Always be ready

What is it that we worry about?

It seems that almost every news headline I have seen recently has to do with the 'coronavirus' (my news, by the way, is from Internet apps, having given up on television news many years ago). From the headlines I've seen and articles I've read, it would seem our media is trying to escalate this into almost a panic (which has happened in some countries).

What are the facts? The BBC news website reported that this virus (Covid-19) seems to start with a fever, followed by a dry cough, and after a week it leads to shortness of breath requiring some patients to need hospital treatment (<u>https://www.bbc.co.uk/</u> <u>news/health-51048366</u>).

How dangerous is it? The BBC news website stated that it had infected 78,927 people in China, as of 28th February, with 2,790 of these dying. Any virus can cause death so is this something that we should be concerned about right now?

I found the following statistics concerning Covid-19 on a website (<u>https://bay.com.mt/coronavirus-in-</u><u>numbers-and-why-we-really-shouldnt-</u><u>panic/</u>). Currently there are 80,000 sick with the Coronavirus, of which 77,000 are in China. Only 4% are outside of China. If you contract the virus, 81% of the cases are mild, 14% moderate, and only 5% are critical (the death rate is reported at 1-2%). This means if you were to get the virus, you are most likely going to recover from it (SARS had a fatality rate of 10%). Most deaths are of those over 50 years old. If you are under fifty years old and not living in China, you are more likely to win the lottery than die from Covid-19!

On 10th February 108 people in China died of coronavirus. On the same day 26,283 died of cancer; 24,641 died of heart disease; 4,300 died of diabetes; 3,024 committed suicide. Perhaps these figures put this into perspective.

What is my point in mentioning all of this? While we should be concerned about our health there are more important matters to devote our lives. The chance of contracting this disease and not recovering is very small.

There is something we can be guaranteed to have to face: death (if Jesus doesn't come first) and the judgement. While we should do what we can to stay healthy, do we put as much time and concern into being ready to meet the Lord for eternity?

"Just as people are destined to die once, and after that to face judgment, so Christ was sacrificed once to take away the sins of many; and he will appear a second time, not to bear sin, but to bring salvation to those who are waiting for him." (Hebrews 9:27-28 NIV)

All humans have a fatal disease: sin. Unlike viruses, there is a cure: the blood of Jesus. But it is up to us to take the cure through our obedience to the gospel and then living for Jesus. Rather than worrying about a disease, we need to concentrate on always being ready for eternity.

The UK was represented again this year at the Advanced Bible Study Series in Gemünden, Germany, 17th-21st February. It proved once again to be a week of good fellowship with Christians from congregations throughout Europe as well as spiritual refreshment through the lessons and singing (all lessons are in English).

There were four speakers this year presenting lessons from a wide variety of topics. Patrick Boyns represented the British Bible School in the first time slot each day, presenting lessons from Judges on "The Deliverance of Israel."

Rick Atchley from Texas was the keynote speaker, presenting two lessons each morning on "The Bible Doesn't Say That". He looked at eight 'sayings' that are commonly heard in the 'Christian world' and thought to be in the Bible, and showed that these are not only not found in the Bible but most often go against what the scriptures actually say.

Before our evening meal Craig Hutson from Dublin presented lessons on "Bad Bible Study". After our meal Craig Young, representing the CEM school in Marseilles, spoke about "Third-Culture Leadership Development".

A special treat this year, for me at least, was having Konstantin Zhigulin with us. He is a Christian from St Petersburg and is an accomplished musician and hymn writer. He conducts singing workshops and congregation worship workshops throughout the world, although primarily for congregations in Europe. He was given the devotional time at 4.00 each day and used it to teach one of his original hymns.

Afternoons were spent relaxing or visiting nearby sites: Schloss Braunfells (Castle), Saalburg (reconstructed Roman fort and museum), and Limburg (medieval town).

Next year the Advanced Bible Study Series I is 15th-19th February with ABSS II on the weekend. Although it is a distance, it is well worth making plans to attend this gathering of Christians from throughout Europe.

When asked what people know about Ezekiel the prophet, most will mention either wheels, or dry bones – not that the two go together, unlike the bones, but that is another matter. Both the wheels and the bones have been made popular through songs in which they are mentioned, though by and large any sense of context or relevance seems to be obscure.

