### MY PERSPECTIVE



### Time waits for nobody

A few months ago as I was listening to music while driving I heard a song by the late Freddie Mercury: "Time waits for no one". That phrase (and melody) became stuck in my head and has continued to reverberate.

Arlene and I spent almost a month in the USA over April and May and, as we travelled, that phrase kept coming into my head. We were able to visit my remaining aunts and uncles and it very much struck home that *time waits for nobody*. In my memory they are far younger than the people we saw.

Even my own siblings brought this to my mind as I saw a brother dealing with the early stages of Parkinson's Disease, and my other two siblings struggling with quite severe arthritis – *time waits for nobody*.

One of the themes that we discussed as I visited my supporters was when I can draw my pension (not that they brought it up – I did). I find it hard to believe that this month I've now been living and working for the Lord in Scotland for forty years. In less than two years I can draw my state pension. I've often asked, 'How did this happen?'! I think the answer has to be 'time waits for nobody'.

I spent time in the USA visiting a few cemeteries where I have ancestors buried. Names that I had only seen on paper were now seen on gravestones. I wondered what type of people they were – many I know were Christians and actively involved in their local congregation. Yet they are no longer here. *Time waits for nobody*.

The lyrics of the song written by Freddie Mercury emphasise this sentiment:

Time waits for nobody
We all must plan our hopes together
Or we'll have no more future at all
Time waits for nobody

We might as well be deaf and dumb and blind

I know that sounds unkind

But it seems to me

We've not listened to

Or spoken about it at all

The fact that time is running out for us all

You don't need me to tell you what's gone wrong
You know what's going on
And it seems to me we've not cared enough
Or confided in each other at all
It seems like we've all got our backs against the wall

Time waits for nobody
Time waits for no one
We've got to build this world together
Or we'll have no more future at all
Because time, it waits for nobody

Although his emphasis was very much on this world I think we can see an application for our lives as Christians. The only time we have is now – we are not guaranteed anything else, not even tomorrow. Whatever we need to do we need to do it now, because *time*, *it waits for nobody*.

This is what Paul emphasised when he wrote: "I tell you, now is the time of God's favour, now is the day of salvation" (2 Corinthians 6:2 NIV). Jesus emphasised the same thing: "As long as it is day, we must do the works of him who sent me. Night is coming, when no-one can work" (John 9:4).

May we make the best use of our time on the earth so that we are prepared for eternity. *Time waits for nobody*.

### OUR VICTORY PARADE

Over the past month or so many people around the world have been celebrating the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of VE Day. Victory in Europe is now remembered by fewer and fewer people who were present each year. Many this year would have seen the King, the parades, military bands or been part of the celebrations one way or another. There were times of sadness and times of rejoicing. One thing for sure is that mankind needs to remember the past to go forward into the future.

The story is told of a faithful Christian believer who went to the first World War, willing to help but refusing to fight. William Coltman was born in 1891 and was a professing Christian and believed that it was wrong to fight. When called up to fight he refused to take a gun but said that he would serve on the battlefield as a stretcherbearer. William became one of the highest decorated soldiers of the war and never shot a bullet. He received The Military Cross and Bar, Distinguished Conduct Medal and Bar, various other medals and eventually was awarded the Victoria Cross. William was willing to work as a stretcher-bearer with someone else when necessary but often went out onto the field and carried the wounded on his back. He was only 5' 4" (1.63m) but by going beyond the call of duty he saved hundreds of men. He never considered himself a brave man but believed it was important to serve the Lord Jesus wherever he could.

Sometimes we may think that Heaven is a reward for being a faithful Christian, but we would be very wrong. To receive a reward means that we must attain a certain standard and work towards it. Ephesians 2:8-10 tells us that 'it is by grace we are saved through faith, and this is not of yourselves, it is the gift of God, not by works so that no one can boast'. For the

Christian it is easy to say they have believed, that they have repented, been baptised, and lived a faithful life – but we can end up thinking that because we have done all these things God ought to accept us.


Listening to the radio on VE Day there was a recording of John Major recounting the 50th anniversary. There was a large parade, and the Royals present were her late Majesty Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother and Princess Margaret. There came along a man who was poorly dressed and quite shabby. He was stopped and questioned by various people. There was a slight breeze, and his shabby-looking mac opened to reveal a Victoria Cross on his coat. A soldier saw this and went over to the man and saluted all soldiers are required to salute the cross wherever they are. He was then asked: why have you come? The reply was simply, 'I have come to see my Queen'. The man was ushered onto the dais with the Royals.

When I heard this, I felt a thud in my chest. On the Day of Judgement if I am asked, 'why have you come here?', I think I could probably offer a reasonable theological discussion. But anything I could say would boil down to admitting that I have done nothing, but that Jesus has provided everything for my salvation. So rather than say anything else if I am asked why I am standing in the Judgment Hall of God, what I want to say is simply, 'I have come to see my King'. To see Jesus enthroned in glory will be the blessing that I have waited for all my life and the sight that can sustain me throughout eternity. We can do nothing to save ourselves, but Jesus calls us to follow him and as we follow, we are privileged to grow in understanding and obedience so that one day we can all stand and say, 'We have come to see our King'.



The gift of friendship

'I no longer call you servants but friends.' (John 15:14-15)

Every now and again I have a phone call from someone I have not talked to for quite a while and what happens is that we seem to pick up where we left off. I love it. There is no embarrassment, no gasps of dismay – just a flow of love from someone I used to see often but now can only see once in a while. The blessing is that the friendship did not die, it simply remained to be picked up again.

Friendship is like a diamond that has many sides. We are always there for each other, wanting the best for each other in a relationship of care and compassion. We have each other's backs even if we have not seen each other for years. Friendship is a beautiful gift.

In Ecclesiastes 4:9 we find, 'Two are better than one because they have a good return for their work. If one falls down his friend can help him up'. Over the years I have found that when Christians actually work together their faith is made stronger. It may be working in some form of evangelism, or a community project, or on the chapel. When we get out of the Sunday morning 'going to church mode', we can really start to get to know each other. We can laugh together and be concerned for each other – it is then we have fellowship. In worship our attention is given over to praise, congregational prayer, and study – but in all honesty, there is not a real closeness of fellowship.

Psalm 133:1 records, 'How good and pleasant it is when brothers live together in unity!' How many congregations have broken up because of disunity. It is more than likely 9 out of 10 times when there is strife in a group it is not over a matter of scripture, but it is personality breakdown. The main leaders of the

distress do not really know each other, they have not played together, sat down and prayed together, or even drunk coffee and eaten cake together.

How often do we cry on each other's shoulders? At communion we eat the body of Christ and drink the blood although in symbolic form – it may sting our hearts, but does it break our hearts? Who weeps in remorse for their failures or who jumps for joy in the realisation that the price has been paid for us? The greatest friend the world has ever known is Jesus and in the very act of remembrance we can be dry and sterile.

When we move to Romans 12:10 we read, 'Be devoted to one another in brotherly love. Honour one another above yourselves'. That is friendship. Build each other up; do not knock each other down. But someone will say, I cannot get on with this or that person and it is true we cannot get on with everyone in a close relationship. But have we tried? Have we eaten together and spent time together? Then why can't we just respect each other as much as we can? Remember to greet one another with a holy kiss. Relationship can change and friendship can develop given time.

Friendship is a beautiful gift that can last for decades or until the Lord calls us home. Jesus no longer calls us servants but friends. We work together as diamonds in the crown of our Lord.
