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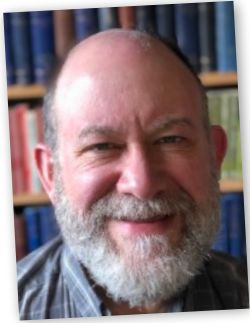

Reflections on having to wait

Patience

One aspect of the current restrictions that we are living under that I have struggled with is patience. I suspect I am not the only one. It was frustrating to have to go for months without seeing our children and grandchildren. It is frustrating having to wait as society reopens. It is frustrating not being able to yet sing with our voices on Sundays.

Those living today have struggled with patience for quite a while – perhaps people have always had these struggles. “I want it all and I want it now”, a song written by Brian May and performed by Queen, well reflected not only the 1980s but the time we are living in as well. We think we know what we want and we don’t want to wait to get it.

The pandemic has made us wait for so many things in life. In February of this year we found a house in South Lanarkshire in what seems to Arlene and me to be the ideal location. It was just being built. We were initially told it should be finished by the end of April...then the end of May...now the end of July. What is the problem? Well, there is this pandemic. The pandemic has slowed the house being built due to the builders at times needing to self-isolate. Now there is a shortage of building supplies. And, to top all of this off, there is a delay in getting a habitation certificate. We are having to learn patience.

We are thankful that we can now visit our children and grandchildren on both sides of the border, but we so desperately want to travel to the USA to see our son and his family and to meet our grandson

born over a year ago. Yet we also want to be safe and to keep them safe. We are having to learn patience.

Jesus talked about the need for patience. He talked about a farmer needing to wait patiently for his harvest (Luke 8:15 ESV). Other translations use the word ‘perseverance’. Perhaps this well expresses what we all need. To persevere means to “continue in a course of action even in the face of difficulty or with little or no indication of success”. We seem to have been doing that for over a year now!

Patience is connected with hope. Paul wrote: *“But if we hope for what we do not yet have, we wait for it patiently”* (Romans 8:25 NIV). That sums up much of our life just now. Yet Paul was looking towards eternity. Even though we are not yet there we patiently live in hope, eagerly anticipating what Jesus has in store for us.

When Paul later wrote about the unity we are to have as Christians, we find this: *“with all humility and gentleness, with patience, showing tolerance for one another in love, being diligent to preserve the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace.”* (Ephesians 4:2-3 NASB95).

We must have patience with each other and be tolerant of the differences we have. There are so many views going around about this pandemic. May we, with humility and gentleness, be patient with each other as we preserve the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace.

MOMENTS

“Just a moment”; “It will only take a moment”; “I’ll be with you in a moment” are phrases we often hear and use. But what is a ‘moment’?

We divide time into a series of ever smaller units from years, to months, weeks, days, hours, minutes and seconds. Our calendars, watches and clocks record and measure the passing and progress of these units of time. When we use the word ‘moment’ we often use it in the sense of a very short, unspecified duration of time. For something to happen in a moment means it is soon to happen, or it will happen quickly. A moment is the briefest period of time, something so quick it cannot be measured.

The Bible speaks of things that happen in a moment or which last for just a moment. In 1 Corinthians 15:51-52 Paul tells us that when the resurrection takes place our bodies will be changed, “in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye”. Paul uses the Greek word *atomos*, translated as ‘moment’, from which we get our word ‘atom’. The word literally means ‘indivisible’ or ‘that which cannot be cut’. A moment is the smallest unit of time which cannot be divided any further. Paul illustrates this by speaking of this moment as “the twinkling of an

eye.” Our bodies will be changed from the perishable to the imperishable, from the mortal to the immortal and this will take place “in a moment”, like the blink of an eye.

In 2 Corinthians 4:17 Paul compares life on this earth with the eternal life that is to come, “For our light affliction,

which is but for a moment, worketh for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory” (AV). When compared to the eternal glory of the life that awaits us, the afflictions and troubles that accompany us in this life are momentary.

In Isaiah 54:7-8 God speaks of Israel’s redemption after he had brought judgement upon them, “For a brief moment I forsook you, but with great compassion I will gather you. In overflowing wrath for a moment I hid my face from you, but with everlasting love I will have compassion on you, says the Lord, your Redeemer.” God’s anger towards Israel had lasted but a moment; in comparison his love for Israel is everlasting. Likewise, Psalm 30:5 says, “For his anger is but for a moment, and his favour is for a lifetime.” God’s anger and favour are compared in terms of duration: one lasts a moment, the other lasts a lifetime.

Our lives are made up of a series of connected moments of time. Things can happen in a moment which can have dramatic, life-changing consequences. A moment of carelessness can cause great trouble or suffering. A moment of decisive action can prevent something disastrous from occurring.

If our lives are made up of these moments of time then we must use these moments wisely and carefully. The hymn, “Take My Life and Let it Be” by Frances Ridley Havergal, contains the prayer: “Take my moments and my days; let them flow in ceaseless praise.” Moments are precious and we want to entrust the moments of our lives to God’s care, for his service and for his praise and glory.