The same might be said of most of the prophets – particularly the latter ones – they may be known for one or two specific incidents, but by and large they seem not to have featured greatly in our experiences or in our studies. I think this is tragic.

The book of the

prophet Ezekiel is arguably the most straightforward of the latter prophets. Delivered and written in the sixth century BC, the book records the message of God during a very dark time in Israel's history. In the midst of captivity in the distant land of Babylon, this once-to-be priest is to convince the people of their responsibilities and persuade them of better days to come.

That no one would listen or take him seriously was irrelevant – his responsibility was to serve as a watchman for the people of God and to speak the words that God had given him to speak. And this he does it in a most dramatic fashion – not mincing his words, but "telling it as it is" and laying responsibility at the feet of those to whom it belonged.

There was good news to come, but before this could be told, calamity was to come upon the nation and their beloved city of Jerusalem. Ezekiel lived through all of this, though far removed in a foreign land, but the day would come when all would once again be well.

We are delighted to be presenting a number of Study Weekends over the next few weeks – two in Aberdeen and two in Northampton – looking into the life and work of this, at times rather eccentric character. We would love for you to join us on this journey, or maybe you would like to host a British Bible School study event with your home congregation.



God's Woman Revisited: Women and the Church

By: Gary T. Burke

WOMEN AND THE CHURCH

GARY T. BURKE

C.R. Nichol (1876-1961) was a well respected preacher, writer and debater amongst churches of Christ in the USA. In 1938 he published the fruits of his study on the role of women in the church in a book entitled *God's Woman*. In this work he advocated a wider role for women than was currently practiced in congregations. At the time his work received a mixed response and then became largely forgotten. Gary Burke has revisited C.R. Nichol's work in his own study of the role of women in the church, *God's Woman Revisited: Women and the Church*.

The introduction and first two chapters of the book emphasise the importance of this topic and set the scene with a review of C.R. Nichol's work and life and a consideration of the current diversity of views on the role of women amongst those of our brotherhood who have written on this topic. This is written from a North American outlook. Before dealing with the Biblical texts that address the role of women in the assembly, there is a helpful chapter on disciplined Bible study. If we are to approach a text with an open mind, free from assumptions and preconceived views, three questions need to be asked of the text: What does it say? What did it mean? and What does it mean? Very often we jump to the third question before answering the first two.

Gary Burke begins his examination of the Biblical texts with a consideration of the creation narrative of Genesis 1-3. He argues that if we are to understand the relationship between men/husbands and women/wives then we must correctly understand these chapters. He then considers how those texts in Genesis are used in the New Testament either by direct quotations or allusions. This is important in seeing how the New Testament writers understood the meaning of the Genesis passages.

The chapter entitled 'Women in the World of Jesus' provides a useful background on the status of women in first century Palestine. This is followed by an enlightening chapter on 'Jesus and Women' which demonstrates just how counter-cultural Jesus was in his attitude towards women and his relationships with them. This was one of my favourite chapters in the whole book.

Four chapters are devoted to the texts from Paul's letters which are often brought up in any discussion on the role and involvement of women: Galatians 3:28; Ephesians 5:21-33; 1 Corinthians 11:2-16; 1 Corinthians 14:34-35 and 1 Timothy 2:8-15. A careful exegetical study is applied to each passage to help us understand their contexts.

This is a book which should at least cause us to reflect upon our own understanding of this important topic and how we have arrived at it. The book is not necessarily an easy read and some parts require careful concentration. Not all will agree with his conclusions, but none can question his respect for God's word and his genuine desire to understand it correctly and to go where the evidence leads.

MAGAZINE UPDATE

"The Voice"

Written and published by Graham A. Fisher

Trevor's 5th CW commandment in the February 2020 edition reminded us, rightly, that the *CW* is 'the only church magazine among British churches of Christ'. It is the only magazine of its type carrying news, views, reports, notices and information both from and about our brethren. It has a very specific purpose and ethos and is especially aimed at encouraging mission. Its contents are mainly driven by involved brethren submitting relevant articles for inclusion. There are at least two other magazines which circulate and are for our brethren with different agendas and objectives, one of which has been published monthly for over five years by the previous CW editor, namely myself, Graham Fisher, as a niche monthly magazine covering a perceived need in the 'market'. It's called The Voice.

