S.O.S - Seeking Out Souls in Perth

From the beginning of 2019 the congregation in Perth has been using every first Tuesday of the month to host meetings we have called 'Seek Out Souls', or 'S.O.S.' for short.

The Christians here have gathered to discuss local evangelism and how we may support one another in reaching out to the community in Perth. The Christians have enjoyed these times together and they have been useful in helping to improve the effectiveness of our evangelism in the first half of this year.

In order to further encourage and equip ourselves for outreach we decided to host a

number of unique workshops for the Christians here and also invite other congregations. On Monday and Tuesday, 27th & 28th May we hosted two workshops at East Nether Benchil, just outside of Perth.

Kyle Rye and Todd & Pam Newman from the congregation in Buford, Georgia, came to help host the workshops. Pam took the ladies and focussed on how to get the most out of a life of faith. The feedback from those attending was extremely positive. The men studied how to better formulate and arrange studies and the development of lessons to instruct the local congregation.

It was our prayer that multiple congregations would be blessed by this workshop and seventeen men and women attended from four different congregations. The lessons we gained from these two days together have already begun to influence how I study for and organise lessons and studies for the congregation and increased our focus on community engagement.

We followed this up on Saturday, 1st June, with S.O.S. University. We spent a full day at Tulloch Community Centre in Perth discussing evangelism and ways we can better equip ourselves to reach out to others with the gospel. Throughout the day we learned how to discover our style of personal evangelism. There were also small groups to learn from one another what may work in our own lives.

Spreading the good news of Jesus is a key part of our faith, demonstrating our love for God and those around us. It is our prayer that S.O.S. (and S.O.S. University specifically) will

continue in the future.

Much of what we learned throughout the week were things that we already knew as Christians. However, finding the confidence and motivation to continually share our hearts and words with others is often the challenging part. We continue to pray for the spreading of the gospel throughout this country and beyond and that every Christian can make known their confidence in the salvation offered by Jesus. We pray that S.O.S. can be a small part of this process.

British Bible School Notes

Deliverance in the Lake District



"Alice had never been in a court of justice before, but she had read about them in books... 'That's the judge,' she said to herself, 'because of his great wig." And so the trial of the stolen tarts begins in Alice's

Wonderland.

When we think of judges I suppose

we are generally inclined to think of great wigs, gavels and courtrooms. They are those whom we hope will pronounce fair judgements and ensure that justice is done. But these are not the judges of whom we read in the Biblical book of "Judges".

These 'judges' appear during a crucial point in the history of Israel – following the conquest of the land of Canaan and before the establishment of the monarchy. Joshua and his generation had died, and "there arose another generation after them who did not know the Lord or the work that he had done for Israel" (Judges 2:10). The people abandoned God and their ongoing rebellion led them to be oppressed by their neighbours. Eventually they would call out to God for help.

The 'judges' of Israel may at times have dispensed justice, but they were primarily deliverers of God's people whom God raised up and "who saved them out of the hand of those who plundered them" (Judges 2:16). The book records the exploits of deliverers such as Othniel, Ehud, Deborah, and Gideon – not to mention Samson and Jephthah – who rescued Israel and set them free from their oppressors. But having been delivered from their trials it wasn't long before they

turned their backs on God and the whole cycle began once again.

Though this is an action-packed book, with lots of memorable characters and some yucky bits thrown in for good measure, it is primarily a book recording the faithfulness of God and his power to save – despite the often self-inflicted nature of our troubles. Set against the backdrop of the turmoil of the Late Bronze Age, the book is full of vivid detail and richness of language and style.



Norman John Hill (Loughborough) 31st March 1936 – 12th May 2019

It was a great comfort to us as a family to see so many people attend Dad's funeral service. We were also truly overwhelmed by everyone's thoughtfulness and compassion in sending cards, messages and making visits during Dad's illness.

Born into a Christian family, Dad made the decision as a teenager to surrender his life to

Christ. As far as I know there was never a time when he wavered from that decision. Supporting every meeting locally and nearby at Saturday meetings, Holiday Fellowships, you name it, he was there. No wonder so many from many congregations were present to celebrate his life. Add to that the friends he kept in contact with from schooldays and each place he worked – and all without the need for social media!

Early on Dad was involved in preaching but he stepped back from that eventually, saying he only had one sermon and he had preached it everywhere. He taught Sunday School usually alongside David Sharp, helped run the youth club when we were children, and generally got involved in everything happening. He was part of the 'church police' at Bangor Fellowship enforcing the curfew – who chose Dad for that job? When singers went to France from Loughborough, Dad was chaperone. Our home was always open, especially after evening meetings, not only for food and fun but allowing Bible discussions to continue that began at the meetings.

