Spending time with Christians...

If we were to give a theme to this month's magazine, it would have to be 'fellowship.' There have been many gatherings of Christians throughout the country during August and September and we have reports and articles about these activities.

It has been good to have been part of some of these events. While at Letton Hall many expressed how good it was to just be together with Christians for a weekend without worrying about their children, who were playing with other children outside, or about work. It was good to be in Peterhead for their annual social the last weekend in September, as we were encouraged by fellowship, singing and lessons. Again, many expressed how good it was just to be together, even though many drove several hours to spend the afternoon together.

When we read the book of Acts, we discover that, at the very beginning, disciples of Jesus spent time together – in fact this was something they devoted themselves to.

"They were devoting themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer...Every day they continued to gather together by common consent in the temple courts, breaking bread from house to house, sharing their food with glad and humble hearts, praising God and having the good will of all the people. And the Lord was adding to their number every day those who were being saved." (Acts 2:42-47 NET)

Why did they devote themselves to spending time together, even sharing meals in their homes? Do we go out of our way to spend time with other Christians?

Most of us realise that we need the encouragement that other Christians can give us. Being with others who are facing what we face helps give us the resolve to keep on going, even when times get tough.

I read this poem many years ago – it expresses well how we need each other.

*The fire, 'twas warm, each coal glowing bright,
The flames making shadows to dance in the night;
All was so peaceful, so calm and so well,
When a rumbling was heard as a burning coal fell
From the haven of warmth, to hearth of stone,
The coal was left lying – now still, now alone.
First it glowed red, as the coals on the fire,
But its radiance soon dulled – its life did expire;
Till no life was left in that solitary coal,
That far from the blaze, its being had stole.*

*The Christians met often together for prayer
Each one had been taught, for each other, to care;
Each meeting brought strength and new courage
to all,
Lest on life's dark pathway some pilgrim might fall.
But one found the going a burden too great,
The world showing pleasures that "just couldn't
wait";
For meeting with saints, he'd no time any more,
And turning his back, he'd walked out the door.
So leaving his brethren, and going alone,
Now frail and dying – cruel cold heart of stone.*

Let us not take spending time with Christians lightly. Let us take advantage of opportunities to meet with our local Christian family as well as traveling to special events.

Summer Camps, part 2



British Bible Camp

Since its humble beginnings, British Bible Camp has grown immensely over the years. This year we had a total of 150 campers and staff members - our largest camp to date. Held again for the 6th year at the Youlbury Scout Activity Centre in Oxfordshire, we were blessed with a fantastic week of temperate weather, soul nourishing fellowship and general merriment.

The theme this year was *Surge: the Power of God*, focusing on the awesome power demonstrated by Jesus through his miracles. Sometimes these accounts can become so familiar to us in our Christian walk that we become desensitised to the impact of the miraculous power of God – how his power can provide, cleanse, transform, animate and restore. Hopefully throughout the week, this came alive for everyone involved, gaining new perspective and understanding.

Morning assembly times were filled with joyful interactive songs and comedic sketches that provided a prelude to the morning class. With the presence of superhero *Surge*, with trusty sidekick *Fuse* (who had the tendency to trip a lot), they encouraged campers to plug into the ultimate power of God, rather than relying on their own power. This was in contrast to the roguish *Duracell's* false claims to true power, who's conniving attempts were foiled like a battery trying to make it on its own.

Campers were also immersed into elements of the gospel accounts through culinary fare: wedding

cake from Cana, stormy bowls of soup to float our crouton boats and pulled pork sandwiches which were thankfully demonic-free. It's details like these that add a multifaceted dimension to teaching outside of the classroom.

It was good to see a continuation from last year of the amazingly positive attitude and growing faith of the Senior boys. Each day they voluntarily created

an episode of "Bible Rangers" for the whole camp that reinforced the stories taught in the Bible classes whilst lining up for food. The Senior boys also took a significant role in leading worship around the campfire and could often be found in deep spiritual discussion (even when they were meant to be in bed!).