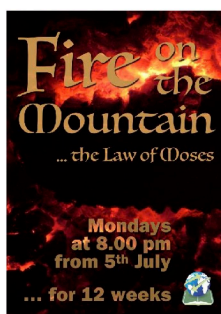

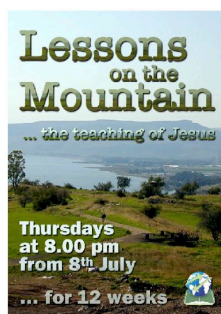

Jerusalem - today and yesterday

In my first visit to Israel I was excited to see Jerusalem. When you are standing on the Mount of Olives and overlooking the city it is breathtaking! You look down on all the graves that are on the slopes of the Mount of Olives and the Kidron Valley. From this elevation you can see the Garden of Gethsemane and even walk down the hill to the garden.



But when I tried to relate what I was seeing to the time of Jesus I found it to be more of a struggle. What I was looking at did not date from the first century, with the exception



of a few walls. Most of the 'old' architecture is from Crusader times.

This is where the Israel Museum became very helpful. I had seen photographs of the first century model of Jerusalem, so

this was something I was desperate to see. Upon our arrival at the museum our first stop was the model of Jerusalem from the time the Roman army attacked and destroyed

the temple and the city in AD 70. So it was a bit larger than it was in Jesus' day, but still it showed Jerusalem, as far as research has been able to describe it, as Jesus would have seen it.

It was thrilling to walk around the huge model of the city and see the city from every angle. I quickly realised that the temple dominated the city!

But then I wanted to know what Jerusalem would have been like in the time of the kings and prophets. Although I did not see any models of that era while there, at Hezekiah's

tunnel there was a film showing what Jerusalem would have been like in his day (c.700 BC). This has helped me to 'see' the city as I read the Scriptures, both in the time of the kings and in Jesus' day.

Visiting the Temple Mount is an experience due to the security that has to be gone through. The Dome of the Rock, the Islamic shrine, is a beautiful building. Sadly, non-Muslims are not permitted to enter it. This building was built in the 690s and the dome was rebuilt after it collapsed in the 1020s.



Although there are many sites to see within the city, I would have to admit that I was not as relaxed in Jerusalem as I was in Galilee – but then again I don't like big cities! Perhaps Jesus felt the same way.

I would encourage anyone interested in getting a better understanding of the Bible lands to make a trip to Israel. Ian Starrs will be leading another trip in January 2022 – and Arlene and I plan to be with him again. Contact him for further details.

I began this series of articles at the request of Graham Fisher who knew he would never visit but wanted to know more. I hope they are helpful for others.

VEDADO, CUBA

This is an appeal from the Castlemilk congregation in Glasgow on behalf of our brothers and sisters in Cuba. The congregation at Vedado has been on a journey over the last few years. What started as a Bible study group has grown into a thriving congregation. One from this group is now part of the congregation in Castlemilk; her mother is part of the congregation in Vedado.

The congregation began meeting in the flat of one of the brothers there

through various rented properties, one being a hall run by the local Communist party! Yet the congregation continued to grow. Unfortunately, things did not work out there as the people in charge of the hall changed. Needless to say, a thriving Christian community was not something the new managers wanted to facilitate.

This left the congregation without a regular place to meet until they found a new place to rent. Thankfully they found a new place to rent in the same neighbourhood. This is very important as public transportation in Cuba is not great and many of the Christians do not have cars. The new hall allowed them space to worship and to start teaching classes for children. Due to a change in what the building is being used for the congregation have now been advised that they cannot use the large space to meet and have been relegated to a smaller room. Yet, they continue to grow.

The congregation is not full of wealthy people, but over the years they have saved what funds they could with the intention of purchasing a place to call

(Libernys), however they began to outgrow the flat a few years ago. At first they started holding multiple meetings to allow the Christians to continue meeting in Libernys' flat. However, this became untenable as they continued to grow.

The congregation has had to look for a new place to meet. This took them

their own and continue their story. So far they have managed to save 10,000 USD, which is itself a feat and testament to their faith and dedication to this project. An opportunity has now presented itself for them to purchase a local building for 20,000 USD. This building is large and can be adapted to give them space to continue to grow.

The appeal is for other congregations to help make up the 10,000 USD. This will give the congregation some security and allow them to serve their local community in so many more ways.

KYIV, UKRAINE

One weekday I came to the vice director of the Barvinok sanatorium to inquire about their needs. While we were talking, someone knocked on the door. A nurse came in and said that the new boy was not feeling well. We stopped talking and I became a mere spectator.

The vice director, Larisa, asked to bring the boy into the office. The nurse called him in and at the same minute a skinny boy about six years old with an inflated belly, blond hair and crying eyes walked in. A dialogue ensued between them.

