Over the weekends of 15th-16th and 29th-30th March the congregation in Northampton hosted Study Weekends taught by the British Bible School. The subject was Christian Evidences.

The topics taught over the two weekends were as follows.

- Is there a God?
- Is Jesus Real?
- Can we trust the documents we have?
- History and Prophecy of the Bible
- The scientific accuracy of the Bible
- What we are up against (dealing with scoffers)
- Jesus, the Message of the Bible
- Genesis 1-2
- Was Darwin wrong?
- Noah and the Flood (Genesis 6-7)
- Fossils and dinosaurs
- · After the flood

Teachers on this occasion were Jon Galloway and Mark Hill. A little over twenty people were present the first weekend with around forty in attendance the second. The information shared

and evidence presented brought about a good deal of discussion and questions. Whilst the evidence is the same for all who are willing to look the interpretation of it can be biased from either side of the argument. Both need to be honest in their evaluation of it to arrive at a satisfactory and truthful conclusion.

It was encouraging to understand that faith in God can in many ways be supported by



corroborating evidence. Whilst people who have faith in God do not necessarily feel they personally need evidence, it is certainly helpful when talking to people we want to encourage to come to faith. It is useful to have an answer to some of the criticisms levelled at the Bible and followers of Jesus. Historical evidence within and outside of the Bible shows that Jesus of Nazareth did live on the earth – that's a good start. But it is by faith we believe that he is who he claims to be: the Son of God.

Do fossils prove the earth to be billions of years old or do they speak to a cataclysmic event? We have fossils but what do they tell us? Our



subject matter provoked excellent discussion both in the sessions and over a cup of tea and lunch. There will also be much more discussion as individuals who were present will meet up with each other from time to time to continue sharing their thoughts. It was time well spent.

The British Bible School is a valuable resource for the congregations in the UK especially, but also further afield. Over the next few months Study Weekends will be hosted by other congregations on different topics or





books of the Bible and any who wish to attend are welcome to go along. Further studies in these and many other subjects are available, and information can be found on the website: www.britishbibeschool.com

We are interested in talking to anyone who would like to inquire about personal study, group studies, or hosting weekend studies in their local congregation. There are also opportunities to attend our residential family weekends and a study week later in the year.

On 6th February I had a life changing experience by having a total knee replacement. For years I have suffered from arthritis which had slowly brought me to the point that every step I took was agony. I did exercises, visited gyms, and had injections until the doctor told me there was only one way to improve the situation. Okay – so like many others at my time of life I can now say I have a new knee.

My knee is still sorting itself out but at least I can walk with the aid of two walking sticks, and it is this which has surprised me. I can now tootle along in a quadruped fashion, slowly but quite deliberately, being careful to avoid broken concrete slabs and the rise and fall of driveways and the potholes that seem to be everywhere.

I have met some lovely people who in the local accent will ask if I am alright. Now, to understand this, you have to realise this is a typical greeting and said in a way that the last syllable is a note higher than the rest of the offering. Here I am, walking at the pace

of a tortoise, with my four legs. My reply is usually, 'I'm getting there, thank you'.

What I have found is that whilst some will very kindly move out of my way so I may soldier on, others do not see me at all and are desperate to get past. They are too busy to even look at an old man walking along trying his best not to fall over. I have asked myself; did they see me? One day they may be in a similar situation that I am in. Or how often have I walked past someone in my rush?

I have started to think about those whom Jesus healed and the joy he must have given them. I've also thought about those who, having seen Jesus, never really saw him – they had eyes but did not see.

We have all sorts of places of worship, all sorts of special events, all sorts of meetings – but how many come and see Jesus? how many have eyes that are looking? What do our visitors see or hear when they visit us?

Just a thought.

Naeem Sabir, a graduate of the British Bible School, is married to Shazia and together they have served congregations in Pakistan for the past 21 years. They have three children, aged 17, 14, and 9 years old. The family also look after a family of three children, who are 16, 14 and 8 years old, whose parents were killed by Muslim extremists.

Although the number of Christians is growing, their weekly offering is only about £4 so Naeem often has to supplement the congregation's expenses. Naeem has been supported mainly by one British congregation and one individual who between them have been sending £400 per month. Sadly the individual can no longer contribute this amount. Naeem needs to raise £200 a month to continue his work for the Lord. The congregation lives in a situation where Islam has the upper hand and Christians are targets for abuse and they live in a state of constant fear.

THE FINAL WORD



Is the Church of Christ in Fact the Church of Christ?

There is an increasing idea in many congregations that, because they refer to themselves as 'Church of Christ', they are in fact part of the church that Jesus bought and died for. Sadly, many use the name as if it is an organisation rather than an organism.

Jesus said he would build his church, and we understand that the only way we can follow in that idea is to follow the pattern of the New Testament. So far, so good. We accept that the church is the body of Christ (Colossians 1:18,24). Then Ephesians 1:3-14 gives us a beautiful description of what the church is and the blessings for those who are in Christ. Yet the term, 'Church of Christ' is plastered on places of worship or in advertising as if the meeting place was the church of Christ.

Many of our British chapels, built in the 1800's, carried the name 'Christians' meeting place' with perhaps the date of the building of that place of worship. In

some cases, the building was given a name. In Kentish Town, the chapel is known as 'Hope Chapel'; in Bristol the official name of the building is 'St Johns Lane Chapel; and in Northampton the official name of the building is 'Christian **Fellowship** Centre'.

Some may say that we have to distinguish ourselves from the Baptists or Methodists, but we abuse the terminology by naming a building 'Church of Christ'. It is the people, the faithful followers of Christ who can be the Church of Christ. I have aways found it interesting that this designation is only ever plural in the Bible (Romans 16:16), when Paul sent the greetings of all the Churches of Christ to the Roman congregation.

The body of Christ has to naturally multiply itself for the believers to be part of a local group. This act of multiplication should not – and must not – be a separation of one group from another as is so often the case. The body of Christ cannot be divided. Yet what do we see? – one group doing one thing and refusing to be in fellowship with another group. How can we be one when we are divided and separated – who has become the judge? I have even been asked if I am church of Christ as opposed to being evangelical or some other group!

In other places in Scripture we read of the Church of God (Acts 20:28; 1 Corinthians 1:2, 10:32, 11:16, 22, 15:9; Galatians 1:13; 1 Timothy 3:5).

We are Christians first and foremost, servants of Jesus the crucified and risen Lord. We are not part of a denomination, but we are part of a world-wide fellowship of believers – but let us be careful.