If there was one thing that we felt the strain of this year, it was not having as many counselling staff as we have had in the past. We recognise that being a staff member at camp is a commitment and appreciate all those who have given their hearts, time and money to serve. If you feel moved to support and serve in this life changing ministry, request a staff form and apply to be part of next year's camp.

Next year's dates are Sunday-Friday, 2nd-7th August 2020 – see you there!



APPEAL UPDATE

ISHABY TINARWO

In the last update on Ishaby's situation (CW, August 2019) we said that the heart surgery unit in Zimbabwe was closed due to lack of facilities and that Augustine Nyamatore was organising for Ishaby to go to South Africa with a written report on Ishaby's condition. We also said it would probably be more expensive for his surgery in South Africa.

The information we received back from South Africa stated that the cost for Ishaby's open heart surgery would be over \$34,000 (US dollars) which was way beyond our reach.

Augustine Nyamatore contacted the church leaders in Zimbabwe to see if there was any other way for Ishaby to have his surgery. They said that they had been involved with a lady, who was a Christian in one of the congregations there, who had a similar condition as Ishaby and that they organised to send to India for her surgery. They offered to contact the

hospital in India for a quote for the cost of Ishaby's surgery there.

The quote that came back was \$9,200 (US dollars). This is broken down as follows:

1. Cost of Surgery: \$8,000.00
2. Initial assessment: \$200.00
3. Expenses (lodging and food for three weeks): \$800.00
4. Medication for two months from Hospital: \$200.00

Total: \$9,200.00


Due to the amazing response to our appeal, we raised £8,265 which is equivalent to just over \$10,000 (US dollars). We then had to consider tickets for airfare for Ishaby and his wife Happiness, who will accompany him from Harare to Delhi. This will cost somewhere between \$2,000 and \$3,000 dollars.

Then an amazing thing happened: a Christian in Zimbabwe sold some of his cows for \$1,850 dollars to help pay for the airfare. Praise God!

The good news is that Ishaby and Happiness have received their visas and tickets and will have flown to India on Thursday, 19th September, arriving in Delhi the next morning. He will attend the hospital on Friday for an assessment prior to his surgery which should happen within days of his arrival.

I want to thank all you who made this possible through your generous response to our appeal. I will keep you all informed of Ishaby's progress.

Slips, trips and falls

Some of our readers will know about an organisation for the retired and semi-retired called U3A. There are over 400,000 members across the UK and I am the chairman of the Stapleford branch.

One of our responsibilities is to make sure that everyone is physically taken care of at any of the meetings. Some of us attended a CPR session and recently we attended a first aid course organised, free of charge, by the Red Cross. We went through basic procedures, all of which were really common sense – if indeed sense is common. There were no bandages or splints involved but the directive was to contact 999 for emergency or at least 111 for information. We were told that if someone is seen lying on the floor, 98% of people will walk past – either being too scared, too busy or not wanting to be involved.

At the end of the two hour session I started to think about it all and realised a few pointers.

First of all, are our meeting places safe? Do we have odd bits of matting

about with edges that curl up? Are there slippery surfaces? Do we have a basic first aid kit available and are the leaders of the church, youth group, Sunday School, etc., knowledgeable enough and able to cope in an emergency? All church groups have a duty of care.

Apparently the Red Cross will visit groups from 4-20 people, free of charge, to help understand some basic aspects of First Aid. There is also an app, British Red Cross, which can be used for advice and information. If someone collapses in your worship services what would you do?

My next thought was somewhat more spiritual. If 98% of people are willing to walk past someone lying in the street how many of us are willing to share the gospel with those who have fallen over or away from Jesus. Salvation is free but, like First Aid, someone has to tell the story of Jesus first of all.

May God bless us in our physical duty of care in our activities and our spiritual duty of care in demonstrating and being Jesus to others.
