WARMHEARTMALAWI

We established WARMHEARTMALAWI as a charity in 2007, allowing us to work with UK schools on education projects in Malawi. We initially worked with Davison and Keston Ndhlovu at Ekwendeni Church Primary School. For the past 7 years we partnered a village secondary school in Bulala, where Falawo Kanjinga, a preacher in Malawi, and his wife Lidesi oversee the girls' hostel.



Ruth Kamlawanga, 21, says: "Our culture is that if a girl has reached 18 she must get married. Many people insult me by saying I am getting old and not get married, but because I know the benefits of school I don't want to be pulled down by their ideas. I want to be their role model." Ruth, from Mutu church, is one of our sponsored Higher Ed students on the final year of a Public Health Diploma course.

A big problem for girls who want a secondary education (open only to the top 25% or so in final "primary exams" around age 14), is that they may live up to 20 km (12 miles) from the nearest school.

In 2017, Rob Yates was the lead teacher of a 6th Form trip and stayed at the hostel

in Bulala. Rob contacted me in May, saying that he planned to run over 500 miles to raise funds for WHM and wanted a project. (He completed his challenge in August.) With Samson Chima, builder and preacher, as our contractor/project manager, we plan to build a hostel to accommodate 24 girls in Mbalachanda, right on the Zambian border. Currently these girls are sleeping in a classroom for four nights per week as it is too far to travel from home every day.

The "Guest House" will also be used in school holidays by Nick O'Donovan's dental team, and by visitors working with the school. The estimated cost for building this and an adjacent house for Samson Chima and his wife Lister is £13,000. Rob has currently raised over £5,000 with more expected towards his target of £8,600.

I am aware that UK churches are generally small and contribute massively to so many causes – one of the reasons we chose not to appeal through the CW for help on our previous projects. INDIA: BREATH OF LIFE

Breath of Life is one of the most satisfying relief works that we have been involved in during recent years. With your kind and timely help, we saved thousands of people from the mouth of untimely death and the impact it had, and gratitude expressed both by the individual and the family, is beyond words. The very disturbing pictures of people dying in hundreds due to lack of oxygen and the mass cremations all over India melted our hearts to cry out for an emergency help to buy Oxygen Equipment.

The response we received is beyond our imagination. Churches all around the UK and Singapore responded quickly. Even though the prices had risen sharply from the time we enquired to the time we actually bought the machines (we almost ended up paying double due to the huge demand and scarcity of the machines), we were able to purchase twelve high quality machines from five litre to ten litre capacity. Some of the machines were delivered from Delhi, Ahmedabad and Hyderabad, 600 km to 1800 km from Kakinada. We shared them with congregations and individuals in Vizag, Vijayawada, Hyderabad and Kakinada areas.

A team of Christian doctors coordinated the allocation and maintenance of machines based on the patients' requirements. They said that not one of the machines had been idle since they were added to the inventory. As there was always someone waiting, they barely had time to disinfect the machines before they could be given to another patient. Our machines have mainly been used to help patients in rural areas where there were no proper medical facilities – rural places are often deprived of proper medical facilities.

Thankfully, the demand has slowed down from mid-July as the Covid cases have come down and more oxygen was made available by the government. Many countries around the world have joined in this fight for oxygen and helped India to breathe. Due to Covid restrictions and sensitivity, we could not take photos of all the patients. Out of all the patients whom we have helped with oxygen concentrators, either to reach hospital or to secure a bed with Oxygen Support, only two patients have died. The remaining have all recovered and been reunited with their families.



As an aftermath to Covid, Black Fungus cases are slowly raising in Kakinada area – since May 486 people have died due to Black Fungus. The injections being used to treat Black Fungus are about £70 each and a patient is required to take at least 16-20 of these injections. Under the #Breath of Life project we were able join hands to help two patients get Black Fungus treatment.

As medical expert reports warn us about an imminent third wave of Covid in the months of October and November, we are getting ready to fight the battle again. We don't know how severe it will be this time. Vaccination is going on at full swing, our new medical facilities are added, so we are more prepared than before. One of the predictions is that children will be the most effected in the third wave. Whatever it is going to be, we must face it and fight it. We are getting

ready with our medical supplies this time and are needing to acquire emergency medical supplies for children. We taking our medical team's advice and are contacting vendors for equipment specifically for children so that, if the situation requires it, we will humbly serve the community and our children.