Along with supporting meetings,

Dad also did repairs to the

building and looked after the grounds. On one occasion Albert Winstanley asked dad to do something at the building and he said, "Why are you always asking me, you know I'm busy". Albert said, "I know you will do it". Which he did. Thinking about it, Dad usually complained but went and did it anyway – there

could be parable in there somewhere.

A long time ago Dad told Ken Mullan he wanted him to be the one to take the funeral service. Ken replied, "As soon as you like." We are so thankful to Ken for granting that wish. He summed Dad up by emphasising he was a good man. And he was: a good son, brother, husband, father, grandad, in-law, friend and disciple of Christ. As much as we tell ourselves he is in a better place we are still devastated to lose him.

Mum (Brenda), his daughters Gina and Sandra, myself, and our families were blessed to have him in our life. On behalf of mum, I want to thank you all for your cards, messages and visits. thought otherwise, so she began work in a print room, in charge of the press.

Cynthia leaves her husband Bob and two surviving children, Robert and Robyn. Cynthia and Bob's son Andrew tragically died when he was fourteen years of age, an event that defined Cynthia's life from then on.

Cynthia loved history and at our coffee morning would often be correcting a TV programme that had been on the night before. She enjoyed writing children's stories, having some published, and would read to us excerpts of one she was working on.

Her attendance at the Christian Fellowship Centre was an example to us all. Only now are we fully realising all the things Cynthia used to do in the background. She enjoyed for many years producing our weekly order of service and newsletter, letting us all know what was happening when and where. We have a lovely display of plants that Cynthia cared for and revived when needed. She would make posters and brighten up our notice board. We truly miss her presence.

Having had challenges in life we rejoice that in her heavenly home there won't be the sorrow, the tears, and the pain that we have here, and certainly, there is no death there (Revelation 21:4).

Nettie was a hard worker, working at various occupations throughout her life: an office worker, a 'lollipop lady', and a cleaner. She was an independent lady who just liked to get things done. She loved

knitting and each year would knit hats for the shoebox appeal, mainly for Eastern Europe.

She loved Jesus and would be at every meeting of the congregation regardless of how she felt. When asked, "How are you?" the answer was always, "Fine". She served as a 'president' at the women's meeting

and was involved in the annual church social events, working away in the background. She coordinated the collection of money for India orphans at the Bethsaida Children's Home.

We went to the funeral on Thursday, 7th March, to pay, not our last respects, but lasting respects to her. Nettie was well-travelled – from The Black Isle, to Fort William, to Armadale, to Kirkcaldy, and to Glenrothes. Now her travels are over, and she is home with the Lord.

Tema Christian Centre Appeal

I just returned from a 'bucket list' visit to Ghana, 24 years since I was last there. Many will remember, among other events, the Morley to Corby Walk in 1986 and associated appeals (1983 to early 1990s). Working with John Tamakloe to build a primary and vocational school, and the Tema Christian Centre (TCC) which opened in 1989, British congregations raised an amazing £35,000 (equivalent to over £100,000 today).

John is one of the leading figures among the congregations in Ghana. Well into his 60s now, he works tirelessly for his local

congregation as well as those throughout Ghana. In Tema and the surrounding metropolitan district alone (population around 1 million) there are 42 congregations with a total of almost 10,000 Christians! The Community 2

congregation has 400 Christians.

The Tema Christian Centre has doubled in size since my last visit in 1995, with 6 extra classrooms, a well-equipped computer suite and an office on the upper floor. All this has been funded from internal income, fulfilling the original aim that once built it should be self-financing. "Give a man a fish, feed him for a day. Teach him to fish, feed him for life."

I was fortunate to talk with a number of former pupils who met to plan a 30th anniversary celebration. Patsy, around 30 years old, is a nurse with responsibility for

training nurses at the local hospital. Judith did the 3 year sewing course organised by Martha Tamakloe and now runs a successful dressmaking business nearby. Others include a computer technician, a lawyer, an architect, a doctor, a pharmacist, bank and local government employees, etc. All were keen to stress to me how much they valued the education they had at TCC.

I talked to Kofi, the Administrator, about future aims. It emerged that a lack of funds limits the speed of development. Of just under 300 students, 10 (3%) do not pay fees or have sponsors. The school is aware

that these parents can't afford approximately £200-£250 a year, and get along with the consequent shortfall of over £2500 a year.

If you can afford £10 a month, why not pair up with someone in your congregation to jointly sponsor a

student? Or for £20 a month, sponsor one student. If we receive one-off donations, we will pool them to provide sponsorship. Eileen Wickenden and I will work together on this and all funds will be sent through Eileen after claiming gift aid wherever possible. Contact me for further details.