The niche was created when the new team took the CW reins over from myself, went fully digital and electronic, with greater scope for wonderful presentation than my hard copy issues ever could achieve, but they decided not to present the sorts of regular articles I used to produce on a monthly basis. Many brethren kindly thanked me for them and said that they would miss them. So the idea arose in my mind that I could probably continue to write the sorts of articles I used to write, but in just a little more depth because there were no limiting constraints on their length. Thus The Voice was born.

It has the same target audience as *CW*: 'Christians' who are 'Workers'. (If you are reading this, you are almost certainly one of those brethren, not just a pewwarmer!) It is free. It too comes as a PDF attachment. It has more-or-less morphed into eight pages each month, with two main articles. Care is taken to present the ideas in as lively a way as possible to help keep your interest and not fall asleep reading it. It can be read by young and old alike. We don't do modern politics as a policy, though we might use politicians and contemporary events by way of illustration – the buzzword 'Brexit' has never once appeared!

It is written for brethren, members of churches of Christ. It assumes the basics are in place. Hebrews 5:11-6:8 covers our aims. We are not laying again foundations of repentance and baptism, but are presenting 'solid food ... for the mature, for those who have their powers of discernment trained by constant practice to distinguish good from evil' (Hebrews 5:14). It is written to take thinking brethren into areas they might never have ventured, to help keep them working at their faith and going deeper and deeper into the things of Christ. It's to help the faithful keep on being faithful and growing.

Copy is drafted until September as I write this, and amongst some coming titles are: 'Hat's On', 'Holy Beards', 'The Laodicean Ideal', and 'A Defenceless God'. You may not like every idea and article but if you are led to think further, our aim will have been achieved. 



Liquid sunshine

I don't know about you but I feel that we have had more than our fair share of rain these past months. Where we live just outside of Nottingham, we have a more or less average national rainfall – but even around here fields are flooded and so are some of the houses. Areas nearby have been much worse with town streets turning into rivers. I hope that you have been safe during the storms that have swept our country. I am amazed though that the trees are in bud and daffodils are in flower. With our oldest two sons and their families living in Australia we have also been concerned for their welfare. Some Christians we know had to be evacuated in the fires there but are now back home - I understand they have been shaken by the events.

The Bible records at least two spectacular weather events, the first being the flood in the days of Noah (Genesis 6-9). After that, there was the great drought in the days of Elijah (1 Kings 18). As I was thinking about these events I realised that both events came about because of the unfaithfulness of people who should have been worshipping the God of Heaven. Now I am not suggesting that the Australian fires or the floods across the UK are by divine will but I do think that all nations have a need to realise that our world is precious and we are all responsible. We hear a good deal about Global Warming and there seems plenty of evidence that mankind has been lax in its care for what it puts into the air and the seas.

Perhaps there is little that you or I can do to change matters on a massive scale but can we help? The answer is a definite 'Yes!'. Household waste can be lowered. We can use our own bags rather than plastic (I am quite sure that you know as much about this as I do). However, last week I realised as I was taking the cup in communion that what I was drinking out of was a little plastic cup that would never be used again. OK, so someone has to wash up glasses if they are used but at least there is no waste product. Then at a fellowship meal in another congregation I ate my delicious lunch off a plastic plate with a plastic knife and fork. We could have used degradable plates and cutlery without having several bags of plastic waste.

Our society is geared up to buying from supermarkets that, in my opinion, create the bulk of the waste we have to get rid of. We can complain, we can rethink, we can take more care, we can reuse. We do have a responsibility for today and for the future.

Some may have said, 'Where is God?' in allowing the floods and the fires. That is a question I cannot answer but I can see God in the helping hands and kind deeds sharing with those in need. I can see God in the generosity of British churches of Christ sending funds to the Philippines after the volcano eruption. I see God at work in the care we have for the farmers and orphans in Malawi or India or Pakistan or Ghana or any other place that we try to help. Yes we have liquid sunshine right now, but I can't help thinking that if we have a hot summer in this year, will we be complaining again?
