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MY PERSPECTIVE

The importance of God's word

Does God's word really matter? Does what God revealed in his word thousands of years ago really matter to us today? Or is the Bible, as the religious world seems to believe, an antiquated book that needs to be updated to meet modern ways of thinking?

As much as I would applaud the idea of democracy, where our government represents the people, I see this idea being used to justify just about anything. It is sad when we make what we want and desire the test for what we think is acceptable amongst God's people, let alone in our society.

I've had the privilege for the past few months to be teaching about Israel at Mount Sinai and then their travels in the book of Numbers to the Promised Land. Time and again the Israelites rebelled against God and what he had revealed to them through Moses. They thought they were objecting to Moses and often accused Moses of being the problem. Yet the real problem was that they were rebelling against God and his word.

The nation of Israel struggled with the competing influence of a pagan world around them. Sadly they didn't see that adopting more gods was not acceptable to the one true God. Why could God not be happy if they were also worshipping him? What they failed to realise was that there could be no other than him. He was the only Creator, the only one true God.

Sometimes we don't think of idolatry as a problem today. While we may not be bowing down and worshipping an image of stone or wood, we fail to realise that this is a narrow definition of idolatry. Idolatry is when we put anything in the place of God. Usually the idol that people put in God's place is themselves and their opinions. Rather than listening to God we prefer what we want, which is largely shaped by the godless society in which we live. Somehow God has been pushed out of our thinking.

The Israelites often rejected Moses. They blamed Moses for their failure to enter the Promised Land when they first arrived. They blamed Moses when God sent plagues among them and many died. They blamed Moses for having to wander forty years in the wilderness. It is always easier to blame who ever is seen as the leader than to realise that our problems are usually of our own making.

Today it is the writers of the New Testament that often get the blame. Time and again we hear that the problem is what Paul wrote. Really? Do we realise who was behind what Paul recorded in the letters that are now part of God's word? Paul didn't make these things up – what he wrote was given to him by God's Holy Spirit, who in turn was given it by Jesus and the Father himself.

You see, when we object to the writings we find in the New Testament – usually because we don't agree with them – we are really objecting to and rebelling against God. Just as the Israelites in the wilderness found themselves opposing God when they thought they were opposing Moses, we find ourselves opposing God when we reject the writings of the apostles.

Let's get back to knowing and following God's word!

Tell Me the Story of Jesus

As I write this we are planning to go to the cinema at the weekend to watch a film called "The Jesus Revolution". It is what is termed a 'Christian film' – I'm all for that and it has a big star from the telly in it. What if it is not scripturally accurate? What if they do not do things like we do in the churches of Christ? I'm resigned to that being the case. I am however, looking forward to not being bombarded with swearing, cursing, taking the Lord's name in vain and explicit sexual scenes and the promotion of all sorts of perverted ideas. What if this and other so called 'Christian film's are watched by people with no faith or church background and it piques their interest? They will not sit wondering why it says this or that in the Bible yet is not portrayed correctly in the film. They might be entertained and, who knows, the story might create curiosity about Jesus. If it does what would be the best way to follow up?

The Pharisees emphasised the letter of the law; Jesus came along and told stories. Jesus' stories were scripturally accurate, stories about him often weren't and aren't. What if we had scripturally,

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biblically accurate films to show people that we could use to study with them? We do! And they are free to use!

The story of our redemption, the story of Jesus, is the greatest story ever told. What if we had help to tell it? We do! And it is free to use!

To tell the story of Jesus the best place to start is with our story. If Jesus has not made an impact on our life, why would he be worth sharing? If Jesus has not helped us out of our addiction, why would he be worth sharing? If Jesus has not taken away our sin and the feelings of guilt it brought, if peace has not been brought to our life through knowing Jesus, why would he be worth sharing. If the direction of our life has not been completely turned around and hope given to us by Jesus, why would he be worth sharing? However, Jesus has done all these things and many more, so he is worth sharing.



So, what is your story? What is so good about Jesus that you need to tell others about him? What if, after telling someone your story, it piques the interest of the listener to know more? What could you do then?

I suggest you invite them to watch a film. Just a short one around 6 or 7 minutes. A short film that you then could ask a question or two about to guide them to think about what they have watched. Not for you to tell them what they must believe, but to help them examine the claims of Jesus for themselves.

Through a series of short films, the story of redemption can be told, films you can show wherever there is an internet connection. You can use your smart phone, tablet, or laptop, and you can use it one to one or in groups.

Have a look at "<u>storyofredemptionfilms.com</u>" to see a couple of samples. To get access to all the films you will need a link, which is available on request..

Free training is available to help you use the site, the films and the study questions most effectively. Training will also include how to use these face to face or on Zoom, one to one or in groups.

No sooner than we complete our current round of online Bible classes, that we are


preparing for the next. Indeed, as you read this, the first session of the new season will have already been conducted. All these classes are recorded so there is the opportunity to catch up before the next one.

Available for twelve weeks beginning 26th June 2023 at 8.00 pm we are offering you the following two studies.


Romans will be taught each Monday evening by Jack Paton.



THE FINAL WORD



The Presence of Absence Following on from my thoughts of last month about getting old, I want to share some thoughts about the ultimate discussion that is rarely talked about. We use a whole plethora of words about death: passed on, passed away, gone home. And when we talk about it ourselves it may be couched as 'if something happens to me'.

The word death has a finality to it that everyone hates. Now those of us in Christ are thankful for our salvation, that through the death of Christ we may have life. That is our faith and trust. But what about those who have not had the opportunity to think about the gospel because they have never heard of the love of Jesus, or they do not have the ability to develop faith or are too young or even too old? These are perhaps questions that we do not like to think about.

Whatever the case, when someone dies, they leave behind the presence of absence. Even in the case of a child who dies before birth, they leave behind the expectation of a life that never came to fully be. The preparation for that child will have taken place and their presence is felt in absence.

For those who live a long life they leave behind all the material possessions they owned but, greater still, they leave behind the way they were: funny, grumpy, kind, thoughtful. When we leave this life, we leave behind memories that we probably do not know that we have even created. We touch other people's lives for generations. We leave behind memories so that people can still remember, such as what we sounded like. We leave behind what we thought about or created or taught. We leave behind much of ourselves that have influenced others in hundreds of ways. When we die, we are not an eliminated life force, we leave behind the presence of our absence.

If you have a story to tell, write it down; if you want to say something worth saying, say it now; if you want to share, do it so that you may leave the presence in your absence.

Is it any wonder that week by week Christians are reminded of the death of

> Jesus in the breaking of bread – we have his presence in his absence.

Thank you, Lord, for the life you have been gracious to grant us. Each day we meet people we know, and our life becomes part of theirs. We may even meet someone for a moment or two but something special is exchanged. We really do not know our own selves and yet there is meaning in all we say and do. Guide us and direct us we pray. Amen.
