ABSS in Gemünden

Once again Christians from throughout Europe and America descended on the small village of Gemünden in the German countryside just north of Frankfurt. They gathered for the annual Advanced Bible Study Series. Max is from CEM in Marseilles (a French programme training Christians for mission). He brought lessons emphasising the typology that can be found in Jesus' teaching and signs.

This year there were 26 who came from Germany, Belgium, the Netherlands, France, England, Scotland, Canada and the United States.

this year were Charles Rix, Patrick Boyns, and Max Dauner. Charles is the Dean of the College of Bible at Oklahoma Christian University. He presented lessons on 'Pain and Suffering', drawing much of his material from the Old Testament.

BBS Notes: Ephesians

One cannot read the opening section of Paul's letter to the believers in Ephesus without being impressed with the idea of being "in Christ". Such are the numerous blessings to be had in him that it seems absurd to seriously consider life anywhere else. It is, he states, in Christ that all spiritual blessings are to be found in the heavenly places.

The idea of these 'heavenly places' is certainly not unique to this letter, though the phrase is found only in it. It becomes something of a theme to what Paul writes here. The idea is certainly of a realm of reality beyond all that we see and experience on earth. And it is here where true blessings are to be found, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God, and where we are also seated with him.

If ever there was a letter written to encourage us to look beyond all we can even imagine, to that which cannot be seen, it is this letter to the Ephesians. It is here that Paul prays for "the eyes of our hearts" to be enlightened that we may know "the immeasurable greatness of his power toward us who believe"; and later that we may "know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, that [we] may be filled with all the fullness of God".

In light of this transcendence, the call to unity is one that essentially surpasses all physical endeavours. It is, firstly, the unity of the Spirit to which we have been called in the bond of peace. It is of no human origin, but of the Spirit by whom we have been immersed into one body. To maintain that unity we must continue to walk by that same Spirit by which we are being filled with all the fullness of God.



These truths are profound, and they lie at the very heart of our being the body of Christ. Our unity is never dependent upon universal agreement, nor upon membership of anything less than the body of Christ himself. It is to be found only in Christ and as such is a unity born of grace. And it is a very beautiful thing.

As we spend time in this letter, peeling back the outer layers, contemplating the depth of God's grace, we are called to places we may not have been before. The reality of these heavenly realms is both wonderful and, at times, potentially frightening – unless we have put on the whole armour of God and found strength standing in the strength of his might. "For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers over this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places".

And stand we will, for victory is assured for those who walk by faith and are found in Christ. Be encouraged by the words of this book to rise far above the mundane existence of this life; to see that which cannot be seen; to know that which surpasses knowledge; and to take up arms in this deadliest of battles, confident of every blessing of life in Christ Jesus.

From the Archives: 19th December 1971

BRING THE BOOK!

I can remember the time when members of the Lord's church were thought of as Bible carrying, Bible quoting and Bible living people. Today congregations have to furnish Bibles in class sessions – often for their own members. Many of our people cannot even quote Acts 2:38. It is very likely that some of the old-timers would be shocked at the life style of modern Christians. Don't get me wrong! I am not in favour of tradition for tradition's sake; but I <u>am</u> in favour of knowing what the Bible has to say, and then doing it.

A New Start

In the book of Nehemiah we find the same type of situation. The Scriptures had not been read among the Israelites for a long time. After their return from Babylon, the people had a chance to start over again. They got off to a good start. They commanded Ezra the scribe to bring the Book of the law of Moses to them and to read it (Nehemiah 8). It was read in a way the people could understand. They listened from morning until mid-day. When the book was opened the people stood up and listened attentively. All the people wept when they heard the words of the Law. When they heard what the Bible said, they did it. We need to be like those people. We need to bring the Book!

We need to bring the book because there is a present-day

Famine of the Word of God.

In Judges 2:10 we read that there arose a generation that knew not God. How terrible! But look around you today. Friend, we are living in a generation which knows

not God. It has led to much evil, crime, hatred and immorality. The prophet Amos spoke of times like these (8:11-12). Although he did not have the twentieth century in mind when he wrote the words, he certainly did contemplate a similar situation. "Behold, the days come, saith the Lord God, that I will send a famine in the land, not a famine of bread, nor a thirst for water, but of hearing the words of the Lord. And they shall wander from sea to sea, and from the north even to the east, they shall run to and fro and seek the word of the Lord, and shall not find it."

If <u>we</u> do not <u>bring the Book</u> to the world the same situation will develop. Our children will grow up without the counsel of God. They will live in a lawless society. Their generation will perish in iniquity. The Bible is the only deterrent to evil. Bring the Book, my friend. I need it. You need it. The world needs it.