Naeem has three children and is raising another three orphans whose parents were killed by Muslim neighbours. He continues to seek help for Bibles, orphans and for himself in an aggressive and difficult environment.

Last week, I turned 57. I am most grateful for this life spent serving with the Lord. After all, this is my 31st year in full-time service with the Lord's people.

Our community food pantry continues to thrive. By God's amazing grace, donations, both big and small, trickle in from the most unexpected sources week after week. My family and I are humbled to be able to serve the volunteers (my neighbours), the elderly, persons with disabilities, and undernourished children that benefit from the food pantry (now on its 24th week!).

In the past month, two of the elderly women we have served passed from this life. Nanay Vicky lost her battle with cancer while Nanay Menang died from diabetes complications. These are some of the people that this community food pantry is serving every week.

There is no telling when this lockdown will be over. The government keeps varying the level of strictness every fortnight. Right now, we still are



on a stricter lockdown where most businesses are still not allowed to operate. Thus, many people remain jobless and desperate for food.

We had another strong earthquake (magnitude 5.7 on the Richter scale) the other day. We were roused from our sleep at 1:12 am by violent rocking. Thankfully, we were spared from harm.



Hindu. Since then the school has grown in number to 440 achieving 95% passes in GCSE equivalent. 40 of the children receive free education due to their financial difficulties.

The school is the only Christian School in the area. The facilities are also used as a Bible study centre for preachers, promoting unity, scripture knowledge and evangelistic encouragement. Over the years great difficulties have been overcome and permanent buildings had to be provided to continue this work.

Local Christians took out loans to help the project along but because of the pandemic the school was closed for a whole year and finances have dried up leaving the whole project in the balance. There has been no Governmental help. Teachers have not been receiving wages and loans are not being repaid.

They have always tried to financially continue this work themselves but they now need help and appeal to British congregations to share fellowship with them. The Lewisham congregation is heading this project – one of the

FAMILY NEWS

NOTTINGHAM (STAPLEFORD)

From time to time things occur in our world, things which tend to stop mankind in his/her tracks and we cannot ignore them. That applies to everyone, including Christians. We may feel as Christians that they have nothing to do with us, but we live in this world and the things that happen in our world will always have plenty to do with us. We cannot ignore them. They need our prayers – and sometimes they need more than our prayers.

This past several weeks we saw the situation in Kabul as planeloads of refugees were flown out of Afghanistan to a number of countries, including over 15,000 to Britain. It was heart-touching to see them virtually fighting to get on a flight, with whatever they could carry in a small bag or on their backs. They are now here and are 'temporarily' being housed mainly in hotels until suitable accommodation can be found for them throughout the country. They are rapidly running out of essential items that they desperately need. The second week of September the congregation at Stapleford in Nottingham did a (admittedly small) bit to try and help.

By chance (Does God work "by chance"?!), Bob and Jean Eckman's daughter Samantha was staying with them a few days, helping to sort out 'stuff' in their loft. Among them were

suitcases.
Bob and
Jean had
decided
that they
needed to
cull the
number
of

suitcases they had and get them down to just the ones they needed and would use. Most of those that were unwanted were still in very good condition and their plan was either to take them to charity shops or sell them in a car-boot sale. Sam had another idea.

In her work with the NHS, she works closely with a charity based in Lewisham, south London. She had heard that this charity (Lewisham Community Hub) was trying to help some of these refugees that were in their area. They were desperately in need of two things: 1) 'essential' items such as children's underwear and socks, etc., nappies, and sanitary items, and 2) suitcases, as many of the refugees had nothing to keep their personal things in until they were settled.

The congregation funded the purchase of all of the items that went into the cases, and on 8th September Bob took them down on the train to London. He met up with Sam at London Bridge station (Sam's office is about a five minute walk away). The three cases were handed over to Sam who in turn took them to the Lewisham Community Hub on the Friday where they were gratefully received. They were delivered that evening to 120 refugees who were being temporarily housed in a bridging hotel in SE London. This 120 had received no support until then.

"Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see you...a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you?'....The King will reply, 'I tell you the truth, whatever you did for the least of these brothers of mine, you did it for me'" (Matthew 25:37-40).


I am so proud of this congregation and all that it does to help people in need.
