Moving towards normality...again

I t is difficult to believe how our lives have been changed in such a short period of time. It was a year ago this month that we went into our first lockdown and we discovered what it is like to live during a global pandemic.

It was with joy that we heard the Prime Minister – and the First Minister in Scotland (and their equivalents in the other devolved nations) – announce that lockdown would finally start easing within a couple of months. Our current lockdown has only been since the beginning of year, but by the time 'stay at home' restrictions are lifted (at least in Scotland) we will have been locked down for another thirteen weeks. One fourth of 2021.

Although there is talk of 'normality' once again, I get the impression that there won't be much normality for the rest of the year. It will be a slow easing of restrictions as the vaccines roll out and the virus is driven to manageable levels. Many I am sure will be disappointed that all restrictions aren't taken away immediately.

But will we really go back to 'normal'?

– at least normal as we were living just thirteen months ago? As I reflect on the past year, what we have had to live under is not something I would have wished for anyone. But there are good changes that have come about, many that I hope will stay with us.

There are the obvious ones that may affect how we operate as congregations. Most of us now know how to have online meetings. I know at East Kilbride the plan is to be able to

have our worship each Sunday online so that those who live a distance and are unable to get in or those who are not well can 'join' in our time of worship. We might not have contemplated this just over a year ago but now we have learned it is quite simple. Having lessons on YouTube or FaceBook is now something we can utilise to expand our teaching.


Many now work from home. The care company my wife works with as a trainer has moved a large part of their training to online. The result is that many will be able to continue working from home. We always heard that this was the future – perhaps the future has finally arrived!

Many people struggle with change. Many like life to be the way they have become used to and changes such as we have had to live through create stress in their lives. We are hearing more and more about how the pandemic has affected people's mental health.

But in all the changes we live through, there is one constant we can always rely on – and that is Jesus. The writer of Hebrews expressed it this way: "Jesus the Messiah is the same yesterday, today, and forever".

The world is constantly changing and the world-wide pandemic has brought with it even more change. But we can rely on Jesus not to change. He will always be there. His Word will not change either – what it says today it will say tomorrow. This is something we can rely on – always.

ABSS 2021 - Online

Although we weren't in Gemünden, it was wonderful to see so many from across Europe – and the world – for the annual Advanced Bible Study Series. Due to the travel restrictions caused by the pandemic, we were all able to sit in the comfort of our own homes, study the Bible together, and catch up with Christians around Europe.

The format to the normal ABSS was similar, but different. It was similar in that the day began with a devotional and lesson and there was 'free time' until classes resumed in the afternoon. It was different in that allowance was made for people working and rather than five or six classes per day there were only four.

Our morning online began at 8.00 am for those in the UK (9.00 in Europe, our normal starting time for ABSS). We began each day as we always do with a short time of devotion, this year led by Robert Limb from Paris.

The first (and only class) of the morning was led by Jaro Marcin from Prague, Czech Republic. On Wednesday, Thursday and Friday mornings he led us in a study he entitled "Lessons learned from the Teacher (Qoheleth)". He used the text of Ecclesiastes interwoven with his own growth as a Christian to illustrate what how this book still speaks to people today and can be effective in leading people to know more about Jesus. (Tuesday morning was an orientation and introduction session for the week.)

The afternoon sessions began at 3.00 pm with Patrick Boyns representing the British Bible School. He led us in a look at "The Prophet Ezekiel". Not being able to cover the book in four sessions, he introduced us to Ezekiel and his times and concentrated on a few themes found in this vital book of the prophets.

The session which followed at 4.00 pm was led by Craig Young, who works with Chrétiens en Mission in Marseilles, France, a training programme for French-speaking Christians and serves as one of the shepherds at the Chapelle de Fuveau congregation. In his lessons he walked us through the book of Ephesians, concentrating on "A Unity Beyond All We Could Ask or Imagine".

After a break for our evening meal, Todd Olsen from Oklahoma City led two evening sessions and then a session on Saturday morning entitled "Two Tools and a Ready Answer". In these lessons he contrasted the answers given by the religious and philosophical systems around us to the questions of human existence with what we find in God's word. He concluded Saturday

morning with a session entitled, "Why did Jesus Come in the Flesh, and What Does That Have to do With Melchizedek?" The sessions on Saturday were part of ABSS II.

In addition to the study sessions, the usual evening activities were also able to be held. On Tuesday evening there was a time of recommending good resources, both books and online sites. Wednesday there was a surprise guest speaker from Canada. And Thursday evening we enjoyed the traditional 'Gemündener Follies' – a showcase of talent (or lack thereof). Most 'acts' this year rather than being live were submitted via video clips. It was a very enjoyable time compered by our own Patrick Boyns. This

was followed by the annual Doyle Key Memorial Ice Cream Bash – only everyone had to provide their own ice cream. It was enjoyable chatting on Zoom with others while eating ice cream.

Although not quite the same as being in person, it was a good substitute and has whetted our appetite for next year's Advanced Bible Study Series. If you have never been, why not plan now to travel to Germany next February for a week of encouraging fellowship and good Bible study? The cost for the week is usually just over £100 plus your own travel costs.

A SQUEAKY WHEEL

It was another day of furlough and I was quietly studying. Suddenly the silence was broken with a very loud squeak, squeak, squeak. Now I knew it was not me as I was sitting down in front of the laptop. These days I tend to go creak, creak, creak when I move around. On looking out my living room window I noticed one of my neighbours pushing an old wheelbarrow from which he was throwing salt onto the pavement to clear the snow which had fallen during the night. On went my jacket and shoes and face mask. I grabbed a can of WD40 from the cupboard and went down to offer him some lubricant for his rather disagreeable screech. I mean, is there anything more annoying than a squeaky wheel or a creaky door hinge? He did refuse my offer of lubrication as he found the squeak comforting.