"Like a star in the morning it its beauty, Like a sun is the Bible to my soul: Shining clear on the way of love and duty, As I hasten on my journey to the goal.

Holy Bible! My precious Bible! Gift of God and lamp of life, my beautiful Bible! I will cling to the dear, old holy Bible As I hasten to the city of the King."

Around the World

Algerian Christians banned from worshipping even in a tent, after church building sealed.



Christians in Algeria were forced out of a tent they were worshipping in by police on 28th January after their church building was sealed by authorities.

The tent, set up in the grounds of Azaghar Church enabled the 300 strong congregation to continue worshipping following the forced closure of their church building for spurious 'health and safety' reasons.

The church in the village of Azaghar, around 110 miles south-east of Algiers, lost the use of its building in October 2018, despite the congregation responding to requests to install fire exits and fire extinguishers.


Bulgarian government backs down after evangelical Christians and others protest crackdown.

The Bulgarian Parliament has agreed not to pass into law prohibitive amendments to the nation's Religious Denominations Act after thousands of Christians protested against a crackdown on the religious activity of minority religions.

The parliamentary Committee for Religion and Human Rights met on 19th December 2018 to discuss changes to the Religious Denominations Act with representatives of minority religions including members of the Bulgarian Evangelical Alliance. The final vote on the changes, without the severe amendments, took place two days later on 21st December.

Christians had gathered in Sofia on three consecutive Sundays on 11th, 18th, and 25th November to protest against oppressive amendments that would have placed limitations on evangelising, banned worship outside officially recognised buildings and restricted church leader training. Religious groups would also have needed 300 members before being officially recognised.

Unprecedented gathering of 130,000 Christians in officially Islamic United Arab Emirates.



An event held in Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates, on 5th February was attended by over 130,000 Christians; a startling occurrence in a region where Christian worship is tightly restricted and Christian converts from Islam risk imprisonment for apostasy.

The UAE has one of the fastest growing Christian populations in the world, mainly due to the inward migration of Christian workers. The country has recently gained a new cathedral, 16 new churches and has around 700 Christian congregations.


Wanted - Evangelist with Focus on Youth





The Final Word: "A Look at Worship"



One of the interesting things about being able to visit a number of our congregations is to see how they do things slightly different from the church where we currently worship. This has nothing to do with doctrine but with methods of approach. Without pointing the finger at anyone let me share a few thoughts.

The 'Hymn Leader' (or whatever you call the person who starts the singing). First of all, well done for knowing so many hymns and being

willing to put yourself on the line for pitching the first couple of notes at least. This is not an easy job. However, let me encourage you to look at the congregation. You can speed things up or slow them down, make a loud noise or quiet the sound – it is up to you. Some of our churches now use projectors for the words but it is important for the leader to know what is being sung. There is no need to constantly look at a hymn book or the projector; you are there to lead and you cannot if you do not look at the people. Then if the meeting leader is not leading the hymns the one who is pitching should know what is likely to be sung.

Secondly it is often the practise in worship to have a thought about the Lord's Supper. This is an excellent practise but sometimes I have wondered what the words spoken have to do with what is about to happen. I have heard all sorts of things talked about which may have been interesting but little to do with what Jesus initiated. Often there has been no reading of scripture. Sometimes the length of time used has been of sermon proportions. Sometimes there has been no introduction at all and I have wondered about the visitors among us if they understand what is happening.

Thirdly, repetitious prayers. When I was growing up, the Elders of the church told me that to say the Lord's Prayer was not a good practise as it was repetitious, yet I hear the same phrases used over and over again in public prayers. I am thankful that those who are absent from the assembly 'for whatever reason' are prayed for, yet those in the meeting, who are there despite reasons why could be away, are not prayed for. If brethren are ill, pray for them by name. If brethren are away especially on mission trips of preaching elsewhere, pray for them by name. General prayers receive only general blessings, specific prayers can receive specific answers.

One other thought. The gathering in of funds is not a part of The Lord's Supper, yet is often taken up immediately afterwards. I am told that this is convenient. After attending the Lord's Table for nearly 60 years I am not sure that our thinking on this is quite right. The gathering in of funds is NOT a command but based on an example for the Corinthian church, though we are not told how they did it. Some churches leave the offering to another part of the service, some leave the basket on the table for people to put in after the service. Several gift to the church through their bank every month and now we can give through GIVT on our mobile phones. I know of one church with a bucket by the door and another that takes up no offering at all, all gifts are given through the bank. As the Lord loves a cheerful giver lets make this a happy part of our worship.

Lord we want to know you and worship you in spirit and in truth. Open our minds, open our hearts to see you in your glory. Amen