“What hurts?” Larisa asked. “My stomach,” the boy answered quietly and sadly. “How many days you have not eaten?” “Four.” “Don’t worry... nobody will take food away from you here. We will give you food five times a day. That’s why you don’t have to eat like it’s your last meal. Now the nurse will

give you some pills and you'll feel better. And for dinner, don't eat the whole portion, eat half of it so you don't get a stomach ache again, okay?" "Uh-huh," replied the boy and went out into the corridor with the nurse.

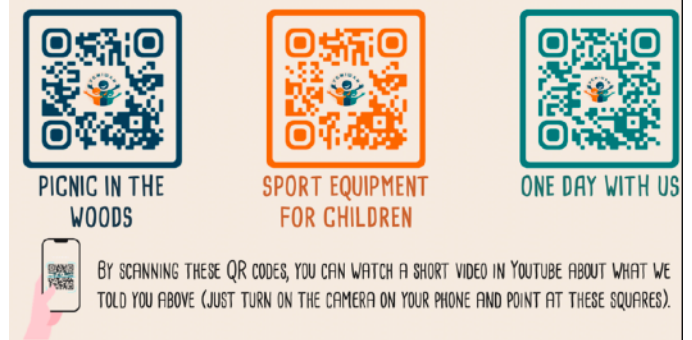
After the dialogue, I forgot why I came here. I realised that the boy had just been brought in today by social services, who had taken him away from his parents. I couldn't imagine – how can parents leave a child without food for four days? I imagined myself in the boy's shoes – what it would be like to not eat for four days and then see food, to get so full that you can not eat for another four days, because no body knows whether there will be food tomorrow.

Such children always think not about how to live, but how to survive. On the one hand an orphanage is not a good place, but if you look at this boy's life, in boarding school he always has food, clothes, and a place to sleep. Orphanages have more opportunities if people like you help them. We are grateful for all the support we have received.

We have already prepared a place and programme for a Bible camp. The funding is also available. But, much to our regret, the administration of several orphanages are still afraid to let the children go because of the pandemic, even though Ukraine is already in the 'green zone'. We know that God's will is for every thing, so we continue to pray and thank God for every blessing. We ask Him to give us patience and wisdom, to know what to do further.

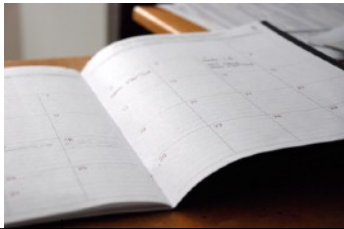

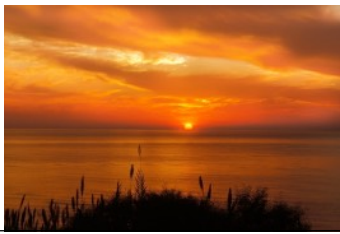

THE FINAL WORD



The Human Touch

Among the many things I have missed these past months is the simple handshake of a friend. Arm bumps may be the closest we have been allowed to get to those we care for but it is not the same. Some readers will know that our two oldest sons and their families live in Australia and it has now been 3½ years since we have been able to touch them. We have seen them, talked to them and prayed for them but we have not been able to touch them – of course, who knows when we shall see them in the flesh again.

Now every time I read the Gospel of Mark I wonder what it was like for people to be touched by Jesus, actually physically touched. On at least six occasions Jesus healed and touched. The first was Peter's mother-in-law: 'Jesus took her by the hand and helped her up' (1:31). Then a leper; we read 'Jesus was filled with compassion and reached out his hand and touched the man' (1:41). This was followed by touching a dead child when he took her by the hand and said, 'Little girl, get up' (5:41). In the next case Jesus actually put his fingers into a man's ears because he was deaf (7:33). When healing a blind man Jesus held his hand and led him out of the village before

healing him (8:23). Finally, when Jesus cast the evil spirits from a boy, 'Jesus took him by the hand and lifted him up' (9:26).

Three times we read of Jesus breaking loaves with his hands [the feeding of the 5,000 (6:41), the feeding of 4000 (8:6), and the institution of the Lord's Supper (14:16)].

Perhaps the sweetest time when Jesus used his hands was when he blessed the children. 'He took them in his arms and put his hands on them and blessed them' (10:16). I have always wished that I could have been one of those children, to have been so close as to be cuddled by the Saviour, to have heard his voice whisper to me, and to hear and feel his blessing.

It seems more than likely Jesus touched other people than are recorded for us but it is enough to know that the hands that were pierced by nails on the cross were used to heal, comfort and bless. I look at my own hands now and see the hands of an old man, no longer able to do what they once did but still able to be put together in prayer, to hold someone else to say that I care, and try to be a blessing to others. When we reach out and touch it tells the other person that they are special, that we want them involved with us, and that we care. Though we may not be able to bless as Jesus blessed we are his voice, his representative, his hands and his human touch.

Father God, we pray that your hands of blessing will be upon us, so that we in turn may bless others. May our hands be purified by you to accomplish what you want us to do. As Jesus used his hands for the benefit of others may we reach out to touch with compassion and nurture in love. Amen