There is an old proverb which says, "The squeaky wheel gets the oil" and is used to convey the idea that the most noticeable or loudest problems are the ones most likely to get attention. The origin of the squeaky wheel metaphor is unknown, but its current form is attributed to American humorist Josh Billings who is said to have popularised it in his putative poem "The Kicker" (c. 1870) –

I hate to be a kicker, I always long for peace,



But the wheel that squeaks the loudest, Is the one that gets the grease.

Now, I must admit this current lockdown has been more difficult to endure. My get up and go has got up and gone. I miss meeting with the saints in Newtongrange. I will even admit – I miss work. I also concede that I have struggled with my faith over the last few months. I have spent a lot of time reading, and in the production of the church magazine. Prayer has been a lifeline and it may seem at times to God that I was being like a 'squeaky wheel'.

In Luke 18 we read of a widow's persistent request to the judge for justice against her adversary. This might have made her sound like a 'squeaky wheel' as well, but with that dogged diligence she got the result she needed. Luke explains that Jesus told this story to teach us the need to pray continually and not to give up, even if it appears that the answer to our prayer is delayed.

God is certainly not an unjust judge who must be harassed before He responds to us. He is our loving Heavenly Father who cares about us and hears us when we cry to Him. Regular, determined prayer draws us closer to Him. Sometimes it may feel like we are squeaky wheels, but the Lord welcomes our prayer and encourages us to approach Him with our cries. He hears us and will come to our aid in ways that we may not expect.

All we need to do is quietly bring our personal petitions continually before God and walk with the One who already knows our needs. Remember: don't give up. We need to learn to trust God and wait patiently for His response because He hears our prayers.

INDIA

Good Shepherd English Medium School Anakapalle

Good Shepherd English Medium School was established by Vinayanad Alamuri in the year 1978 at Anakapalle, India. Gradually the school developed in quality and became a highly reputed Central English Medium School. A small congregation of the Lord's people also began to worship in one of the classrooms.



In 1988 the school received provisional affiliation from the Council for the Indian School Certificate Examinations and in the

year 2000 it was given permanent affiliation. In 2014 the school received the Prestigious International School Award from *British Council*. Every year the school has been achieving 100% results in 10th class Board Examinations.

Each academic year the school provides free education for forty children of preachers, teachers and local Christians who could not afford to send their children. The congregation has constructed their own permanent church building where more than 150 Christians join

to worship the Lord each week. They have also helped other congregations in Thummapala and Mushidiwada.

In 2006 we began a *Preachers Fellowship* where 100 preachers from different areas gather for Bible study every month. This has encouraged many other congregations who have started new congregations in towns near them.

In 1991 the school leased land and constructed temporary sheds as well as purchasing a small tract of land. In 2000 we were asked by the local government to construct permanent buildings so we constructed the ground floor of our school building. In 2010 we were asked to vacate the site where we had temporary sheds, so we had to construct a permanent building for the school and the congregation by taking loan from banks.

As there is religious discrimination in our society and there is no support from other communities to came forward to help in giving loans for small interests. We have overcome all these struggles because of continuous prayers.

Currently there are 440 students from Nursery to 10th Class (GCSE), 40 teaching staff and 13 non-teaching

staff. Each month we are paying interest on the loans we had to take out to build the buildings as well as pay regular expenses of employee's salaries, taxes, electricity bills etc. Due to the high interest rate we are unable to balance our income and expenses. Up until now we have managed to pay the high interest rate through the income from school fees.

During this pandemic the school was completely

closed for nearly six months, and there is no support from the Government. After reopening the school most of the children could not pay their fees. But the expenses are the same.

Our father's dream was to establish 100 congregations in different places; to train 100 preachers; to start a care home as there are many older people in the

congregation and no one to look after them. Our desire is to fulfil these ambitions and to continue the school and serving God.

Our request: We, the children of Alamuri Vinayanad, are looking for financial assistance from individuals and congregations to ensure the future of the school.

Evening Lectures Online



New beginnings

f anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation'. (2 Corinthians 5:17)

Congregations have gone through a time when things were just not what we wanted them to be. Plans, events and just the normal things of life have been put on hold. But now there is a road map ahead we need to get ready. What does your church want to do most of all? Perhaps it may be just to see everyone again, or to have a good sing or to know we are safe and well. Are we planning to move forward or backward?

Are we ready? Are our buildings ready? Do our places of worship look clean and happy or musty and drab; if they were a restaurant would we want to eat there? If not, can we expect people to feed on the Word of God there?

Are we ready for worship? Do we expect the same pattern of service, with the same people doing the same things, saying the same things, in the same way? Are we ready for visitors? I expect you are praying for new people to visit your congregation. Does everyone look out for visitors or are they ignored? The most important people in our meetings are the visitors, they are our guests let them see Jesus.

If we are in Christ we are a new Creation but does Jesus want you in his Church? No doubt about it but we have to be able to let Jesus Re-create us. That means change. Some of our churches are sleepy hollows; they need to be alive with the Spirit of God. Sometimes it seems as if we left Jesus in the meeting place and get back in touch with him on Sunday mornings. Jesus is alive and wants to live in his people; He has a need to live in his people. The sacrifice on the cross was not for a comfortable social group

but for those who struggle daily, trying to understand the spiritual life. It is in the heart of mankind to seek a greater good and the love of God. Are you ready for the new beginnings?
