobel grew up in a household which loved the Lord. She was baptised at the age of 14 at the Hyvots Bank congregation in Edinburgh and she played an active part in the life and work of the Lord's people in central Scotland from a young age.

She and her family were members of the Sighthill congregation in Edinburgh. In the summer of 1975 a young American, Mitch Vick, came to help the congregation for the summer. Mitch's stay in Scotland was extended and he and Isobel began dating in the autumn of 1975. By the following year they were engaged and in August 1977 they were married. Three children, Robin, Hannah, and Laura, followed and in due course three grandchildren, Erin Dougherty and Millie and Murray Vick. Isobel loved her husband, children, daughter-in-law, sonin-law, and grandchildren with a love and commitment which permeated everything else she accomplished.

Isobel played a vital part in Mitch's work in Edinburgh from 1975 to 1990 and in helping launch a new work in Stirling from 1990. Taking part in Bible studies, visits, literature distribution, teaching ladies' classes and children's classes, and being a friend and spiritual mentor to the women in churches throughout Scotland became second nature to her, and her main complaint was that she never had enough time for all she saw needing done. In 2010, just as she was first diagnosed with breast cancer, she immersed herself in providing help for the mission team which arrived to work in Falkirk and included her son Robin and his family.

Besides fulfilling the demanding role of an evangelist's wife and playing an active role in the life of the Sighthill, Stirling, and Falkirk congregations, Isobel also pursued a career as a radiographer at Stirling Royal Infirmary and latterly Forth Valley Royal Infirmary. She 'retired' from radiography in 2013 but continued to work occasional shifts until ill health forced her to stop entirely in 2015. Much of her work in later years was in training and mentoring new radiographers, a work at which she excelled.

Since being diagnosed with cancer Isobel often encouraged others who were also battling cancer. As she began chemotherapy treatment last year when the cancer was found to have returned, she continued to visit with and encourage others she met, including the hospital staff.

Most of all, she loved the Lord. As it became apparent that she would be called home soon she found ways to share her faith with fellow cancer sufferers, hospital staff, her brothers and sisters in Christ, and, of course, her family.

The Lord gently called for her on Sunday morning, 25<sup>th</sup> September. She leaves a legacy of shining service and faith in the Lord whom she loved with all her heart, soul, mind, and strength.

northern Philippines), there are 6,571 totally damaged houses and 9,963 that are partially damaged in their city alone. Tuguegarao is only 25 miles from where Typhoon Haima made landfall.

Besides food, clean water, sleeping mats, and blankets, their immediate need there is to replace the galvanised iron roofing destroyed during the wrath of Haima. Initially, we have also arranged for 250 food packs to be given out to the Christians and their families.

As is always the case after a strong typhoon as Haima, the needs of our fellow Filipinos are great. We cannot help each

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# A Bible Thought: Who is This Man?

Jesus was travelling through Samaria with his disciples. While his disciples went into the

city to buy something to eat, Jesus sat down at the well. A woman came to draw water.

Jesus surprised the woman by asking her for

something to drink. This was surprising to the woman for two reasons. First, this man was speaking to her, a woman, in public – that just wasn't done. And secondly, this man was a Jew and she was a Samaritan – Jews did not have time for Samaritans. So she asked him, "How can you – a Jew – ask me, a Samaritan woman, for water to drink?" (John 4:9 NET).

Jesus then explained that his water was different: his water would give eternal life! That sounded too good to be true! "Sir,

give me this water, so that I will not be thirsty or have to come here to draw water" (John 4:13-15).

Jesus then told her to call her husband. When she

replied that she had no husband, Jesus proceeded to relate her history: she had been married five times, and the man she was living with wasn't her husband. Again, she was surprised!

Then it came to her: this man must be a prophet! Quickly changing subject from herself, she asked a question that seems to

Jesus reply also surprised her. "If you had known the gift of God and who it is who said to you, 'Give me some water to drink,' you would have asked him, and he would have given you living water" (John 4:10). This surprised the woman because the



have been a point of debate between Samaritans and Jews: where is the correct place to worship, on the mountain in Samaria or in Jerusalem? Jesus' response, I am sure, gave her another surprise: the time is coming when neither place

man obviously had no way to get water from the well because it was very deep – surely he wasn't claiming to be greater than Jacob, who had dug the well! will be the one place to worship, although the Jews were correct at that time. The time was coming when true worshippers

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would worship in spirit and truth – this is the type of worshipper the Father desires.

The next response was revealing. "The woman said to him, 'I know that Messiah is coming' (the one called Christ); 'whenever he comes, he will tell us everything.' Jesus said to her, 'I, the one speaking to you, am he'" (John 4:25-26). The woman ran back to the town, leaving her water jar behind, to tell people to come and meet this man: "Come, see a man who told me everything I ever did. Surely he can't be the Messiah, can he?" (John 4:29).

What is our reaction to Jesus? Are we like the woman who initially thought he was just a man? Or do we credit him at least with being a prophet? Or, because of all that he said and did, do we realise that he is indeed the promised Messiah?

"Now many Samaritans from that town believed in him because of the report of the woman who testified, 'He told me everything I ever did.' So when the Samaritans came to him, they began asking him to stay with them. He stayed there two days, and because of his word many more believed" (John 4:39-41).

When we believe that we have found the Messiah, like Andrew (John 1) and the Samaritan woman (John 4), we won't be able to keep quiet but will have to tell others.

Let us always be proclaimers of the good news of Jesus!

On Sunday morning, wanting to give thanks and praise the Lord, they visited a chapel that advertised that they broke bread in the morning and had a gospel service at night. Their website indicated that they considered the Bible the standard for their belief, so they thought to themselves that it would be good place to go. Not only did they want to praise the Lord but also to remind themselves what it was like to

be in a situation in which no one knew them. Upon arrival at the hall they were met by a doorkeeper who immediately asked which congregation they were from. When realising that the preacher and his wife were not the same 'church brand' as the doorkeeper, they were told that they could enter in, sit on a back row and observe. The preacher and his wife said that if they were not welcome they would go elsewhere.

Going further down the street, feeling distressed and bewildered, the preacher and his wife saw people going into another place of worship. Over the door there was a large sign saying, "Welcome – All ages, All nations, All stages of faith". As time was quickly moving on they went in. They were greeted with a smile, asked if they were on holiday and where they came from. They immediately received the bulletin and shown a nice place to sit. The leader of the service greeted the regular congregation and especially the visitors, including the preacher and his wife. A couple of things were slightly different from the preacher's home congregation but the greeting, the love and consideration were given generously. When it came to the Lord's Table the preacher and his wife were invited to join in the thanksgiving and were offered bread and wine.

Which church showed the Spirit of Christ to their visitors – the one who wanted to keep their church pure and unadulterated by strangers or the one who welcomed all with open arms?

Sometimes I have visited some of 'our' churches and received no welcome. I have seen Christians in meetings ignore visitors. This is a disgrace and should never happen any where for any purpose! Our meetings are for all but especially for visitors. Our time of worship must always be a place of sanctuary and care. We must all make sure that our welcome is for "All ages, All nations and All stages of faith."
